

Weathering Climate Variations



Carbon dioxide is building up in the earth's atmosphere. To predict the consequences of this increase, groups of researchers around the world have built a variety of computer models simulating processes that control the earth's climate. However, it is necessary to check the accuracy of the models. One way is by subjecting them to sets of mutually agreed on tests to assess their predictive capability.

At the Fourth Annual Climate Model Intercomparison Workshop held at Brookhaven on December 3 and 4, participants compared model variations resulting from differing methods of modeling ice and snow.

The attendees came from Australia, Canada, France, Germany, Japan, the People's Republic of China, the United Kingdom, the Soviet Union, the European Centre for Medium-Range Weather Forecasts, and universities and government agencies across the U.S. Among them were (from left) Michael Richards, U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) Office of Health and Environmental Research; Bernard Manowitz, BNL's Department of Applied Science; Gerald Potter, Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL); and (back, right) Robert Cess, State University of New York (SUNY) at Stony Brook.

The participants also identified a need for additional fundamental research on the atmospheric water cycle to give a broader base of observed data to constrain the models. This will lead to better predictions of the effects of carbon dioxide on climate.

Future model development will be assisted by a new DOE computer program that will include improved hardware and new algorithms permitting more complex models to be evaluated, and by data that will be supplied by the DOE Atmospheric Radiation Measurement program.

Cosponsoring the workshop were the DOE Program for Atmospheric and Climate Research, the Institute for Terrestrial and Planetary Atmospheres, SUNY at Stony Brook, and the Program for Climate Model Intercomparison and Diagnostics at LLNL.
