Wanted: **More Complaints**

The Vendor Evaluation Program in the Division of Contracts and Procurement (DCP) has a complaint: It is receiving too few complaints.

When goods or services that have been procured through DCP are unacceptable as delivered, many requisitioners contact the vendor directly and do not inform DCP of the problem. DCP therefore continues to do business with an unsatisfactory vendor.

The correct procedure is to state the problem on the Inspection/Test Record (ITR) form BQF-003, which can be ordered free from Lab stock

supplies with stock number S-80507. Another form that can be used is the Supplier Correction Action Request (SCAR) form BQF-005, obtainable from Marvin Shear, BNL Quality Assurance Office, Bldg. 902B. Then mail or fax the complaint to Frederick Altrui Bldg 355 fax Ext 5499

Altrui, a DCP contracts administrator, handles the Vendor Evaluation Program, which forms a part of BNL's overall quality assurance program. Altrui stores the data and sees that the vendor is informed that a shipment has been made that does not comply with BNL requirements. The vendor is then asked to take corrective action so that the correct goods or services are supplied.

The Vendor Evaluation Program was established to give DCP one central point for all information on vendors who provide noncompliant goods and services. The same vendor can give rise to several complaints. With an overall picture of difficulties as they arise, DCP can take prompt action on an official basis. The result should be better quality service for everyone.

Explained Altrui, "Our procedure gives a company a reasonable chance to improve its service. If the situation reoccurs, we may suspend business with that vendor. To do this, however, (continued on page 2) **Ini** Lecture:

The AGS Booster — On the Way to RHIC

Since the early 1980s, BNL physicists have had their eyes on the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) - an accelerator with which to probe a hitherto unexplored energy regime with colliding beams of the heaviest ion species at energies of 100 billion electron volts (GeV) per

But BNL physicists have been doing a lot more than dreaming about RHIC: They've been working hard to make it a reality. And a major part of this effort has been the Booster, a small but mighty synchrotron in which ions as heavy as gold can be preaccelerated to circulate in the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS), so it can serve as the injector for RHIC.

The Booster completed the transition from dream to reality last month, when, on March 16, it operated flawlessly to preaccelerate heavy ions for the 1992 heavyion physics run at the AGS. One of the BNL physicists for whom this was a proud, long-awaited moment - but no surprise - was Wu-Tsung (Bill) Weng, head of the Accelerator Division in the AGS Department.

As Booster Project Manager since 1987, Weng has guided the Booster smoothly through many milestones on schedule and within budget. Now, he will guide the Lab community through those milestones and those yet to come, when he delivers the next Brookhaven Lecture, on Thursday, April 16, at 4 p.m., in Berkner Hall. Weng's talk about "The AGS Booster - On the Way to RHIC" will be introduced by AGS Department Chairman Derek

As Weng will explain, the Booster was required to enhance AGS performance — not only for heavy-ion physics but also to increase proton intensity for the high energy physics programs.

Weng will discuss the major design and construction issues such a machine presented, including the need for ultrahigh vacuum and a versatile radio-frequency system. Then, after describing the stages of construction of the Booster and its major systems, he will share the commissioning results in such areas as: spiraling, tune, orbit, chromaticity, acceleration, phase and radial feedbacks, and AGS injection.

The Booster commissioning and the consequent increase in proton intensity and circulating current, Weng will explain, greatly enhance the AGS's already acknowledged status as a "kaon factory." And, by making it possible for the AGS to accelerate ions as heavy as gold, the Booster opens the way to exciting new physics with RHIC. Weng will also comment on the general functions of a booster and the purpose it serves in an accelerator complex.

Bill Weng earned his M.S. in physics at Taiwan's National Tsing-Hua University in 1968. He then came to the State University of New York at Stony Brook to pursue a Ph.D. in physics, which he received in 1974.

Weng came to BNL in 1977, as an accelerator physicist in the then Accelerator Department. He headed the Accelerator Physics Section of the AGS Division from 1980 until 1983, when he left the Lab to become an accelerator physicist at the Stanford Linear Accelerator Center.

Returning to Brookhaven in 1987 as an accelerator physicist in the AGS Department, Weng also became Booster Project Manager. In 1990, he was named Accelerator Division Head.

Weng is a member of the American Physical Society and a senior member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE), for which he chairs the Accelerator Science and Technology Committee.

According to Flack, this annual event gives young black college men and women an opportunity to exchange scientific information as well as present scholarly research papers in a formal competition. One of the highlights of the meeting was the awarding of cash prizes to student presenters of the top three undergraduate papers in biology, chemistry, computer science, mathematics, physics, psychology and science education.

Representatives from numerous colleges, universities and businesses also set up exhibits in an effort to recruit young minority talent, says Flack.

For his return engagement, Carrere will recap his first lecture, given on February 4. At that time, he presented the thesis that parents and their adolescent children are ripe for conflict, given that adolescence is a time of rebellion against parental authority and that parents of teens are usually undergoing their own mid-life crisis at the same time.

Then, Carrere will open the microphone to questions, and offer strategies and solutions to problem situations so that parents may avoid a battle of wills over control issues with their teenagers in the future.

we must have documented complaints from Lab personnel — such as we get on the ITR or SCAR forms."

Victor Gutierrez, a senior quality assurance engineer in the Director's Office, agrees and wants to make more Lab staff aware of the Vendor Evaluation Program. So he submitted a suggestion to the Employee Suggestion Program to the effect that an article in the Bulletin would be helpful in publicizing the program's importance.

Altrui welcomed this idea. "For this kind of program to work, it needs the support of all who are involved," he said. "With timely information, DCP can prevent poor quality goods and service — to everyone's advantage."

She will discuss "Some Studies of the Structure-Function Relationship in the Enzyme Superoxide Dismutase.'

Cabelli, who first came to BNL as a research associate in 1981, will describe how changing amino acids, the building blocks of proteins, by site-selective mutagenesis can affect the reactivity of the enzyme superoxide dismutase (SOD) towards its substrate, superoxide. As Cabelli will explain. BNL has become an important center for activity studies on SOD because the superoxide (negatively charged dioxygen) can be cleanly generated using radiation chemistry.
