## Concert Features Virtuoso Duos

The Sea Cliff Chamber Players will present the second of their series of Saturday night concerts in Berkner Hall on November 19 at 8 P.M.

The program of "virtuoso duos" features Hamao Fujiwara, violin, a prize winner in both the Paganini and Queen Elizabeth international competitions; Kim Kashkashian, viola, a frequent participant in the Marlboro Music Festival; Hakuro Mori, cello, solo cellist with the Juillard Theatre Orchestra; and Barbara Speer, piano, who has given solo and chamber music performances in Carnegie Recital Hall, Lincoln Center and Town Hall.

The program will consist of Schubert's Sonata for Arpeggione and Piano presented in its viola and piano version by Kashkashian and Speer, the Saint-Saens Sonata in D minor for violin and piano, the Chopin Polonaise Brillante for cello and piano, and the Ravel Sonata for Violin and Cello, probably the most dazzling piece written for this combination of instruments.

Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$4 for students. Note the 8 P.M. starting time.
