IBEW Wage Scales Ratified

On July 17, 1980, the members of IBEW Local 2230 ratified new wage rates effective October 1, 1979, and August 4, 1980, respectively.

Under the existing contract between the Laboratory and the Union, when new Presidential guidelines were announced that permitted increases in excess of one percent per year over those provided in the contract, the Union was authorized to renegotiate the contract rates.

In the negotiations, the Laboratory offered an additional 1 percent increase effective October 1, 1979 (for a total of 9 percent increase from the July 31, 1979 level), and an addition-

al 2 percent increase effective August 4, 1980 (for a total increase of 8 percent). The Union did not agree, and informed the Atomic Energy Labor Management Relations Panel of the impasse. After a hearing in New York City on June 28, 1980, the AELMRP recommended a settlement which called for an additional 1½ percent wage increase effective October 1, 1979 (for a total of 9½ percent increase from the July 31, 1979 level), and effective August 4, 1980, an additional 2 percent wage increase (for a total increase of 8 percent).

This settlement was ratified by the IBEW Local 2230 membership.

New Dating Method Scores

About 120 years ago, the American explorer Charles F. Hall stumbled across an unusual find in the southern reaches of Baffin Island. Along the remote coast of Frobisher Bay, his party uncovered an oblong chunk of iron, weighing about 25 pounds. It was identified as a bloom – a raw, unworked mass of iron – and for safe keeping, given to the Smithsonian Institution. Although it was thought to be of Norse origin, no one was sure.

Years passed and the bloom sat, still mysterious, in the Smithsonian's archives. Conventional radiocarbon dating was impossible, because the carbon content – which comes from charcoal used in smelting – was only .05 percent, much too low to provide a datable sample.

Then in 1976, the Smithsonian's Jacqueline Olin informally mentioned the bloom to BNL chemists Garman Harbottle and Ray Stoenner. With Ed Sayre, they had been interested in low-level counting as an outgrowth of Chemistry's neutrino experiments, which demand ultra-low level counting of argon-37.

"We had been thinking for a long time," says Harbottle, "that some of the solar neutrino experiment technology could be applied to carbon-14 dating on a small scale, that is, using very tiny samples of carbon-14."

With funding Olin obtained from the Smithsonian, the BNL team began developing a small scale gas proportional counter, one that could date very small C-14 samples, or objects with very low carbon contents.

Extending Technology

Radiocarbon dating involves measuring the relative carbon-14 in (1) present-day organic matter and (2) the sample under investigation, and multiplying the logarithm of this ratio by the rate at which the C-14 decays. The new counters differ from older ones in that they use C-14 in the CO₂ form at higher pressures – four atmospheres – so the counter must be operated at higher voltage.

"This brought about problems usually associated with electronics at high voltages," says Stoenner, "Also, the CO₂ had to be pure, free from electronegative impurities, so the first year or so we devoted to working the bugs out of the electrical, and cleaning up the CO₂."

Early in 1978, the counters were first tested with known samples of sequoia redwood. Results came up remarkably close: samples dated by tree-ring to be between 31-37 B.C. yielded a radiocarbon date of 32 A.D. ±190. The following year, the Chemistry team dated the Frobisher iron to be 1158 ±107 and 1271 ±133, which is interpreted as 12th Century. Olin said further studies, possibly field archeology, would be needed to corroborate the radiocarbon date.

Two Approaches

Simultaneous with work at BNL, researchers elsewhere devised radiocarbon dating methods using Van de Graaff accelerators. Both accelerators and small-scale counters can measure C-14 activity in samples hundreds of times smaller than conventional means, but the similarity ends there.

Small-scale counters require almost no labor once started up, al-

though they take about 70 days to date a sample. "They work very slowly," Harbottle said, "but require little attention – they just sit there and click away."

A counter costs \$515, plus \$40,000 - \$50,000 for accessory electronics and gas purification equipment, which Stoenner noted are usually stock items in radiocarbon labs.

Accelerators are labor and energy intensive, rank in the million dollar range and, like conventional radiocarbon methods, give same day results. Accelerators, moreover, can date even smaller carbon-14 samples. General Ionex, Inc. a Newburyport, Massachusetts firm, recently dated a 200 microgram sample, 50 times smaller than the small-scale counter minimum.

Commercial Popularity

Harbottle and Stoenner are quick to point out they're not in the small-scale counter business, although the instruments have been in demand since an article on them appeared in *Science* a year ago. All counters, Stoenner said, are sold at cost.

The biggest buyer to date is Harwell, the English research institution which does radiocarbon dating for a fee, and has arranged to buy sixteen of the counters. "They reckon," says Harbottle, "they'll be able to turn out about 250 samples a year, since they'll have so many counters going at once."

Weekend Tour

The teachers are professionals in early childhood education, and are assisted in each class by a parent or teacher's assistant. Children attend school two or three mornings a week. The classes provide a varied and stimulating program including art, music, outdoor activities and field trips.

Fledgling Scientists At Lab



This summer is not a vacation for 30 minority high school students who are involved with a research apprenticeship program at the Lab. They are studying physics, biology, chemistry and engineering with three local high school teachers and doing special projects with BNL scientists. Arthur Pitschi, one of the teachers, included in his biology classes a discussion about ultraviolet light and skin cancer.

Building 184 has undergone several transformations during the course of the Lab's history, from a chapel to a theater. This summer it has been turned into a classroom for high school students.

Under DOE sponsorship, Brookhaven is hosting 30 high school students from Suffolk County in an intensive eight-week program. The first group of 15 students will be here the month of July and the second group will come in August.

The summer Apprenticeship Program for Minority High School Students is intended to foster an early interest in science, mathematics, and engineering careers among minority students. In today's highly technical society, the training and employment of youth in these areas is of high national priority, and various Federal agencies and departments in addition to DOE are conducting such programs.

The students will be entering 10th and 11th grades in the fall, and were

chosen by their schools for this program on the basis of demonstrated ability or interest in science. Final selections were made by BNL staff.

Their days at BNL are full. Following a curriculum designed by Janet Hoefling, Program Coordinator, they spend time in class learning about basic scientific concepts, and they visit BNL facilities related to particular topics under discussion. They also take field trips off site to four other research labs, engineering firms and colleges.

Classroom instruction is done by three local high school teachers recruited for the program. But BNL staff members from various scientific departments volunteer their time and knowledge to help make concepts learned in the classroom come alive in the laboratory.

William Lynch, who teaches 12th grade Regents Physics at Patchogue-Medford High School during the school year, said, "In addition to all the fancy machines, Brookhaven has

tremendous human resources." Lynch teaches the physics classes, and during the week they spent with him, the students visited various accelerator facilities on site, talked to scientists about their research, and even did an experiment with Albert Hanson at the 3 MV Van de Graaff.

Besides physics, the students also study biology, chemistry and engineering, with math incorporated into all areas. Biology and engineering is being taught by Arthur Pitschi of Patchogue-Medford High School, and Clayton Hudson, a teacher at Central Islip High School, is giving the chemistry classes.

For most of the students, this program gives them a way to test their interest in science. Paul Certo, a student at Central Islip Senior High School, had been thinking about a career in physics, and his experience here has made him even more enthusiastic. Shevon Ivey, Wyandanch Memorial High School, wants to explore all areas of science before choosing a major, and Lawrence McCullough, Bayport-Blue Point High School, is now thinking about switching from journalism to science. McCullough said, "It's such a vast field, that I think there will be good opportunities to get a job."

Some of the students were not too familiar with the Lab before getting involved with the program. Alethea Futch, Riverhead High School, was impressed by the people, equipment and campus-like atmosphere. Surprised at what BNL offers, Susan Quarterman, Sachem South High School, commented, "This is a really good program. It gives minority students a better chance."

All of the students agree on something that is probably fundamental to all scientists. They think science is fun.
