On Tuesday, April 17, a new form of communication will start in Berkner Hall. In the lobby will be a video kiosk with a 20-inch television monitor—the showplace for GLANCE.

GLANCE is a video program that will give fleeting glimpses of life and people at BNL. It will run continuously every workday between 11:30 a.m. and 1:30 p.m., and the program will change every Tuesday. Approximately three minutes short, GLANCE will briefly present ideas, traditions and outlooks of BNL.

The concept of GLANCE came from Doug Humphrey, head of BNL Video in the Photography and Graphic Arts Division, who then developed the idea fully with Anne Baittinger, Manager of the Public Affairs Office. After it had been approved by the Directorate, GLANCE was on its way.

Said Humphrey, "All of us had always thought of video as being a viable adjunct to existing employee communication efforts. But it was a matter of timing, too. Right now, BNL Video can supply solid program production and design capabilities as well as a very talented crew — Alex

Reben and Ray Axmacher. It seemed natural to bring all this together with the staff of the Public Affairs Office, to show Brookhaven in a video format."

Each GLANCE program will be a

series of 15-to-45-second segments focusing on BNL research and other aspects of Lab life or people, from the momentous to the offbeat. Shorter features will include an inquiring reporter type format called "It's Questionable," a look at past news events in "Historical Headlines," and a catchall called "Et Cetera."

Most of the ideas for GLANCE are being generated by Public Affairs staff, who will write the brief story lines accompanying each videotape segment.

Said Baittinger, "We have a very creative team at Public Affairs — our writers and reporters, as well as our Tour Program staff. Their different views of the Lab, combined with the visual skill and creativity of the video crew, should result in material that is individual and original, yet appealing to other BNL employees."

"We're pretty sure we'll have a good mix that moves quickly," said Humphrey. "We'll be showing a world-class Laboratory filled with interesting people and fascinating projects."

DnI Lecture: Chemical Dynamics Using Lasers

Chemical reactions in interstellar gas clouds, reactions in the upper atmosphere and hydrocarbon combustion — in each of these reactions, important chemical intermediates are short-lived, extremely reactive molecules known as free radicals.

A free radical is a molecule that has one or more unpaired electrons, which seek to pair up in a bond with another atom or molecule. Due to their reactivity and short lifetime under normal conditions, free radicals are difficult species to study, and sensitive experimental techniques are necessary. However, it is their presence that determines the rate and direction of many familiar and not so familiar chemical processes.

In BNL's Chemistry Department, Chemist Trevor Sears uses lasers to study these intermediates. He will discuss the kinds of experimental techniques used and the meaning of some of the results in the 260th Brookhaven Lecture. His talk on "Chemical Dynamics Using Lasers" will begin at 4 p.m. next Tuesday, April 17, following an introduction by Ralph Weston, Deputy Chairman of the Chemistry Department.

In his lecture, Sears will focus on a particular elementary reaction involved in hydrocarbon combustion, as an example of one in which free radicals play a major role. He will describe the results of experiments using infrared and ultraviolet laser spectroscopy to probe the quantum mechanical states involved in the reaction. He will also relate these results to theories of exactly how the reaction takes place.

Trevor Sears earned his B.Sc. in chemistry from the University of Southampton, England, in 1975. With a dissertation on "Aspects of Free Radical Spectroscopy," he was awarded his Ph.D. from Southampton in 1978. He remained at Southampton until 1979, as an S.R.C.-sponsored postdoctoral fellow in the Department of Chemistry.

From 1979-80, Sears worked in the physical and inorganic chemistry research department of Bell Laboratories. This was followed by three years at the Herzberg Institute of Astrophysics of the National Research Council of Canada.

Sears came to BNL's Chemistry Department in October 1983, as an associate chemist. He was named Chemist in 1986.

Colloquia to Honor Courant

Outstanding achievements in accelerator physics, including the discovery of strong focusing, during a career extending back over 42 years at BNL — these items from the curriculum vitae of AUI Distinguished Scientist emeritus Ernest Courant explain why "Colloquia Honoring Ernest D. Courant" have been arranged by a committee of Courant's friends and colleagues at Brookhaven.

The Colloquia will be held in Berkner Hall on Wednesday, April 18, from 9 a.m. to noon. Speakers will include John Blewett, who retired from the Lab in 1975 as a senior physicist and will recall the "Early Days at BNL"; two accelerator physicists, both former students of Courant: Alex Chao, Superconducting Super Collider Laboratory (SSCL), who will talk on "The Ernest Pursuit of the SSC," and Ron Ruth, Stanford Linear Accelerator Center (SLAC), whose topic will be "Travels with Ernie: Polarization and Nonlinear Dynamics"; and Senior Physicist Robert Palmer, BNL, SLAC and SSCL, who will speak on "Prospects for TeV Linear Colliders."

Commented Laboratory Director Nicholas Samios, "Ernest is one of the great men of accelerator physics, from the conceptual design to the educational. His work has had a major influence on nearly all accelerators built since the early '60s, and he has subsequently received many honors in recognition of his efforts. We at BNL greatly benefited from his wisdom and productivity and look forward, with Ernest, to even more fruitful years ahead."

25 Years of Scholarships **Yield Many Success Stories**

In 1965, Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), announced the first dozen winners of the new AUI Trustee Scholarships — ten children of BNL employees and two children of employees of the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO). Since then, and including this year's winners (see accompanying story), the quarter-century-old program has awarded 357 scholarships to academically qualified students selected by an independent committee.

AUI, the nonprofit research and educational institution that manages BNL and NRAO, was established in 1946 to advance scientific research to frontier areas of interest to universities, industry and government. AUI is governed by a board of 25 trustees from universities, research institutions and industrial organizations.

According to R. Christian Ander-

son, the retired BNL assistant director who was in charge of administering the AUI scholarships when they were first issued, the awards started as a recruiting tool at a time when universities and laboratories were competing intensely for top scientists. Since universities usually offered free tuition for children of employees, AUI started to offer the \$900 per year scholarships in 1965 for four years of undergraduate work to children of BNL and NRAO employees as a hiring incentive. Since then, the yearly award has risen to \$2,000.

Jerome Hudis, AUI Vice President-Programmatic Affairs, said, "The scholarships recognize and honor the combination of intellectual achievements and social responsibilities known to be the best indicators of future academic success. As an institution dedicated to the advancement





of knowledge, AUI is pleased to play a role in encouraging children of Laboratory employees to take advantage of higher education opportunities.'

As many as twelve scholarships are awarded competitively each year to children of BNL employees and up to four scholarships for children of NRAO employees. In addition, up to three scholarships may be awarded yearly to BNL and NRAO employees' children who are Black, Hispanic, or Native Americans.

Recently, BNL applicants have numbered between 50 and 60 per year, said Gail Williams, Manager of BNL's Office of Scientific Personnel, who now administers the program. "We're proud that the scholarships are not just academic excellence awards. Criteria for winning also include community involvement, leadership, creativity and the student's sense of self and purpose," she said.


And what happens to an AUI scholarship winner after college? Here's a look at some early winners.

Linda Dexter Hancher was among the first group of scholarship winners in 1965. Her sister, Barbara Dexter Steinech, was a winner in 1969. Hancher earned her B.A. from Rutgers University and her M.A. in English from The Johns Hopkins University. She is now an administrator for the Board of Education in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Steinech earned her B.S. and M.S. from SUNY at Cortland and her Ph.D. in oceanography from Oregon State University. She now teaches at SUNY at Purchase, and she is working on a research project in Westchester County called "River Watch," in which she works with volunteers to track pollution in Long Island Sound.

Robert Schaeffer, a 1965 scholarship winner who attended MIT but did not complete the school's requirements for graduation, began his career as an assistant to the president at MIT, and then worked on the staff of a state representative in Massachusetts. He is now a self-employed political consultant in Belmont, Massachusetts, and public education director for Fair Test, a consumeroriented organization. Schaeffer has also done radio editorial writing and he is co-author of two books -Standing Up to the SATs and Winning Local and State Elections: The Guide to Organizing Your Campaign.

Brothers Robert and Thomas Stehn won scholarships in 1965 and 1967, respectively, and each earned degrees in wildlife management. Robert Stehn earned a B.S. from Syracuse University and a Ph.D. from Cornell University. He currently works as a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Alaska, where he is studying four species of wild geese of the Yukon Delta that have been diminishing in number. Thomas Stehn, who also is a wildlife biologist for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is an expert on whooping cranes. He works at the winter resting place for that nearly extinct bird, the Aransas Wildlife Refuge in Texas. He earned a B.S. in mathematics from Carleton College. Minnesota, and an M.S. in wildlife management from the University of Montana. As a Peace Corps volunteer for two years, Thomas Stehn was a manager of parks in Swaziland in southern Africa.

George Eleazer and his sister, Vernetta Eleazer Cousins, won scholarships in 1974 and 1976 respectively. After earning a B.S. from Tufts University, and an M.A. and Ph.D. from Hofstra University in clinical and school psychology, George Eleazer became a school psychologist for Longwood Central Schools on Long Island. He also has a part-time private practice in Bellport.

Vernetta Eleazer Cousins took a different path - she majored in theatre arts at Morgan State University in Baltimore, where she received her bachelor's degree. Cousins now is a drama and religion teacher at Little Flower Children's Services in Wading River. She and her husband. Lemuel, are adoptive or foster parents to seven children, and they have one child by birth. The children are now ages 7 to 23. An aspiring lyricist, Cousins helped to coordinate BNL's first Talent Show in celebration of Black History Month.

Two scholarship winners — Lisa Anderson (1968) and Kathleen McKeown (1972) — both teach at Columbia University. Anderson received her B.A. in international politics from Sarah Lawrence College, her M.A. from Tufts University, and her Ph.D. from Columbia University in political science. She taught Middle Eastern politics at Harvard University before going to Columbia. She is also director of that university's Middle East Institute.

McKeown is an Associate Professor of Computer Science at Columbia University, and she does research under a National Science Foundation Young Investigator Award. Last year, McKeown was the first woman to receive tenure in Columbia's School of Engineering. She earned her bachelor's degree in comparative literature, and she received her M.S. and Ph.D. in computer and information science from the University of Pennsylvania.

And in one case, an AUI scholarship winner has become a BNL employee. Jerome Hastings, who won in 1966, is now a physicist in the National Synchrotron Light Source Department. He received his B.S. and Ph.D. from Cornell University, and after working briefly at Oak Ridge National Laboratory and the Stanford Synchrotron Radiation Project. he joined the Lab staff in 1977. Today he and his research team are developing new techniques using photons for the study of condensed matter

"I'm very pleased with where my education has led me," Hastings said. "I not only have a job that I enjoy - it's also based so close to my hometown. I grew up in Patchogue. It's a good feeling to be back here again. - Diane Greenberg
