

## BNL Captures 13th R&D 100 Award

For the thirteenth time, BNL has captured an R&D 100 Award in the prestigious, annual contest sponsored by *Research and Development* magazine recognizing the top 100 technological achievements of the year.

Nine physicists and engineers at the National Synchrotron Light Source (NSLS) shared the honor for their coinvention of a real-time harmonic closed-orbit feedback system.

The collaborators are: Li-Hua Yu, Richard Biscardi, John Bittner, Eva Bozoki, John Galayda, Samuel Krinsky, Roman Nawrocky, Om Singh and Gaetano Vignola.

The award was presented to Yu and Krinsky last night, at an R&D 100 awards dinner in Chicago.

The award-winning system was devised for the NSLS x-ray and vacuum ultraviolet (VUV) rings to stabilize the orbit of the electron

beam as it circulates around the synchrotron. A prototype has been installed and tested in the VUV ring.

Though different feedback systems exist at other synchrotron light sources, only BNL's real-time harmonic closed-orbit feedback system at the NSLS corrects the orbit around the entire ring in real time. As a result, the NSLS inventors anticipate that their system will be installed at electron storage rings around the world.

A synchrotron is a large ring in which electrons circulate in a fixed, closed orbit. As the electron beam is bent around the storage ring by magnets, the electrons emit what is called synchrotron radiation — infrared through x-ray light that is useful as a scientific probe.

Though the electron beam's orbit is very stable, it can move by as much as 200 microns, or twice the thickness of a human hair. Though this fluctuation in the beam's position seems small, it does affect the intensity of the synchrotron light that is intercepted by a sample — and, hence, the experimental results that come from using this light.

During the operation of the real-time harmonic closed-orbit feedback system, the electron beam moves up and down only 50 to 60 microns — making it almost 400 percent more stable.

To produce this stability, the system uses four detectors located around the storage ring, collecting signals on beam position. In real time, these position signals are changed into analog signals proportional to the main spatial harmonic components of the orbit distortion. The output signals are then used to correct the orbit around the ring.

## Brown to Coordinate Women's Programs

Virginia H. Brown has been named by Laboratory Director Nicholas Samios as BNL's fourth Women's Program Coordinator. On October 1, Brown will assume the position from the current Women's Program Coordinator Avril Woodhead.

The position of Women's Program Coordinator was established in 1975 to ensure that the Laboratory develops policies and programs that respond to the special needs of its women employees. As a part of the Employee Relations Program, the Women's Program Coordinator is also another person to whom employees can bring their work-related problems to be resolved as promptly and fairly as possible.

With the change in personnel comes a change in the organizational position: The Women's Program Coordinator will now work through BNL's Affirmative Action Office, reporting to the Assistant to the Director for Affirmative Action, Glenn Jennings.

### Ready to Meet the Challenge

"Having the Women's Coordinator as part of the Lab's affirmative action effort was one of my goals since I arrived here in May," says Jennings. "Consolidated within my office, we'll be better able to meet the needs of the women at BNL and the Lab's need for more women in its work force. Ginger and I have a great working relationship, and we are ready to meet the challenge of finding creative approaches to the issues we face."

"We are pulling together all affirmative action matters under Glenn, to

unify our efforts toward the continued diversification of the Lab's work force and the continued enhancement of the opportunities available at Brookhaven for women and minorities," says BNL Deputy Director Martin Blume. "We thank Avril for her excellent service these past two years and look forward to Ginger's input on women's issues."

During her two-year tenure as Women's Program Coordinator, the accomplishment of which Woodhead is most proud came in two parts.

From January to October 1988, she first worked as a member of the Child-Care Initiative Committee, organized by Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS), which proposed the establishment of an on-site child-care center and associated child-care benefits. Then from November 1988 to this August, she was a member of the administration's Child-Care Center Committee, which established the feasibility of such a center and obtained Department of Energy approval and funding.

### Still More to Be Done

"I am delighted about the child-care center, but there's still more to be done to improve women's chances for professional advancement at BNL," says Woodhead. "I enjoyed working with BWIS, Professional Secretaries International [PSI] and unaffiliated women employees toward the collective and individual good of women at the Lab, and I encourage them to continue their efforts with the help of the new Women's Program Coordinator."

"I thank Avril — during the transition, she has been most helpful by sharing her resources and insight with me," says Brown.

"The work force is changing," reflects Brown. "In particular, the proportion of women is growing. So it is imperative, if BNL is to continue fulfilling its research mission, that it be able to recruit and retain competent women. As both the Laboratory management and its employees are aware that more needs to be done to have women and other components of the workforce fully represented at BNL, I view my appointment as both a challenge and an opportunity."

In addition to being the new Women's Program Coordinator, Brown will continue as Manager of Compensation and Projects in the Personnel Division. "My current Personnel project assignments involve women's issues, so there is continuity between my two positions," Brown explains. "I am interested in issues important to women in all segments of the BNL work force."

As one project, Brown will be looking into family-related policies including such things as the possibility of flexible work hours and job sharing.

### Maintaining the Momentum

"I will be exploring model programs at other organizations, to see how some of the suggestions can be implemented at BNL — for the good of both the Lab and its employees," explains Brown. "I would like to follow up on the momentum created by the proposal and approval for a child-care center on site."

# Service America to Service BNL Cafeteria

First comes a buffet brunch this Sunday, then a lot of new beginnings throughout the week. The next week, things become SPICEy. After that, a week of fitness fare will be followed by a delicious look at apples.

In brief, that's the first month's schedule prepared by Chris Fautas and Ed Gross to phase in the new programs that will be coming to the Cafeteria beginning October 1, as Service America Corporation (SAC) starts a five-year management contract.

Under SAC's management, Fautas will be food service director and Gross will be food service manager for the BNL cafeteria. "Our goal," says Fautas, "is to make this Service America's Long Island flagship."

SAC is a national food-service contractor with over 900 accounts nationwide. Among the cafeterias run by SAC are those at the U.S. House of Representatives and Department of Energy (DOE) headquarters in Washington, D.C. SAC has also run concessions at the Super Bowl and the Rose Bowl.

Fautas has been with SAC for seven years, most recently at AT&T Technology World Headquarters in Berkeley Heights, New Jersey. There, he supervised six cafeterias and the executive dining rooms, and, said BNL Staff Services Manager Ron Manning, "He was famous for his catering events."

Gross is new to SAC but the food-service business is in his blood. "I was born into it," he said. "My dad was an excellent European-trained chef, who started training me at 11 years of age." Previously, Gross was chef manager with Deluxe Caterers in Roslyn, and he remains a food-service consultant for schools throughout Long Island and Westchester.

The qualifications of the management staff were among the factors that led BNL to choose SAC to manage the Cafeteria, at the end of a lengthy selection process that began in January 1989.

As Manning explained, "Federal procurement rules required BNL to go out on bid, as the Marriott Corporation had completed its original five-year contract and maximum five annual renewals. We received seven proposals and the seven members of the Lab's evaluation panel narrowed these down to four finalists, of which Marriott was one. It was a close horse race. After we made our selection in July, it had to be approved by DOE."

"Marriott has run a very good program," said Gross, "and Service America's challenge is to take a very good program and polish it even more. We hope to bring some refreshing concepts to the management of the Lab's Cafeteria."

Focus groups are one such concept. Made up of Cafeteria customers, these groups will zero in on different aspects of Cafeteria services. For example, the planned focus group for the Brookhaven Center — which will tackle the question "How can the Center best serve the needs of its customers?" — will likely include regular employees, representatives from the Lab's user community and participants in BERA activities who often drop in after games.

"This was a strong aspect of SAC's proposal," said Manning, "their willingness to find out customer preferences."

Gross and Fautas are not waiting for focus groups to convene before initiating some other "subtle but nice changes," said Gross. "We'll be paying a great deal of attention to the vending machines and lunch truck, for example, giving those who are restricted to their use more variety from which to choose."

One thing that will not change with SAC are the current prices. Manning explained that the Cafeteria is sub-

## On the Menu for the First Month

Here's how Chris Fautas and Ed Gross plan to introduce Service America Corporation (SAC) at the Cafeteria during October:

• **Opening day brunch** — A buffet brunch will start things off on Sunday, October 1, from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Featuring both breakfast and luncheon foods served at a country-club table, the brunch will be repeated every Sunday, if demand warrants it. The brunch will cost \$3.95 for children under 12 years and \$5.95 for everyone else.

• **Week 1: New Beginnings** — To celebrate the beginning of SAC's tenure in the Cafeteria, each day during the week of October 2 foods from a different place with "New" in its name will be featured (see menu), as will special drawings for all employees, with no purchase necessary:

sided by BNL, and any profit or loss associated with it belongs to the Lab. SAC receives a fee, based on percentage of gross sales.

"The Lab's goal is to keep food prices to a minimum and not to penalize one set of customers to provide food service to another," Manning said. "For example, because of volume, lunch pays its own way, and lunchtime customers are never penalized with higher prices to make up for services that don't pay their own way. Generally, breakfast, dinner and weekend service do not show a profit, but we still want to provide these to the Laboratory community."

There will also be no reduction in services offered at the Cafeteria. During lunch, for example, there will still be soup, frozen yogurt, the salad bar and a lite-line dish offered daily. The hot deli will be reincarnated in two forms: Each day, SAC will offer a "carvery" item as well as a special from the grill. A new grill special

sandwich will also be available each Saturday.

And what if you've got a suggestion about the Cafeteria? "We welcome people's comments," said Fautas. "The door is open all the time. Just come in to the Cafeteria and meet us." You can also call Fautas or Gross with your comments on Ext. 3541, or Manning on Ext. 2525.

she will be exploring such work-environment issues as overcoming sexism, sexual harassment and gender-exclusive language in the workplace.

"These issues involve employees' attitudes and awareness," says Brown. "While difficult, both can be changed through education and training — so I will be working with Mary White, Personnel's Training and Development Administrator, to develop programs for supervisors and employees." Brown also will collaborate with White to bring to the Lab other training programs of interest to women.

"The activism of groups of BNL employees has contributed to the quality of the work life at the Lab," says Brown, "And I see it as part of my job to encourage their participation in developing policies and programs, and their interaction with management." To facilitate their involvement, Brown will establish liaisons with the different groups on site, such as BWIS and PSI.

## Recruitment and Retention

Head of a Lab task force on recruitment and retention, Brown will now focus her attention on BNL's problems in recruiting and retaining women. For her third project, she will be identifying new techniques for recruiting women to the Lab, in addition to new ways of making BNL a better workplace for women.

In doing so, Brown will collaborate with the Affirmative Action Office, the Office of Scientific Personnel, the Personnel Division and the Office of Educational Programs, among other BNL offices. "This will provide us an opportunity for cooperation and sharing resources," comments Brown.

She adds, "Brookhaven already has many fair policies and programs in place, but it is a matter of aggressively exercising them in seeking out and keeping qualified women here."

Having taught a course on "Women, Work and Dollars" at the Harriman Graduate School of Policy Management at the State University of New York at Stony Brook, Brown is both academically and practically familiar with the women's special problems within the work force.

After a brief stint at the Lab from 1959-61, Brown returned to BNL in 1977. Continuously employed in Personnel ever since, she became responsible for managing Brookhaven's compensation program in 1981 and has also worked on a number of human-resource administration projects in other areas.

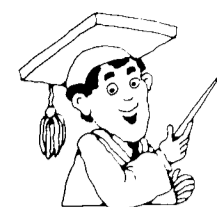

## AUI Scholarship Alert

Application forms for the 1990 AUI Trustee Scholarships can now be obtained from the Office of Scientific Personnel. Children of regular employees of BNL are eligible to compete for up to twelve AUI scholarships, each for \$2,000 per year, renewable for up to four years of study toward an academic degree.

In addition, up to three scholarships may be awarded to BNL and National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO) employees' children who are Black, Hispanic or Native American. One such scholarship is open to qualified children of employees at BNL and another for children of NRAO employees. One may be awarded to an additional applicant from either institution on a competitive basis.

Qualified applicants are the children of BNL employees who begin regular, full-time or regular, eligible

part-time employment no later than November 15, 1989, and who are employed by BNL at the time the award is announced; or children of retired employees or employees who died while in regular service at the Laboratory. Stepchildren are eligible if the employee regularly claims the child as a dependent for income tax purposes.

Applicants must also be secondary school seniors who will be graduating during the current academic year and entering college by fall 1990.

In addition to filing applications by November 15, 1989, eligible candidates are required to take the Scholastic Aptitude Test, requesting release of their scores to AUI Trustee Scholarships, code number 0442. Scholarship winners will be selected by an independent committee reporting to Sponsored Scholarship Programs, an organization within the Educational Testing Service.
