



## Film Producer Is Thirteenth Pegram Lecturer

Colin Low, Canadian movie producer will be the next Pegram Lecturer, with a series of three illustrated lectures on November 30, December 3 and December 5 at Berkner Hall.

Mr. Low has titled the three-lecture series "The Film: An Instrument For Social Change." During the course of the lectures he will show excerpts from several documentary films made by the National Film Board of Canada.

Colin Low has been with the National Film Board since 1945 and has been instrumental in the production of many of the Board's most significant films. Probably, none of his credits, however, has earned such international acclaim as that of co-director for the spectacular *Labyrinth*, one of the key attractions at Expo '67, in Montreal.

Low was born in Cardston, Alberta. He studied at the Banff School of Fine Arts and the Calgary Institute of Technology and Art. His early days at the National Film Board brought him in working contact with Norman McLaren and the NFB's animation department.

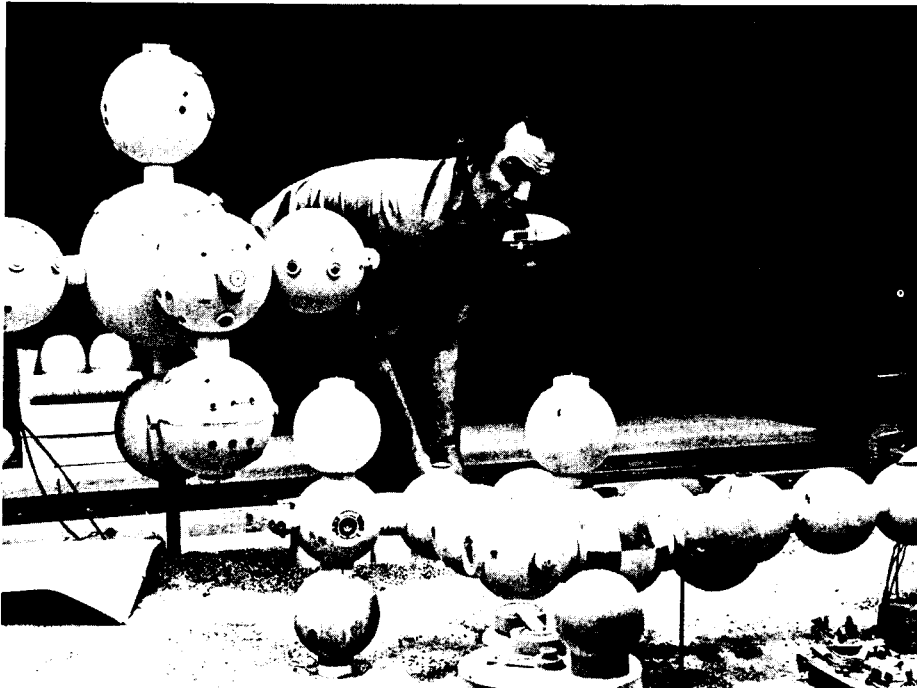
In 1950 he was appointed director of animation and directed several of the Board's most popular films in the ensuing years including such titles as *Romance of Transportation*, *City of Gold* and *Corral*.

In 1960, Low produced and co-directed *Universe*, a film which has topped all NFB records in distribution and which has taken over 24 awards in international competition. In all, Low's films have won 84 awards.

In 1967, he joined the Board's new Challenge for Change program and launched an extensive project of filming on Fogo Island, Newfoundland. The latest film to be produced in this series is *Winds of Fogo* which was completed in 1970.

Because of his work in Newfoundland, Low was invited to the post of advisor and

guest film producer with the Office of Economic Opportunity in the United States.

He worked on a film communication experiment in Farmersville, California, related to community development and was an advisor on several projects including a video experiment in relation to the White House Conference on Nutrition.

In 1970, he produced the Challenge for Change program at the National Film Board.

Recently, he has been acting as an Exec-

utive Producer for the general English program of the NFB.

This year, he was the recipient of the John Grierson award given for work in the spirit and tradition of Grierson.

## Budget Rumors Laid To Rest

Recently rumors have circulated through the Laboratory concerning drastic budget reductions. In the interest of putting these rumors to rest, we would like to give you the most recent information the Laboratory has on the status of our budget for fiscal year 1973.

On February 11, 1972, the Director sent a memorandum to all employees which expressed guarded optimism about the Laboratory's proposed budget for fiscal year 1973. He mentioned that further reviews by Congress, the Office of Management and Budget, and the AEC could have some effect on the financial support earmarked for Brookhaven. The budget at the Laboratory is not a simple one. It contains specific funds for many different research programs. From one year to the next, the funds allotted for any one of these programs can change drastically. Before the start of any fiscal year, the Laboratory plans its operating budget on the basis of a proposed allotment of funds from the AEC. Likewise, each department plans its operating budget on this basis. Since it is usually not known what the final allotment will be until nearly midway through the fiscal year (usually at about this time) the Laboratory must gauge its spending according to the proposed figures. If the allotment ultimately received is less than originally proposed, our spending during the last half of the fiscal year must be curtailed accordingly.

The situation described above is one which now faces the Laboratory. In the Laboratory's most recent budget for fiscal year 1973, the AEC has eliminated \$400,000 from the high energy physics research program, \$32,000 from the chemistry research program, \$15,000 from the mathematics research program and approximately \$80,000 from the bio-medical research program. At the same time some other programs have received modest increases. The net effect is that the total operating budget for the Laboratory has been decreased by \$283,000, or 0.6% compared with the initial level. As of this time, practically all of these reductions are expected to be absorbed by stringent economies, including normal attrition without involuntary separations.

The President's budget for fiscal year 1974 will be received sometime in February or March. Our present expectations are that FY 1974 will continue to reflect a period of austerity.

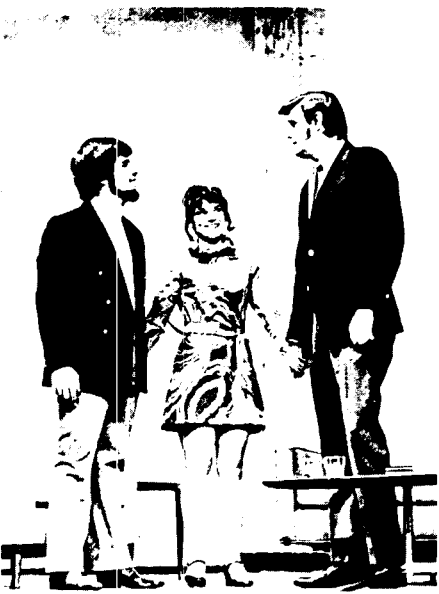

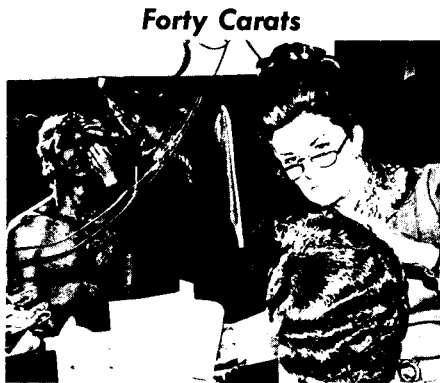
