

## Carol Whitley Appointed AUI Assistant Secretary

In being named Assistant Secretary of Associated Universities, Incorporated (AUI), on February 1, Carol Whitley became the fifth person to occupy the position and the first woman to assume the post since AUI's founding in 1946.

Before this promotion, Whitley was an administrative assistant in AUI's Brookhaven Corporate Office, working for Jerome Hudis, who is AUI Vice President for Programmatic Affairs, Secretary and Controller. In her new post, she replaces Victor Bremenkamp, who retired on January 31 after more than 22 years with AUI.

As Assistant Secretary, Whitley will work directly for AUI President Robert Hughes in the corporation's Washington headquarters. There, she will take on many of the responsibilities previously handled by Bremenkamp and Lois Chew, the Washington office's AUI Administrative Assistant who retired this week, on April 30, after 25 years service.

As a result of Bremenkamp's and Chew's retirements, Whitley and Hudis are to be stationed in the Washington office permanently. Whitley will be there by this summer and Hudis by the fall. At present, Whitley and Hudis are commuting between the Lab and the nation's capital; Hudis will continue the commute, as he will continue to spend half his time at Brookhaven.

"With only 12 people on the AUI staff, the retirement of two highly valued, long-term employees like

and challenges for those remaining — and Carol's promotion and our move to Washington are manifestations of that change."

Says Whitley, "In providing general administrative support to AUI officers and the board over the years, I have come to know the history of this corporation, how its decisions were reached and its procedures were developed. So I'll be relying on my corporate memory in defining and performing my new job."

### AUI Corporate Affairs

AUI was organized in 1946, by scientists from nine northeastern universities intent on establishing a government research laboratory for nuclear science. Following its incorporation, AUI founded BNL and entered into a contract with the Atomic Energy Commission to operate the Lab.

Just as Brookhaven's scientific mission has expanded over the years, so too have AUI's corporate affairs and endeavors. In 1956, AUI established BNL's sister laboratory, the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO), which is funded by the National Science Foundation and headquartered in Charlottesville, Virginia. Then in 1966, AUI moved its headquarters from New York City to Washington, D.C.

As a nonprofit research management firm, AUI is governed by a board of trustees which has grown from 18 to 24 members, most of whom are affiliated with the original nine founding universities. The AUI Trustees meet as a full board four times a year.

In addition, smaller groups of

## DAS Program Wins Energy Award

The 1991 Research & Development Award of the National Energy Resources Organization (NERO) was awarded on May 1 to the Combustion Equipment Technology Program (CETP) within the Department of Applied Science.

Since 1976, CETP has been funded by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) to upgrade the technology used in residential and light commercial-space heating systems.

CETP accomplishes this by developing and evaluating innovative components as well as entire advanced energy-efficient oil combustion systems. To assist the oil-heat industry, this technology is then transferred to the private sector, which is comprised of thousands of small, independently owned and operated companies serving oil-heat customers nationwide.

The R&D Award winners within CETP include: Senior Program Manager Roger McDonald; Research Manager Thomas Butcher; Project Engineer Richard Krajewski; Staff Engineer Ruth Coughlan; Associate Staff Engineer Yusuf Celebi; Associate Staff Engineer John Strasser; Mechanical Technician Jose Sanchez; and Senior Executive Secretaries Arlene Waltz and Francine Donnelly. CETP is within DAS's Energy Efficiency and Conservation Division, headed by John Andrews.

NERO is a nonprofit organization formed in 1975 to exchange and disseminate energy-related information and ideas; encourage technologically creative and environmentally appropriate applications of energy resources; and educate the public about advances in energy technology and its application.

In addition, NERO recognizes individuals and organizations that have contributed to energy production, conservation and development of alternative sources. Besides the R&D award, NERO bestows honors for energy conservation, public education and distinguished service.

In fact, this year's Distinguished Service Award was presented to the DOE Secretary, Admiral James Watkins. This award is NERO's highest recognition of a significant contribution of solutions to America's energy problems.

The R&D Award won this year by BNL's CETP is presented for excellence in scientific or technological research that significantly impacts the production or conservation of energy.

Nominated by the Petroleum Marketers Association of America (PMAA), BNL's CETP was noted for being "wholly dedicated to improving the heating systems used by the 12 million U.S. homeowners who heat with oil." According to PMAA, these homeowners have seen a fuel savings of over \$5 billion since the program's conception. Every dollar invested in Brookhaven's research program has earned a \$500 return in fuel savings. Over the next two decades, \$39 billion in oil is forecast to be saved, largely due to the scientific advances developed at Brookhaven.

Specific examples of CETP's work cited include: participation in DOE's Heat Smart campaign; development of a flame-quality indicator; design of improved burners; and study of power-venting systems.

## DOE Secretary Commends Community Summer Science



U.S. Department of Energy Secretary James Watkins recently issued a Certificate of Appreciation to BNL Physicist James Niederer of the Computing & Communications Division "for [his] extraordinary efforts on behalf of the Community Summer Science Program."

In 1988, Niederer and some colleagues started the Community Summer Science Program (CSSP) for local high school juniors and seniors as a science summer camp of sorts, which their teachers could also audit. Working with Karl Swyler of BNL's Office of Educational Programs (OEP), Niederer has organized CSSP as a volunteer activity each year since. To present morning lectures, sponsor afternoon interns and offer mini-courses, over 50 BNL scientists participate in CSSP each summer as well.

For six weeks per summer, two morning lectures are presented on forefront science topics. In the afternoons, students interned to Lab research projects work on their assignments. This year, mini-courses offering hands-on experiences with the likes of weather modeling and medical imaging are being considered for the others.

## Outreach Workshop Guilt and the Working Parent

At the heart of the conception of Mr. Mom the househusband, the pregnant pause in the Mommy Wars between stay-at-home versus working mothers, the labor of those on the Mommy Track at work, and the home delivery of *Working Mother* magazine is one emotion: guilt.

For simultaneously being workers and parents, many adults — especially women — feel as if they have committed a capital crime against their children. As a result, working parents struggle to find solutions that fulfill the economic and emotional needs of both parent and child.

"Guilt and the Working Parent" will be discussed at the eighth Outreach Workshop sponsored by the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) of the Occupational Medicine Clinic. To be presented by



Holly Gotta, D.S.W., the two-part workshop will take place on Tuesdays, May 7 and 14, noon to 1 p.m., Room B, Berkner Hall. Bring your lunch. To encourage open discussion,

this program will not be audiotaped.

During her presentation, Gotta will discuss the complex task of being a working parent. Her thesis is that while it is difficult being a parent, it is even more stressful being a working parent. As a result, she will offer practical suggestions as to how to deal with the emotional and physical tolls taken on working parents.

A working mother, Holly Gotta, D.S.W., is a psychotherapist in Northport, seeing adults, children, couples and families in private practice for the past 15 years. Gotta received her doctorate in social welfare from Adelphi University in 1985, following which she graduated from the post-doctoral program in psychotherapy and psychoanalysis at Adelphi's Derner Institute. She is a member of the supervising faculty of the Pederson-Krag Institute for Psychotherapy in Huntington.

trustees gather as needed for executive, nominating, administrative, audit, and environment, safety and health committee meetings, and for panels on astronomy, applied sciences, life sciences and physical sciences.

Day-to-day corporate affairs are handled by AUI's Washington headquarters and the Brookhaven Corporate Office, which was established in 1947.

At AUI headquarters at present are: AUI President Robert Hughes; Thomas Davin, who is Vice President for Corporate Affairs and General Counsel; and Executive Secretary Nora Steenson. In addition, AUI's immediate past president Gerald Tape, who was BNL's Deputy Director from 1951-62, maintains an office there as a consultant.

AUI continues to be represented full-time at the Laboratory by the corporation's Chief Auditor Frank Federmann and his staff, and by AUI Deputy General Counsel Michael Goldman, who also serves as Brookhaven's Laboratory Counsel.

Additionally, a third AUI vice president for environment, safety and health is to be stationed here when hired for this new post.

### Whitley's Assignments

After a year at Katherine Gibbs Secretarial School, Carol Whitley started at BNL in July 1962 as a secretary in the former Cosmotron Department. In October 1964, she moved to the Director's Office, to work for the late N. Peter Rathvon Jr., who was then BNL General Attorney and AUI Assistant Secretary. Following a series of promotions as a secretary, Whitley left the Lab in September 1968, expecting her first child.

With her two children in school, Whitley returned part time to the Director's Office in May 1977. She was again a secretary working for Rathvon, who was by that time AUI Secretary and General Counsel, as well as BNL General Counsel. She was transferred to the AUI payroll that August and promoted to executive secretary that September, by which time she was working full time.

Whitley was promoted to a senior executive secretary in October 1982 and to her penultimate position in

October 1984. A year later, she began working for Hudis, who had been elected Vice President and Secretary by the AUI Board following Rathvon's untimely death in August 1985.

Over the years, Whitley has carried out many of the administrative tasks for the AUI Board, including preparing meeting notices, tracking correspondence, organizing agendas and meeting materials, taking care of meeting logistics, and typing up the minutes from meetings. In addition, she has kept AUI record documents, excluding its financial records.

Besides retaining her record-keeping role, Whitley says, "Instead of simply preparing for the meetings, I'll now be present at board meetings themselves, recording the minutes and reporting to the board on the projects that I undertake."

One of her first assignments as AUI Assistant Secretary is to move the Washington office from its location for the past 25 years at 1717 Massachusetts Avenue N.W. to the National Wildlife Building, which is two blocks away on 16th Street N.W. She will then arrange the move of the corporate records to Washington, along with her and Hudis's offices.

Next, Whitley anticipates that she may be sitting in on Congressional hearings of interest to AUI, BNL and NRAO, and interacting with the staff of other research management organizations to learn their methods.

"As much as I'm looking forward to my full-time life in Washington, it will be difficult to leave the North Shore of Long Island," admits Whitley, a Port Jefferson native who now must sell her home in Shoreham. "But, with my daughter on her own, my son in college, and my new husband Tom who looks forward to exploring the capital with me, it is a good time in my life to make the change. Plus, I will still interact with many of the same people with whom I've worked at BNL, and I will get to see my old friends and coworkers when I return to the Lab a few times each year on corporate business."

Concludes Whitley, "AUI is a progressive corporation in the sense that, instead of defining the duties of a position and then trying to fit someone into the mold, it defines the jobs around the abilities of people it has hired. In working for AUI, I have been able to follow my own initiative, and the corporation has allowed me to grow." — Marsha Belford

## Toward Getting the Lead Out

Although cases of acute lead poisoning have been declining due to improved environmental regulations and health care, chronic cases involving low levels of lead in the body remain a public-health problem.

About 90 percent of body lead is retained in bone. At present, the accepted way to measure accumulation of this dangerous element, which can affect intelligence and damage organs, is through a painful and costly chelation test.

A "Workshop on Lead: Metabolism and Bone Deposition" was held at Brookhaven, April 10-12, to review the current understanding of how lead is absorbed by bone cells and where in bone tissue is lead deposited. Once lead metabolism and bone deposition are understood, the hope is to apply this knowledge to the design of safe, effective and economical instruments to measure lead concentrations in humans, as well as to develop improved treatments to remove lead from the body.

The workshop concluded with recommendations for new research to study lead metabolism from the cellular through organism levels.

For instance, one of the workshop's working groups recommended a sequence of animal studies to establish the distribution and kinetics of lead in bone for all ages at both low and toxic levels. To determine the lead content in bone with the necessary sensitivity, they proposed using an x-ray fluorescence microprobe, a sensitive instrument for trace-element analysis operated on the X26C beam line of the National Synchrotron Light Source.
