



## Radiation Effects Is Topic Of Summer Study

The American Physical Society, which initiated a series of summer studies to improve the fundamental understanding of physical problems important to energy technologies, has chosen BNL for the site of their 1974 conference which is being held from June 17 to 28.

The goal of the present study is to overview the state of research and development in radiation effects on materials for the purpose of identifying basic scientific problems which limit progress in energy applications. The field of radiation effects on materials has applications throughout fission and fusion reactor technology; for example, fission fuel voiding and densification, reactor materials damage including void formation and swelling, helium blister and bubble formation and high energy neutron effects in CTR technology, as well as nuclear transmutation and alloying of reactor materials. These practical problems involve changes which reactors and reactor materials will undergo throughout their projected lifetimes of several decades.

The results of the study will be given in the form of two reports. The first will be a written report for APS which will identify promising lines of future investigation and give practical recommendations for coupling university research to the nation's radiation effects problems. An oral report will also be given to the members of the APS to educate them in the ways in which their own talents can contribute.

50 experts in this field are involved in this intensive study. These scientists represent leading universities, government and industrial laboratories active in such research. This summer session also involves the support of several junior academic persons at the postdoctorate and junior faculty level. Alan Goland of BNL's Physics Department assisted F.L. Vook of Sandia Laboratories on the coordination of this valuable study.

## Group Examines Lab's Impact

Brookhaven National Laboratory is assisting the Atomic Energy Commission in the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement.

The draft statement will examine, in detail, the present and continuing impact of BNL on the physical and socio-economic environment of Suffolk County. It will consider the impact of past operations insofar as they have a continuing effect on the environment, the impact of present operations and the anticipated impact of future changes in the Laboratory's program as far as they can be predicted.

The draft statement will also consider the benefits that have resulted from the scientific programs at the Lab and their interplay with universities and other scientific institutions. Also to be examined are the socio-economic effects, including employment derived from the Lab; the Lab's effect on local tax revenues; impacts on cultural activities and interactions with local government.

The date set for the completion of the draft statement is December 1, 1974. It will then be circulated for review to Federal, State and Local Government Agencies as

well as interested public organizations and individuals in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act. The comments received on the draft will be considered in the preparation of the final statement.

Comments and suggestions from the public should be submitted to Dr. James L. Liverman, Assistant General Manager for Biomedical and Environmental Research and Safety Programs, U.S. Atomic Energy Commission, Washington, D.C. 20545.

At Brookhaven, the project will be managed by Leonard C. Emma who was transferred to the project from the Division of Health Physics & Safety. Associate Director Victor P. Bond has assumed overall responsibility for the project. Between 20 and 30 people in various departments on site will serve as consultants during the preparation of the draft statement. Frederick P. Cowan, formerly head of the Health Physics Division, is being employed as a consultant on a part time basis. Toward the end of the project, J.B.H. Kuper, Assistant to the Director, will play a major editorial role in putting the draft statement together.

The physical impact of Lab operations will be handled by Edwin J. Tuthill of Environmental Management Consultants. The Lab operations with respect to land use will be examined by Ferdinand Shore, Professor of Physics at Queens College. Approximately six to eight people from outside the Lab will be brought in from time to time on a consulting basis for the project. This summer, three students working on their masters degrees at SUNY at Stony Brook and two Urban Affairs faculty advisors will be involved in the socio-economic impact of BNL for the draft statement.

Temporary offices have been set up in the Administration Building for the duration of the Environmental Impact Statement Project. The final statement is expected to be completed within a year.

## Here They Come Now! Summer Arrives At BNL

More accurate than the calendar date of June 21, the beginning of summer at BNL is marked by the arrival of our summer students. This year, the 23rd Summer Student Program began on Monday, June 17th, and will continue for 9 weeks, ending on August 23rd.

From the 442 applications received, 59 students were chosen to participate based upon their academic performance and letters of recommendation. Arrivals came from as far away as the University of Puerto Rico and as close as SUNY at Stony Brook.

The students began reporting in at BNL on Sunday, June 16 and by noon Monday all had gone through processing, aided skillfully by Dr. Glenn Price, Mrs. Betty Lutz and Mrs. Virginia Bowman. After their initial orientation the students were sent to their various departments. 10 students were assigned to the Accelerator Department, 4 to Applied Math, 8 to Applied Science, 8 to the Biology Department, 5 to Chemistry, 1 to the Director's Office, 2 to Health Physics and Safety, 2 to the Instrumentation Department, 10 to the Medical Department and 9 to Physics. Most are

juniors and seniors and as many as 22 are 1974 graduates.

In addition to the required safety lecture there are three scheduled tours of the Lab. Also, these summer students will be the first since 1964 to enjoy the festivities of the BNL Picnic.

Funds for this year's Summer Program were provided by a grant from the Division of Nuclear Education and Training, United States Atomic Energy Commission. The students receive a stipend of \$100 per week and are reimbursed for travel expenses.
