

Child Development Center to Open on Schedule, September 3

After three years of planning and a nine-month-plus gestation, BNL's Child Development Center (CDC) will open on schedule at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, September 3 — the first day of on-site day care for BNL employees' children ages eight weeks to four years.

With room for 96 youngsters in the old-fashioned barn-like building now being finished on Yale Road in the apartment area, the CDC has an enrollment of 61 kids, who are registered for either part- or full-time care. While the infant center is full, there are two openings in the toddler group, five spots available for three-year-olds, and many spaces awaiting four- and five-year-old preschoolers.

Before the first day of day care, however, parents who have registered their children at the CDC and others who are interested are invited to Berkner Hall at noon, on Tuesday, August 20, to meet the CDC staff, including its director, Deborah O'Neill.

"We want the center to have a family atmosphere, and, since the children are going to be cared for on the same site where their parents work, we think that this will happen naturally," explains O'Neill, who will supervise three teachers, seven teaching assistants, the head of the infant center and five infant caregivers.

"To encourage the start of this relationship, we're holding this meeting, during which we'll introduce our staff and the program formally, and then have time for informal introductions and discussions with the parents," adds O'Neill.

In addition to the CDC director, parents will meet Steve Held and Stephen Gordon, the executive director and business director respectively of Child Care Management Inc., the corporation established to manage CDC; Barbara Carstairs, head of the CDC's infant center; and CDC teachers Danielle Carter, Nancy Ford and Susan Lang.

The center will also be staffed by an office manager, Carmen Fortugno, who will answer CDC's Ext. 7426 and direct any parent's concerns; a cook, Nancy Fariello, who will prepare the children's snacks and lunch; and a visiting nurse, who will be at the CDC three times a week for an hour each time.

Both O'Neill and Carstairs come

that the children could enjoy special activities such as acting, cooking or computing at the beginning or end of their day. O'Neill was then promoted to supervisor of Just Kids' infant center.

Deborah O'Neill holds a bachelor's degree in early childhood education from the Southampton campus of Long Island University and is cur-

rently pursuing her masters' in liberal arts at the State University of New York at Stony Brook. She also completed coursework in infant-toddler education at the Bank Street College of Education in New York City.

"Just Kids is an exceptional place — for both the children and the staff," comments O'Neill. "So I'll be modeling my approach after the success of Just Kids."

In fact, the newly hired staff is undergoing an initial orientation at Just Kids. The staffers will be coming on site next week, to assist O'Neill in setting up the center's equipment and toys in Bldg. 373.

She continues, "At Just Kids, the administration has an excellent relationship with its staff — so, as a result, its employees stay. This is unusual in the child-care field, where staff turnover is a big concern to both administrators and parents. My goal will be to encourage my staff to pursue their interests and utilize their gifts to the benefit of the children, as well as their own benefit as preschool caregivers and educators."

At the CDC, the ratios of children to staff are smaller than the minimums set by New York State law: The ratio of infants to caregivers will be 3:1; the ratio for toddlers, 4:1; for three-year-olds, 6:1; and for four- and five-year-olds, 6:1.

from Just Kids Early Childhood Learning Center in Middle Island, which was originally established by Gordon and Held to provide child care for the children of BNL employees. O'Neill has nine years' experience there, while Carstairs has been there for five years.

O'Neill began her tenure at Just Kids by team teaching preschool classes that included handicapped children. After instructing kindergarten, she developed an enrichment program for the day-care center, so

Drive-Through Monitoring Station Given Green Light

There's a new BNL pathway for trucks — through the recently completed vehicle radiation monitoring station located on Princeton Avenue between Upton Road and Weaver Drive.

In service since July 29, the station contains a detector that is extremely sensitive to certain common radionuclides. The detector performs an important final check to ensure that no significant amount of radioactive material is accidentally included in a vehicle load.

According to Alan Kuehner, head of Technical Support in the Safety & Environmental Protection Division (S&EP), "The new station is one of the latest measures in the Lab's comprehensive plan for protecting the environment, both here and off-site."

At the station, vehicles being checked include all those loaded with waste materials for off-site disposal, or those with items going to or from BNL's scrap-metal yard. Department and division management may also issue their own requirements that vehicles picking up from or delivering materials to their areas should pass through the monitor.

A statement that all vehicles removing materials from BNL may be required to pass through the monitor both on entering and leaving the site is being inserted into all contracts issued by S&EP. Materials removed from radiological areas must, in addition, be monitored according to the provisions of the BNL Safety Manual. Vehicles carrying radioactive materials packaged according to U.S. Department of Transportation regulations, however, are exempt from these requirements.

The simple procedure for using the station entails driving at under five miles per hour through the monitor and exiting at a green light.

A yellow light indicates that the vehicle was going too fast to be adequately monitored, so the driver must go through it again, but more slowly.

If the light turns red, the driver calls Ext. 4207 at S&EP during working hours, or Ext. 2238 at Police Headquarters at other times. The vehicle is then taken to a checking area where any radioactive material can be removed.

Don't Even Think of Blocking SMERF

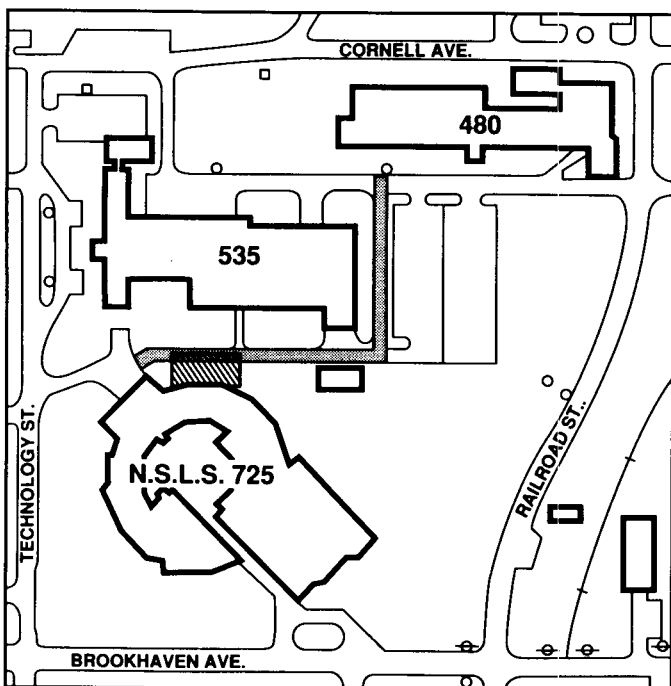
To allow emergency vehicles unrestricted access to the Synchrotron Medical Research Facility (SMERF) at the National Synchrotron Light Source (NSLS), the shaded roadways and the striped parking in the accompanying map have been designated an NSLS medical emergency access area.

As such, the area has been added to the Lab's parking ticketing program, which is administered by the Police Group of the Safeguards & Security Division. There-

fore, anyone found parking there illegally is subject to a \$50 fine, to be charged against the employee's department or division's operating funds.

At SMERF, a team of scientists and physicians use an experimental technique called transvenous angiography to generate two-dimensional pictures of patients' coronary arteries, and these images are used for diagnosing heart disease.

Since the shaded roads provide the only approach and exit from SMERF for emergency vehicles, these roads should not be obstructed in any way. In addition, the small parking area indicated by stripes on the map contains two slots that are assigned to SMERF for emergency vehicle parking. Thus, these spaces as well may not be obstructed with illegally parked cars.

Suggestion of Safety

When labels fall off bottles of homemade preserves, you may find yourself eating strawberry jam rather than peach plum jelly. But labels that fall off bottles of chemicals in a science laboratory may cause a more serious situation.

Recognizing that, Russell Dietz, Head of the Tracer Technology Center in the Department of Applied Science, suggested that BNL stock color-coded chemical wash bottles that are permanently labeled. Shown here with samples of bottles now in the BNL stockroom, Dietz won \$75 from the Employee Suggestion Program for his bright idea.

Now, researchers who need to use acetone, acetonitrile, bleach, ethanol, ethylacetate, isopropyl alcohol, methanol, methyl ethyl ketone, toluene or water can order labeled bottles right from stock. And for any compound not mentioned, the Lab also stocks an unlabeled wash bottle. All of these easy-to-handle, 500-milliliter bottles are made of polyethylene, with a wide mouth and a stem on the lid.

These bottles may be used only for chemical laboratory research activities. Bottles used in laboratory activities that fall outside of a chemical laboratory scale, or operations which are classified as production-type activities, for example work in Plant Engineering, Central Shops, or the National Synchrotron Light Source, or activities such as glass washing require additional hazard labeling. Users should contact their building Safety & Environmental Protection Division representative for additional guidance.

In Memoriam

Gerhard Tiller, Instrumentation

Gerhard Tiller, a senior staff specialist and the administrator of the Instrumentation Division, died on July 25 at his home in Shoreham, following a six-year battle with cancer. He was 71 years old and had pursued a Lab career that lasted more than 41 years.

"Working at the Lab was more than just a job to Gerry," reflects Sy Rankowitz, the Associate Head of Instrumentation. "He had no intentions of retiring: Until the very end, he didn't want to give up the work and the people he enjoyed so much. He was a very sociable person, and I don't know of anyone who didn't like Gerry. We all are going to miss him very, very much."

Adds Staff Services Division Manager Ron Manning, who worked with Tiller earlier in the Physics Department, "Gerry was the consummate gentleman, known to many on site for his trademarks — his bright red socks, ancient dog-eared manilla folder, his marvelous subtle sense of

humor, and his total dedication to the Lab and every task that he undertook. It was a pleasure to know and work with him."

Born in Germany on May 25, 1920, Tiller was about five years old when he was brought to America by his parents. Raised in Medford, Tiller loved to recall how a kindly elementary school teacher took him under her wing, teaching him how to speak proper English without a foreign accent.

Tiller became a U.S. citizen during World War II, when he served the U.S. Army from 1942-45, during which time he received his training in fiscal administration. After the war, Tiller was stationed at Camp Upton, as a civilian employee of the Army. When the site was changed over from a military induction camp to a scientific national laboratory, it changed hands from the Army to the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC); Tiller stayed on, working for the AEC from 1946-49.

Tiller began his long association with the Lab on January 31, 1949, working as a senior clerk in Accounts Payable. In September 1950, he became a bookkeeper in what was then Bookkeeping. Tiller moved into Fixed Assets in December 1951, where he was a senior clerk before being promoted to an administrative aide in May 1956 and then to a junior auditor in July 1958.

It was during that time when Tiller came to know by heart the life numbers of almost every BNL employee.

"Back then, everyone picked up their paychecks at the bank, and

Gerry was the one who handed them out according to name and life number," explains Supervisor of Payroll Operations Viola Malloy of the Fiscal Division, who was Tiller's companion during his last years. "As a result of his wonderful memory, he amazed everyone he met around the site by remembering their names and life numbers."

When the Fiscal Division was consolidated in January 1960, Tiller continued as a junior auditor, working in Internal Audit with Fred Hohmann, who is now Manager of Accounting in Fiscal.

"I worked with Gerry all of one month — but, in that short time, I made a life-long Lab friend," recalls Hohmann. "He was one of the happiest and best-natured people I know, and also one of the friendliest, warmest, most considerate and caring. He was lots of fun — good to joke and laugh with. After knowing and enjoying the man for 30 years, I do miss him."

Tiller moved into the Physics Department in July 1961, as an administrative aide. He was promoted to administrative assistant in August 1965.

"Gerry worked in the Bubble Chamber Group, which had its own administrative staff because of its size," explains Ron Manning, who was the Physics Department Administrator at that time. "When I was new to the department, Gerry shared his corporate memory with me — he was a wonderful source of history." During the early 70s, Tiller moved into Manning's office to handle departmental budgets and accounting.

Tiller's transfer to Instrumentation came in January 1976, when he came to the division as a staff assistant to take on the administrator's job. As such, Tiller took care of the division's

budget, personnel paperwork, vendors and purchases, property inventory, radioactive materials control, and maintenance and safety oversight.

Working as Tiller's assistant since 1978 was Cheryl Williams, now a senior staff specialist, who remembers, "He was marvelous to work with — he really wanted to see you succeed, so he shared all that he knew with you, and he was ready and willing to help you with anything. He was a very special man — a good person to work for, as well as a loving and caring friend."

In 1979, Tiller became one of the founding members of the Scientific Program Administrators Group, which was formed and still exists to enable closer communication among the administrators of the scientific divisions and departments.

Continuing as Instrumentation's administrator, Tiller rose up the scale twice more: In October 1982, he was made a staff specialist, and, in October 1986, he was named to his final title.

Tiller's wife of many years, the late Joan Tiller, who had been a senior office services assistant in the Technical Information Division, died at age 56 in 1982, also of cancer. Though Gerhard Tiller was diagnosed with the disease July 1985, he continued working until December 1990.

Gerhard Tiller was buried on July 29 in Washington Memorial Cemetery in Coram. In addition to his dear friend Viola Malloy, Tiller is survived by his daughter Nancy Smith of Brooklyn, son Robert Tiller of Syracuse, daughter Karen Rothman of Southold, and six grandchildren.

O'Neill selected the CDC staff with one philosophy in mind: to be able to provide the youngsters with a developmentally appropriate program. "As we help the children learn through exploration and experience, it is important that we challenge them, but not overwhelm them with inappropriate tasks," comments O'Neill.

From 8 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. during the work week, CDC kids will take part in a theme-based curriculum, designed to promote their emotional, cognitive, physical and social skills

at age-appropriate levels. While themes — such as cultures of the world, and dinosaurs, crawly things and things that hatch — will change periodically, activity centers within each group will remain constant. By being able to choose activities — such as dramatic play, computers and science, or reading — that interest them, children's independence will be fostered.

"We'll have an open-door policy, so the parents can drop in to see their children, have lunch or visit with them for a while," adds O'Neill. In addition, there will be an open house after work one evening soon after the

center opens, so parents may tour the facility and meet the teachers, caregivers and aides who mind their children during the work week.

Parents with children at the CDC will also be involved in the center's program through a parents' council, which will be established in early October during an open meeting and meet monthly after that.

The council will consist of eight parents, two elected from each of the four age groups to which their children are assigned. Two staff members, the CDC director, BNL's Employee Relations Counselor Susan Foster, and the two CCMI owners will

round out the council. Foster will continue as liaison between the Lab and the CDC.

"We'll work together to address any concerns and issues put on our agenda," explains O'Neill. "And, we'll also plan special events, such as potluck suppers, that will foster the center's family atmosphere."

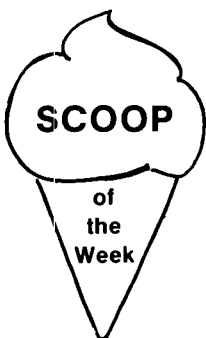
