## Lumpkin New Champion In Men's Tennis Singles

The 1973 BERA Tennis Tournament ended last Tuesday, August 29, when Alexander "Sandy" Lumpkin defeated Allan Auskern to take the Championship in the Men's Singles, 6-2, 6-1.

Sandy, who came to BNL from Johns Hopkins this past February, is a tall, rangy player with good court coverage, a high-kicking spin serve, and a marked preference for the net game. Earlier this season, when his right wrist was in a cast, he was on the tennis courts playing as a lefty. When the cast was removed, he returned to his normal right-handed game.

In the earlier rounds of the tournament, Sandy, in turn, had defeated Foley 6-0, 6-2, Brandon 6-1, 6-1, and Kevey 6-1, 6-3, all of which were rather onesided scores. Prior to the championship match it seemed that hard-hitting, left-handed Allan Auskern possessed the skills and the playing style that would cause Lumpkin to extend himself if he were to win.

Lumpkin, on service, came back from a 0-40 start to take the first game after it was twice at deuce. In the second game, Auskern started out with a 0-30 deficit, to recover and win after twice deucing the game. At this point it looked to be a close match; both players were struggling to hold service. However, Lumpkin opened the third game with a service ace and went on to win it despite a double fault which made the score 40-30. In the next game, Auskern was down 0-30 before scoring; he managed to take two points before his service was broken. In the fifth game, Lumpkin lost only one point on a double fault and made a number of points on high-kicking services to Auskern's backhand which were too hard to handle.

Auskern held service in the next game, after reaching deuce three times. The next two games and the set were Lumpkin's as he started a serve and volley game and began to take undisputed command at the net.

The first five games of the second set were all Lumpkin's. He was all over the court racing to the base line to make some great gets, following a low driving backhand to the net, and putting away overheads. Service was held by Auskern in the sixth game and Lumpkin in the seventh to end the match.

The first set lasted about 30 minutes; the second set was over within 23 minutes.

Auskern played well, except for some difficulty with return of service. He was hitting as hard as ever, but Lumpkin was hitting equally as hard and was keeping Auskern close to the base line. Since Lumpkin was able to get to the net, almost at will, the result of the match was inevitable. The better player won.
