"Forty Carats" Tickets on Sale

A new angle on the generation gap is revealed in "Forty Carats," the Broadway comedy success that's to open a four-performance engagement at the Theater on November 10, with Heather Williams (Ann) in its coveted central role. Not only an angle but also a solution. Bridge the gap by marriage. May to August and vice versa.

This is about a romance of an insistent Romeo of 22 with a lady of 40. Not a September song. An August-song, August being often the hottest month, the most-favored for vacations and other joyful occasions, the peak of the year.

The same two French playwrights, Barillet and Gredy, who wrote the comedy hit "Cactus Flower," are the authors of "Forty Carats," which has been adapted from its original Parisian version by Jay Allen.

Miss Allen, author of the remarkable play "The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie," not only translated the farce from French to English but moved its action to New York and thoroughly transported the characters across the Atlantic.

Miss Williams (Ann), (husband Brig. - Phys.) for example, is to be seen as a fashionable New York real estate agent named Ann Stanley, dealing in expensive cooperative apartments, and the man buying such an apartment from her at the beginning of the play - who is looking for a desirable candidate to share the apartment with him - is a Texas millionaire just moving to Manhattan. This is a role with surprising twists which is to be played by Charles Zavesky (Eddy Edwards), (Phys.).

David Rahm (Billy Boylan) (AGS) is playing Miss Williams' (Ann's) ex-husband but still good friend. He portrays an actor who has long shuttled between Broadway and Hollywood but also has specialized in being broke.

The character who sets off many of the hilarious situations in the comedy is the heir of a Pittsburgh steel-making family, named Peter who is played by Mike Losquadro (AMD). The play's uproariousness is cued by his being 22 and impetuously proposing marriage to Miss Williams (Ann), who owns up to forty (years? No, having "forty carats," as with a diamond, she is assured). She finds such a match absurd, impossible, ridiculous - but also very tempting.

Grace Schiro (Maud Hayes) (Phys.) is portraying Ann's socially ambitious mother, a-twitter at the eager calls at their apartment of the steel heir, which she thinks are in suitable pursuit of Ann's 17-year-old daughter (being played by Wendy Jacobson) (Father Lewis - PEP) and a-sputter when she finds it's Ann he's after. Others in the cast, who are directed by Robert Kinsey (DAS), are Lyllis Adams (husband Richard - HFBR), Jackie Kelly (former AMD), Jeanne Simone (Phys.), Manny Hillman (DAS), and Paul Alley (Phys.).

"Forty Carats" scored a 50-megaton hit when it first opened in New York at the end of 1968 and it drew the city's most stylish audiences for nearly two years until November 1970, for a total of 780 performances.
