RHIC Has Successful DOE Review

Every detail of BNL's proposed Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) underwent intense scrutiny during a Project Review conducted at the Lab by the Department of Energy (DOE) from May 20-22.

When the three days were over, the efforts of scores of people in the Accelerator Development (ADD), Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) and Physics Departments were deemed well worth it. The RHIC Project Review had gone well. Edward Temple, the Director of the Division of Construction, Environment and Safety in DOE's Office of Energy Research and Chairman of the review team, had indicated that a very capable RHIC team had put together a well-developed conceptual design in all

technical areas.

said, "I am extremely happy with the positive reception the DOE has given to the RHIC proposal."

Paul Reardon, former BNL Associate Director for High Energy Facilities and now on leave to Scientific Applications, Inc., was extremely pleased with the thoroughness of the presentations. "This was a difficult review," he noted, "but the results were certainly worth the effort."

"This was a big and essential step forward, and we are very pleased," added ADD Chairman Eric Forsyth. "If RHIC is approved, letters of intent for experiments will be solicited in February 1988 and evaluated, so work can begin to bring detectors on line at the same time that RHIC is finished."

As proposed by BNL, construction for the RHIC project will take five years, beginning in FY 1989 and ending in September 1993. In FY 1988 dollars, the total project cost will be \$329.9 million. Of that amount, about 70% will go towards research and development (R&D) and construction of the collider itself, 25% towards R&D and construction of detectors and 5% towards initial start-up.

Bringing RHIC from the drawing board to start-up will require a great deal of accelerator physics. Calling it "a sign of our increasing commitment to this area," Forsyth announced that, as of June 1, ADD's Accelerator Physics Division will be headed by Allesandro Ruggiero, formerly of Argonne National Laboratory.

In addition to Edward Temple, the DOE review team included David Hendrie, Director of the Division of Nuclear Physics, as well as representatives of DOE's Chicago Operations Office and Brookhaven Area Office. BNL's technical presentations were also reviewed by consultants from

other laboratories with expertise in areas ranging from construction to cryogenics.

Describing the review process, Forsyth said, "It was a huge effort. We had to present details right down to the engineers' notebook and cost estimates for every component in RHIC. On the spot, we had to provide secretarial reports and write computer programs to perform cost analyses. And the sessions were long. Thursday's finally ended shortly after midnight."

One highlight of the review came on Friday, when testing was completed on the second prototype RHIC magnet manufactured by Brown, Boverie & Cie of West Germany. Like its predecessor tested in April, the 9.7-meterlong superconducting magnet easily exceeded its magnetic field operating requirements. Forsyth recalled that, in his review summation, Temple made very positive comments about BNL's expertise in making superconducting magnets.

RHIC: What's in a Name?

What is a Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider? That question can be answered by looking at the words that make up the acronym RHIC:

- Relativistic describes something traveling near the speed of light—in this case heavy ions.
- Ions are atoms that have lost or gained one or more circulating electrons. Heavy ions are so called because their nuclei contain many protons and neutrons.
- A collider is an accelerator in which two beams of particles circulate in opposite directions, smashing together at various points around the ring.

In RHIC, then, two beams of ions, which could be as heavy as gold nuclei, will zip around a ring almost 2.5 miles in circumference, colliding at six points. The colliding ions will have a combined energy of 200 billion electron volts per nucleon (GeV/n).

This immense energy is expected to create conditions never before observed. In fact, nuclear matter probably only existed at these temperatures and densities in the moments that immediately followed the creation of the universe.

Such nuclear matter is often called "quark-gluon plasma," which refers to the expected jumble of fundamental particles called quarks and binding particles called gluons. Both nuclear and high energy physicists are interested in recreating these conditions and investigating the nature of quark-gluon plasma, which explains why RHIC is a high priority for both communities.

If RHIC is funded, it will be the only machine in the world to collide two beams of heavy ions at ultra-relativistic energies. No other accelerator today can approach RHIC's proposed energies or ability to accelerate the heavier ions.

A Chain of Accelerators

RHIC will be the biggest link in a chain of BNL accelerators that includes the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS). The transformation of the AGS from purely a proton synchrotron to a hybrid that can also accelerate heavy ions began in October 1984. That's when ground was broken for a transfer line that now links the Tandem Van de Graaff accelerator, which generates the heavy ions, with the AGS. It is the AGS that has the capability of accelerating these ions to energies as high as 15 GeV/n. At the AGS, experiments with oxygen ions began last October and with silicon in March.


The Tandem and the AGS are the first working links in the chain of BNL accelerators that are needed to provide RHIC experimenters with heavy ions. Construction began in 1985 on the next link, a Booster for the AGS. When completed in 1990, the Booster will allow the AGS to accelerate all the heavy ion species the Tandem can generate.

While the addition of the Booster is sure to provide exciting physics at the AGS, it is also another step closer to RHIC. Once the AGS is accelerating ions as heavy as gold, it can be used as an injector for RHIC.

Over 1,600 superconducting magnets of different types must be built to do the jobs of guiding and focusing the heavy ions on their journey around RHIC. To keep the four accelerator links in this chain functioning as one strong unit will require some 230 people involved in all facets of operating the complex.

Much of the construction for RHIC is already done. The ring that will contain the beam lines, the experimental areas, the refrigeration system to provide cooling for the superconducting magnets, the Collider Center that now houses the Accelerator Development Department (ADD) — all were constructed for the Colliding Beam Accelerator (CBA), on which work ceased in 1983.

The joining of these existing facilities from CBA and the other links of the accelerator chain at BNL will produce RHIC, which BNL first proposed to the Department of Energy (DOE) in 1984. Now, as ADD Chairman Eric Forsyth points out, "By indicating that RHIC will probably be included in its budget plan for fiscal year 1989, DOE is acknowledging that a major accelerator complex for heavy ions can be a reality at Brookhaven in much less time and for much less money than would be possible for comparable facilities anywhere else."

LEGS Reaches Second Milestone

The first spectrum of a monochromatic beam was recorded at the Laser Electron Gamma Source (LEGS) on beam line X5 of the x-ray ring of the National Synchrotron Light Source at 9:15 p.m. on Wednesday, June 28. This spectrum is proof that gamma ray energies up to 300 million electron volts (MeV) can be selected according to need.

This is the second milestone reached within a week, in establishing LEGS as a medium energy nuclear physics facility, to provide intense monochromatic and polarized gamma rays with energies up to 500 MeV.

To produce the 300 MeV gamma rays of this first spectrum, laser light

was scattered off of x-ray ring electrons. The electrons gave up energy to the ultraviolet laser photons, transforming them to gamma rays in a process called Compton backscattering. The upper plot shows the "backscattered spectrum" of gamma rays, which is continuous up to 300 MeV. The lower spectrum was obtained by simultaneously detecting the lowered energy electrons and using them to "tag" gamma rays at 300 MeV.

LEGS is being developed by collaborators in BNL's Physics Department; from Frascati National Laboratory, Italy, including Physicist Franco Giordano, Aldo Cecchetti, Enzo Cima, Valerio Lollo and Ennio Turi; and from the University of Rome, including Physicist Carlo Schaerf, Franco Basti and Luigi Ruggieri.

BNL's Fabulous Forty

This is the seventh in a series of interviews with employees who observe their 40th service anniversaries during 1987, BNL's 40th anniversary year.

"The police said we could sleep in the jail, if we liked — but we took one look and got back out in the snow to the trucks!"

Charles Gargliardo, a driver in the Staff Services Division, was remembering the great 1947 snowstorm, when two or three trailer loads of BNL exhibits about the Lab's work on peaceful uses of atomic energy had to be driven up to Connecticut.

"We'd started out at about eight in the morning," he recalled. "The weather was bad, but we went on, over the 59th Street Bridge, through the Bronx, then along Gun Hill Road and up U.S. 1. I think we were the only ones on the road. We finally arrived at midnight in over a foot of snow — and that's when we got the offer of a bed in jail. But we preferred the trucks!"

That night was not the only one that Gargliardo spent in a snow-bound truck on behalf of the Lab. Some years later, he was coming back from Denver after picking up experimental equipment being returned to BNL. He was alone, and during the difficult journey, he had to shovel the truck out of endless snowdrifts. For one whole night he was forced to a standstill, with the engine running to keep from freezing.

"That was bad enough," Gargliardo said. "Then, next morning, the water pump went, somewhere near Pittsburgh! But I got lucky — there was a tow truck just down the road, and a motel run by a guy from Yaphank! Soon I was back on my way to BNL."

Gargliardo's start at the Lab site began during Camp Upton days, when he drove as a civilian for the Army for about eight months. "Then came the Manhattan Project, then BNL," he said. "I stayed on and got life number 482. We moved everything out here from Columbia University—equipment, boxes of security reports and Mrs. [Mariette] Kuper's office! Of course there was no Long

Island Expressway then. It was Jericho Turnpike [Rt. 25] all the way."

In those early days, there was no housing on site, and the drivers helped newly arrived staff find a home and move in. "At that time you got to know every single person around," said Gargliardo. "But it's still a very friendly place to work, even though there are so many more people."

Among the people Gargliardo has driven have been all the different Lab directors and many presidents of Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI). "Also, we meet the scientists at the airports and train for symposiums and conferences," he said.

Gargliardo is proud of the BNL drivers' record of getting to the train or plane on time. "We have the advantage of the cars being well maintained," he said. "If there's any problem, the Lab's Motorpool Automotive Shop fixes it. That lets us do a good job."

One time that it was especially necessary for the Lab car to run well was when Lloyd Berkner, who was President of AUI from 1951 to 1960, had a 9 p.m. train to catch in New Jersey.

"He was going to a very important meeting," said Gargliardo. "Otherwise we would never have started. There was such thick fog, you could barely see one car length ahead. I drove as quickly as possible, but it was quite a strain. After we were about halfway, Dr. Berkner insisted on getting into the driver's seat. Your eyes will get tired—it's my turn now!' he said. He drove on, and we made it!"

One historically interesting drive that stays in Gargliardo's memory was collecting the first load of graphite for the reactor. "Most of the graphite came in by train," he said. "But as I remember it, the first load was the one we picked up from Champagne, Illinois. On the return journey, we had to back the trailer into the place we had been assigned for the night. I stepped out into the road to hold up the traffic — and the first driver I spoke to turned out to be an old buddy from the Navy. That was a nice surprise."

The surprises on the job have kept Gargliardo happy to be driving at BNL for over forty years. "It's a good place to work," he said. "The changes over the years have never changed that."
