

DNI Lecture: Reducing Bone Pain In Cancer Patients Using Radioactive Tin

For most people, the possibility of developing breast or prostate cancer is a frightening thought. But for those who have already developed these diseases and whose cancers have metastasized to the bone, it is an excruciatingly painful reality.


On the theory that diminished tumor size will reduce pain, researchers have turned to radionuclides. Ideally, when injected into a patient's bloodstream, these radioactive atomic species will localize in the painful bone area, where the radiation they emit can kill the growing cancer cells.

Radionuclides currently in use for this application have several drawbacks and do not provide complete relief. But BNL researchers have found a radioisotope of tin — ^{117m}Sn — that may prove to be the most effective radionuclide therapy yet.

Scientist Leonard Mausner, who heads the Radionuclide Research Group in the Medical Department's Radionuclide & Radiopharmaceutical Research (R&RR) Division, is principal investigator of this program. He will introduce this work in the first Brookhaven Lecture of the 1991-92 series (see box).

Entitled "Reducing Bone Pain in Cancer Patients Using Radioactive Tin," the 271st Brookhaven Lecture will begin at 4 p.m., on Wednesday, September 11, in Berkner Hall. The speaker will be introduced by Senior Chemist Suresh Srivastava, Head of the R&RR Division.

To improve on the present use of radionuclides to reduce pain from metastatic bone cancer, Mausner will explain that he and his group sought a radiopharmaceutical with good localization — the ability to pool primarily in the targeted area. Mausner found that, when injected into mice, some tin compounds exhibit high uptake in bone and bone

tumors, without localization in any other organ.

As Mausner will relate, the tin radionuclide ^{117m}Sn has other significant advantages as well. Because ^{117m}Sn emits low-energy electrons, its radioactivity affects only the nearby cancer cells. Thus, sensitive bone marrow is spared, and the patient's health is not further compromised.

These attributes were confirmed in recently completed clinical trials. Because these trials were conducted with low doses of ^{117m}Sn , verification of the radionuclide's pain-killing effects must wait until the conclusion of full therapeutic trials, for which Mausner is now preparing an application to the Food and Drug Administration.

The ^{117m}Sn for these trials is produced at BNL, using either neutrons

at the High Flux Beam Reactor or protons at Medical's Brookhaven Linac Isotope Producer (BLIP), which uses particles siphoned from the linear accelerator for the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron.

Leonard Mausner took his B.S. at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1968, and his M.A. at Princeton University in 1972, both in chemistry. He earned his Ph.D. in nuclear chemistry from Princeton in 1975.

After spending 1975-77 at Los Alamos National Laboratory on a Director's Fellowship, Mausner became an assistant scientist in the Radiological & Environmental Research Division of Argonne National Laboratory.

Mausner joined BNL in 1981 as an associate scientist in Medical's R&RR Division. Since being named Scientist in 1983, he has been responsible for BLIP and for the Radionuclide Research Group, where he oversees the production, purification and use of new radionuclides and generator systems of medical interest, and the isotope sales program. He also investigates the radiochemistry of isotopes relevant to nuclear medicine and was principal designer of BLIP II.

He is a member of the American Chemical Society's Division of Nuclear Chemistry & Technology, American Physical Society, Society of Nuclear Medicine and the Radiopharmaceutical Science Council.

BNL Opens Doors To Child Care And to Radiation Treatment

The beginning of September marked the beginning of operations for two new facilities at BNL: the Child Development Center (CDC) and the Radiation Therapy Facility (RTF).

Beginning at 8 a.m. on Tuesday, September 3, BNL parents began using the new road near the main gate to bring their children to the CDC — the first newly constructed day-care facility to begin operating at a U.S. Department of Energy site. By week's end, the sounds and energy of 65 youngsters had filled the new, barn-like building in the apartment area for the first time.

Also this week, the first patients arrived for treatment at the RTF. A collaboration between BNL and the State University of New York at Stony Brook, the RTF provides radiation treatment for cancer patients using a linear electron accelerator capable of producing beams of radiation at up to 25 million electron volts — the best in Suffolk County. Tremendous Year For Touring BNL

A record 21,066 visitors enjoyed the Exhibit Center/Science Museum over this past year — more than in any other year during the 13-year history of BNL's Tour Program.

Over seven Sundays this past summer, 6,890 visitors were guided through the museum. The other 14,176 were students ranging from kindergarten through high school, who came since last September on the tours the program conducted for school groups throughout the year.

The Tour Program is run by the Public Affairs Office and headed by Janet Tempel. "It was a tremendous year!" she said, stating that in addition to those who visited the Exhibit Center/Science Museum, the program hosted about 900 college students who toured some of the Lab facilities.

Incoming TDD Calls Accepted at BNL

The Computing & Communications Division has recently installed a Telecommunications Device for the Deaf (TDD) with the BNL telephone operators in Bldg. 515. This teletypewriter-like device allows any hearing impaired person who has access to a TDD, whether on or off site, to communicate with a BNL operator.


Coming Up
