Budget Notes

1. Special Event . . .

Not all of the income from the Special Event is included in the above financial statement. Additional income received since May 1 amounted to \$2,160.00, making for a profit after all expenses have been paid of \$591.00 for the June Concert.

2. Ticket Services . . .

Tickets for resale are paid for when received. Income is listed after tickets are sold. The expenditure for tickets will be reduced as the various sporting seasons are underway and tickets are sold.

3. Theatre Group . . .

As usual, because of their excellent productions, the Theatre Group has shown a profit for BERA considerably larger than was anticipated.

4. Swimming Pool . . .

When the budget was drawn up it was anticipated that some admission categories would be increased. In line with the prize freeze, prices did not increase and income was not as great as was planned.

5. Clubs and Leagues . . .

Overall expenditures were generally less than budgeted sums.

BNL Hams In Emergency Test

On Saturday and Sunday, June 24-25, members of the Brookhaven National Laboratory Amateur Radio Club once more competed in the annual Field Day contest sponsored by the American Radio Relay League.

The purpose of this event is to test the preparedness of the thousands of amateur radio operators across the country to maintain emergency communications in the event commercial telephone wires and power lines were to be put out of commission by a natural disaster.

The BNL hams set up their portable communications center at the picnic area on site, drawing electricity from two gasoline powered generators to run two complete transmitting and receiving stations with three antennas. Three more receivers were used to monitor transmissions on other frequencies.

While plans for the event had been made weeks ahead of time, all this equipment was set up within a few hours on Saturday. The stations were manned around the clock from 4:00 p.m. Saturday until the end of the contest on Sunday afternoon, during which time communications were established with well over 500 amateurs in all parts of the United States and Canada.

Even as this test of emergency readiness was in progress, other hams in the areas hardest hit by the recent hurricane were still maintaining communications networks, and the BNL group stood ready to help carry messages in their behalf, as well as to assist them by keeping clear frequencies for important messages.

While the official results of the contest will not be available for several weeks, participants were unanimously of the opinion that their performance amply demonstrated the technical and communications skills needed to make amateur radio a viable part of the relief effort in any future emergency.

Club members particularly wish to thank club president Warner Hayes K2UYR and field commander Ed Hagelberg W21NT for doing the detailed planning which helped make this year's Field Day a success. Other club members participating were:

Classes are taught by professional teachers. Mrs. Karen Rowley and Mrs. Polly Carrol teach the four-year old classes and Mrs. Rene Block and Mrs. Pat Aggus teach the three-old classes. Mothers of the children participate one morning per month as teachers' "helping mothers."

From September to June from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m., two groups of eager little people will arrive at the BERA Recreation Building in the Apartment Area for the start of school. Three- and four-year old children follow programs which allow a large variety of opportunities in social activities, art, dramatic play, music, and outdoor large muscle activities. Part of the morning is reserved for a story time, juice, crackers and a brief rest. At 11:30, "car pool" parents pick up the children.
