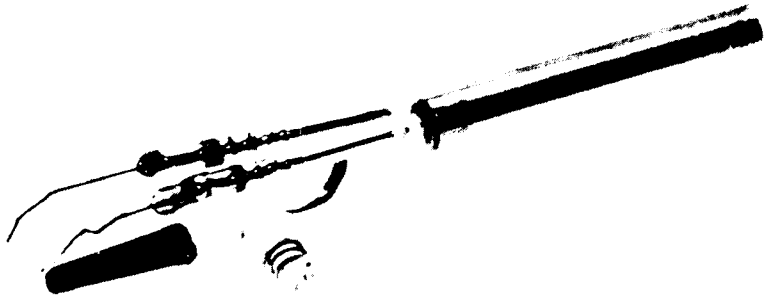




To date a sample, carbon dioxide gas is made from organic material in the sample. The CO₂ gas is then put into the glass tube (right half of counter), and beta particle emissions are detected and counted. From end to end, the counter measures eight inches.

Counting The Treasure

In mid-December, last year, Sotheby's of London auctioned at £500,000 a seventh century gold treasure from the Second Avar Period (circa 650-700 A.D.). It had been authenticated by carbon-14 dating, using a small counter developed at Brookhaven Lab.

The counter was developed in 1979 by Garman Harbottle, Edward Sayre and Raymond Stoenner, scientists in BNL's Chemistry Department. Sixteen counters were sold at cost to the Atomic Energy Research Authority at Harwell, England. Making the first commercial use of the counter, Harwell confirmed Sotheby's dating of the gold treasure at about 700 A.D., consistent with available historical evidence.

According to information supplied by Harwell and Sotheby's, the treasure is made up of 122 gold and silver belt fittings and two Byzantine silver plates from the Avar Period. In the sixth century, the Avar tribe swept into Europe from Inner Mongolia, dominating Eastern Europe. They were legendary hoarders of gold and silver, and they extracted annual tribute from their neighbors. In the year 570, for example, they received the equivalent of over 1,000 pounds of gold from the Byzantine Emperor.

The Avars were finally subjugated and converted to Christianity in 796. But remains of their culture have been found in over a thousand sites throughout Eastern Europe. The exact findspot of the recently auctioned treasure is unknown, however, there are many reasons to connect it to a hoard found at Vrapin Albania around 1902. Most of the Vrap treasure is now

in the Metropolitan Museum in New York.

Both hoards have pieces which are closely related in style and decoration. One gold mount in the Vrap discovery is identical to six in the Sotheby treasure, and they are the only Avar mounts of this type known.

The belt is believed to have played a symbolic role as a badge of rank in Avar society, with details of design as well as the materials used being pointers to the status of the wearer and his membership of a particular clan.

Fibrous materials, identified as flax, were found on the belt fittings, and a 300-milligram sample was used for analysis by the Brookhaven counter, which can date objects with very low carbon content.

Carbon-14 occurs naturally in atmospheric carbon dioxide. As such, it is continuously absorbed in minute quantities by all living organisms, animal and vegetable. After death, when the carbon monoxide is no longer absorbed, the residual carbon-14 slowly decays with a half life of 5,730 years. By counting the beta particle emissions from the decaying carbon-14, any object or material originally derived from organic matter can be dated.

Up to now, the use of very small samples has been prohibited by difficulties in operating the counter over long periods and in eliminating natural background radiation.

The small counters pioneered at Brookhaven need only about 10 milligrams of extracted carbon for a sample measurement.

Davis And Samios Elected To NAS

Earlier this week, the National Academy of Sciences recognized the significant contributions of two Brookhaven scientists. Senior Chemist Raymond Davis, Jr. and Acting Director Nicholas P. Samios were elected to the Academy on Tuesday, April 27.

With the addition of 60 new members, including Samios and Davis, the total membership in the National Academy of Sciences will be 1,386. The scientists and engineers in this private organization are dedicated to the furtherance of science and its use for the general welfare. An 1863 Congressional Act of Incorporation, signed by Abraham Lincoln, established the Academy and calls upon it to act as an official advisor to the federal government, upon request, in any matter of science or technology.

Raymond Davis came to BNL's Chemistry Department in 1948 and was named Senior Chemist in 1964. His distinguished career has been spent in radiochemistry, with an emphasis on astronomy. In 1963 he began a pioneering study of neutrinos directed towards measuring the flux of neutrinos from the sun. The findings have stimulated an enormous amount of research in astrophysics and nuclear physics, forcing scientists to re-evaluate some basic assumptions underlying the whole theoretical framework of stellar evolution.

For his work, Davis was awarded the Cyrus B. Comstock Prize by the National Academy of Sciences in April 1978 and named the 1979 winner of the American Chemical Society Award for Nuclear Applications in Chemistry. In 1954, he shared the New York Academy of Sciences' Pregl Prize with Oliver Schaeffer.

Nicholas Samios is well-known for his many vital contributions to the field of high energy particle physics — particularly his discoveries of the Omega minus particle and the first charmed baryon. These have played an important role in untangling symmetries underlying the particle spectrum. For his work, Samios was named a winner of the 1980 E.O. Lawrence Award. The same year, he also received the New York Academy of Sciences Award in Physical and Mathematical Sciences.

Samios joined the BNL Physics Department in 1959 and served as leader of the Omega Group from 1965-1975, when he was named Department Chairman. In February 1981, he became Deputy Director for High Energy and Nuclear Physics. His appointment as Acting Director of BNL was effective January 1, 1982.

Accel. Workshop Here Next Week

An international group of attendees will meet at Brookhaven May 3 through May 6 for a "Workshop on Accelerator Orbit and Particle Tracking Programs." The workshop will focus on computer programs which simulate the behavior of protons, electrons and other atomic particles in accelerators and storage rings. Simulation programs of this type are being used at all major laboratories for the design and operation of accelerators.

The majority of the workshop's sessions will be concerned with the simulation of non-linear magnetic effects and their influence on beam lifetimes in storage rings. A session on software tools useful for the design and implementation of these programs is also planned.

Energy Analysts Look Ahead

First there was OPEC. And then came IEA. The International Energy Agency, IEA, was formed soon after the oil boycott of 1973. Its main purpose was to help member nations cope with oil price rises and interruption of oil supplies.

Brookhaven's involvement with IEA began in 1976 when two laboratories, BNL and Germany's KFA, were selected to do energy analysis work. Vance Sailor was co-director of the cooperative international project, housed at BNL in the National Center for Analysis of Energy Systems.

More recently, KFA has been designated the coordinator of the project, with Stefan Rath-Nagel in charge. A small Brookhaven team, headed by Douglas Hill, is still actively involved.

Hill explained that the energy analysis is done with the aid of a computer model, MARKAL, which was developed early on by scientists at BNL and KFA. The model is used to represent energy systems of partici-

pating countries — there is a U.S. case, a Swedish case, and so on.

Each country works with its own data base, and the model can accommodate each country's special characteristics. For example, the U.S. is rich in energy resources, in sharp contrast to Japan, which has almost none. And Germany has little solar figured into its energy picture — too cloudy there.

To run the model, assumptions are put in; for example, oil prices and energy demand. Then the model sifts through massive amounts of data, crunches through the calculations, and spits out a scenario, 45 years into the future. The first computer runs by each country were done beginning in 1978.

This week, representatives of 13 member countries, including the U.S., most of western Europe, Canada and Japan, met at BNL for a workshop. There, several countries presented preliminary results of computer runs

BNL Council Report

Outgoing chairman, Jack Van't Hof, reports that during the past year the Council's major effort was the review of individuals nominated for tenure by the scientific departments. Also, because of the current status of funding at the Laboratory, the Council was involved in procedures concerning the termination of individuals holding scientific appointments. As stated in the Scientific Staff Manual, the Council is to be consulted when terminations resulting from financial exigency or major program changes are effected prematurely. Van't Hof says the loss of staff members is viewed as a serious problem to the Laboratory and the Council is

continuing discussions on this matter with the Laboratory's directorship. Frequent meetings were held with the Assistant Director for Scientific Personnel to explore and develop means by which the Laboratory can attract and retain people who are assets to research programs. The Council also expressed an interest in the health of the Research Library recognizing that it is an indispensable element in the production of quality work. On other matters, the Council was instrumental in providing SRA options to all Laboratory employees, in increasing AUI scholarship stipends, and in improving benefits for families of deceased employees.

done in 1982, with new assumptions. Hill reported on the U.S. runs. His assumptions were, first, the projected demand for energy has been greatly reduced, and second, oil prices over the long run are much higher than expected a few years ago. He also looked at a short-term drop in oil prices, which is what the U.S. is experiencing now. "What's the cheapest thing this country can do now?" said Hill. "According to the computer results, we should import oil and not put as much money into energy conservation measures." But Hill also pointed out that the price of oil does not reflect some intangible costs, like dependence on foreign oil and vulnerability to sudden reductions in supply. "If one is willing to spend a little more money, what can be done to reduce imports?" he asked. His computer runs point favorably to an import oil surcharge. "While prices are down, we could tax oil imports and use the money to offset other taxes. That would take into account some of these non-market considerations."

Hill said there is no simple, single answer to energy problems. They are systems problems, and the complexity of putting all the pieces together the best way takes careful analysis and lots of computer help. Representatives from many of the member nations in IEA do their computer work at KFA, and a few countries have had the finances to duplicate the MARKAL model at home. But occasionally, representatives come to BNL to use the model or to learn how to use it on their home CDC computer. Most recently, Gunnar Leman, Sweden, and Tom Kram, Netherlands, were at BNL to work on computer runs, staying on to participate in the workshop. Leman said a major change for Sweden was a 1980 referendum on nuclear energy, which led to a parliamentary decision to phase out nuclear energy by the year 2010.

Kram said the Netherlands has large reserves of natural gas. People in his country used to feel that the natural gas should be used up quickly before cheap nuclear power came on line. "All that has changed," he said. "We are now phasing out exports, trying to keep the natural gas at home for residential and commercial use and premium use in the chemical industry." As the gas runs out, the country will gradually shift to imported coal, much cheaper than indigenous coal, which is too deep underground to mine cheaply. "While each country has unique problems, the extent to which this international group communicates is surprising," says Doug Hill. "The workshops are productive, with great exchange of ideas and information." Other BNL people involved with the IEA energy analysis project are Leslie Fishbone, who worked on the original MARKAL model, and Gary Goldstein, computer programmer. Also helping with the programming are Joan Congeni and Chip Balzer. Liz Seubert is secretary for the group. — Mona S. Rowe

Whither Nuclear Power?

Richard Lester, a young Englishman with a solid background in nuclear engineering and a strong interest in international nuclear relations, will present a Lab-wide colloquium on May 12 at 3:30 p.m. in Berkner Hall. He will speak on "The Nuclear Power Problem: Interregnum or Irreversible Decline?" Lester received a B.Sc. degree in Chemical Engineering from Imperial College, London, in 1974 and a Ph.D. in Nuclear Engineering from M.I.T. in 1979. From 1977-78 he was a Visiting Fellow in International Relations at the Rockefeller Foundation. He is currently an Associate Professor of Nuclear Engineering at M.I.T. and a Research Associate at the Institute's Center for International Studies. He also chairs the School of Engineering's Committee on Energy Education. His research and teaching interests include radioactive waste management and disposal, international nuclear relations, and energy technology assessment and policy analysis. Lester has been to Brookhaven before. In fact, he spent the summer of 1975 as a Visiting Research Assistant in what was then the Department of Applied Science. A reception at 3 p.m. will precede the lecture.

I grant you that most people, including those who are normally left-handed in everything else, do indeed finger with the left and bow with the right, except for my oldest son David. When he was eight years old, he broke his left arm. When it healed, he had only about 80% rotation in it — not enough to enable him to finger a violin. His teacher saw no problem at all and simply restrung the violin so that he could finger it with his right hand. It worked out fine, except that it caused some seating problems in an orchestra, and it certainly made the orchestra look silly.
