New York Mets Baseball Tickets

Tickets for the 1972 Mets ballgames will be on sale at the Recreation Office starting 7:30 a.m. Friday, March 24, 1972. As in past years, BERA has eight box seats for each of 56 playing dates including 13 Sundays, 40 weeknights and 2 holidays. Tickets are priced at \$4.25 each.

In an effort to make the tickets available to as many interested employees as possible, the following sales procedures will be observed:

After the initial sale, the Recreation Office will be open for ticket sales and information daily from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Tickets are intended for the employee and members of his immediate family. It is understood that a single employee might wish to purchase an additional ticket for his or her escort.

Employees may purchase either two or four tickets. Tickets will not be sold to any one employee for more than two games in advance. An employee who has purchased tickets for two games in advance will be permitted to buy additional tickets only after he has attended at least one of his games. In other words, tickets will not be sold to anyone currently in possession of tickets for two unplayed games.

These restrictions may be lifted if warranted by sales.

Tickets will not be returnable or acceptable for refund at the Recreation Office. If a game is rained out or postponed, refund or exchange should be made at the Ticket Office at the ball park.

Date Changed For Final BERA Concert

Contrary to prior announcements, the final concert of the season will be held Tuesday, March 28, at 8:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. By way of an additional change, harpsichordist Albert Fuller will be joined by violinist Stanley Ritchie.

Albert Fuller, who is already known to BNL audiences, is recognized as one of the most distinguished solo keyboard performers of our time. He has appeared repeatedly in the major concert halls of Europe and the United States. Mr. Fuller is a member of the faculty of the Juilliard School of Music.

Stanley Ritchie, violinist, a native Australian, was named winner of the Australian Broadcasting Commission Concerto Competition in 1957. He first came to the United States in 1959 and shortly thereafter began several years of teaching and performing at Brandeis University. In 1962 he began appearing as concert master and soloist with many orchestras in the New York City area; shortly thereafter, he was made concert master of the New York City Opera Orchestra, and then in 1965 concert master of the Metropolitan Opera Orchestra. He is now the concert master of the Musica Aeterna Orchestra, with which he has also performed as soloist.

The program at BNL will consist of works by Couperin, Rameau, Bach, Corelli and Mozart, for both violin-harpsichord duo and solo harpsichord.

V.I.P.'s Rule Lab On 25th Anniversary

Wednesday, March 22, 1947 was a long time ago. Do you remember where you were on that day? 190 members of the Brookhaven National Laboratory staff can answer with assurance!

The 25-year pioneers were all at work trying to organize a national laboratory for research in the peaceful uses of atomic energy at what had just the day before been Camp Upton.

On March 22, 1947, there were more buildings than people at Brookhaven Lab. Some of the Lab employees had been around on the site for many years, and had only recently changed from employees of the army to employees of BNL.

Others, like Mariette Kuper, had been working for the Lab for many months before the official transfer of the site. Military titles were very much in evidence. New arrivals to the Lab were being reported in early issues of *Isotopics* as... "formerly of the Army, Coast Guard, Navy, or Marines."

The main preoccupation of most of the employees in 1947 was finding a house. Second to that was the process of congratulating other employees on engagements and marriages. Grounds maintenance crews were busy at work removing the prisoner of war enclosure with its miles of barbed wire fencing.

By September of 1947 ground had been broken for construction of "pile number one," and employees had made the transformation of the army camp into a research center.

Twenty-five years later, March 22, 1972, 190 of the pioneers were awarded VIP buttons and entertained at a party in their honor at the Brookhaven Center to reminisce and to share the memory of the many important milestones that they have experienced together since joining the BNL family.
