
Grumman Execs Tour Lab

BNL's Accelerator Test Facility (ATF) was one stop on an afternoon tour taken Tuesday, September 29, by four Grumman executives: (center) Robert Myers, President and Chief Operating Officer; (left, top to bottom) John Keenan, Vice President for Advanced Development-Electronic Systems; Tony Favale, Director of Advanced Projects; and Robert Byrnes, Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) Dipole Project Manager. They are shown here with BNL Deputy Director Martin Blume (to Byrnes' right) and (clockwise from top right) Ilan Ben-Zvi, Deputy Head of the Center for Accelerator Physics (CAP), of which the ATF is the centerpiece; BNL Director Nicholas Samios; Robert Palmer, who heads CAP; and Herbert Kinney, Special Assistant to the Director.

Each area on the executive's tour had some connection to Grumman. For example, Grumman is involved with some of the pieces for the ATF's electron gun. The group also visited the National Synchrotron Light Source, where Grumman has worked with x-ray lithography; as well as the RHIC site and the magnet factory, which both represent Grumman's role in building 373 superconducting dipole magnets for RHIC.

The RHIC dipole contract was signed on June 23, and, on September 14, Grumman formally cut the ribbon on its new manufacturing center for superconducting dipole magnets, signalling that production is ready to begin.

A wrap-up by Samios and Blume concluded the executives' visit. "We touched on the possibility of increasing the number of Grumman people taking part in research programs here and of BNL people, where appropriate, spending



time at Grumman," said Blume. "In our effort to help industry, we would like to tie the two organizations together. We are all intimately involved in Long Island and Long Island technology.'

Conducting Polymers Subject of CRADA

BNL has signed a Cooperative Research and Development Agreement (CRADA) with Moltech Corporation of Stony Brook, New York, to work jointly on developing new electric-charge conducting and redox polymers.

Brookhaven researchers involved in the CRADA are James McBreen, Hung Sui Lee and Xiao-Qing Yang, all of the Department of Applied Science. They will work principally with Moltech's Terje Skotheim.

Polymers resemble plastics, which

are usually insulators. Conducting polymers, however, behave as their name implies: They can conduct electrons, in much the same way as metals do, or they can conduct ions, as do liquid electrolytes. Redox polymers, in an oxidation-reduction process, store charge much like a battery electrode.

Under the CRADA, Brookhaven and Moltech will be working on both ion-conducting and redox polymers. The joint effort will focus on synthesizing new polymers and using them

in making batteries and related components.

According to McBreen, an electrochemist, BNL will synthesize new lithium polymers and sodium polymers, and Moltech will use the new materials to make components and cells of lithium polymer and sodium polymer batteries. The products will then be characterized at BNL, by means of electrochemical measurements and various spectroscopic techniques.

Conducting polymer work at Brookhaven was started by Skotheim in 1987, in collaboration with Yoshi Okamoto at New York Polytechnic University. Skotheim formed Moltech in 1988 to continue the development of a number of material technologies developed jointly by BNL and Polytechnic. In 1991, he left to work full-time for Moltech.

Scientists are interested in conducting polymers because of their potential use in extremely powerful, rechargeable batteries. Such batteries have a long shelf life, so they can sit unused for a decade or more without any noticeable loss of power. Polymer-based batteries could replace conventional batteries and open the way for even broader applications of batteries, such as for long-term energy storage.

Funding for BNL's participation in this CRADA comes from the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Energy Research, Basic Energy Sciences Division, Materials Sciences — Mona S. Kowe

In Chemical Releases, Training Pays

In many situations involving chemical spills or releases, untrained individuals who try to alleviate the danger can easily make matters worse.

Places such as BNL, therefore, must follow the Occupational Safety and Health Administration's "Hazardous Waste Operations and Emergency Response" regulation, which requires that employees be trained to respond to such emergencies.

"A course in chemical emergency response was given at Brookhaven last Tuesday, September 29, by Hazmat TISI, Inc." said Doan Hansen, who is the Safety and Environmental Protection (SEP) Division's Chemical Emergency Planner. "Twenty-four people attended, largely from SEP and the Plant Engineering and Safeguards & Security Divisions. I attended also, to make sure that what was taught was appropriate for BNL employees' needs. The course was a success, and feedback from the attendees was extremely positive."

Hansen explained that there are several levels of training and responsibility that must be provided to deal with chemical emergencies. To begin with, there is the "First-Responder Awareness" level, when, in the event of a chemical release or potential release, the only requirement is that employees, guests or visitors call Ext. 2222 to notify BNL emergency response personnel. Eventually, all Lab employees will be trained at the First Responder Awareness level.

At the next level, "First Responder Operations," employees learn to respond to chemical releases defensively, from a distance (see photo). Tuesday's course was at this level, (continued on page 2)

Every year at this time, the days get shorter, there's a change in the weather — and the nation observes Fire Prevention Week. This year, that observance comes during the week of October 4-10.


Joseph Levesque of the Fire Protection Engineering Group in the Safety & Environmental Protection (SEP) Division, is coordinating BNL's efforts for Fire Prevention Week. The goal is to raise employees' fire-safety consciousness both in the home and in the workplace.

One critical issue in the workplace, Levesque explains, is fire-safety housekeeping. "Housekeeping to make sure an area is fire safe is very different from housekeeping for aesthetics," he says.

To underscore this point, next week has been designated as a time for Lab employees to take a hard look at their work areas. Says M. Sue Davis, Acting Associate Director for Reactor, Safety & Security, "I request that all employees allocate time during the next week to look at their operations with a critical eye. Clean up the excess trash, throw out the combustibles that have been sitting there unused for months. Look over the arrangement of your workplace. Is it as safe as you want it to be?"

The three- and four-year-olds at the Upton Nursery School learned how to escape from a burning building during last year's Fire Prevention Week Activities.


Last year at the Child Development Center, BNL Fire Chief James Roesler introduced the preschoolers to Sam, a fire truck robot. Later, the children learned how to "stop, drop, roll" to put out a clothing fire.



In addition to practicing good housekeeping at home, all Suffolk County residents are being asked to practice EDITH — Exit Drills in the Home — on Thursday, October 8, at 7 p.m. Joseph Jahelka, Department of Nuclear Energy, is coordinating Operation EDITH for the Suffolk County Fire Educators Safety Association. "Plan your exits!" he

stresses. "Assure that all members of your household know at least two ways to get out from all areas of the house. Assure that your smoke detector works by testing it once a month."

Finally, to make sure the fire-safety message reaches the youngest members of the Lab community, SEP's Fire/Rescue Group will make special visits to the Child Development Center (CDC), the CDC Kindergarten and the Upton Nursery School next week, to be followed by field trips to the BNL Firehouse, Bldg. 599.



Discover America and New Physics With Heavy Ions at APS Meeting

As the home of the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC), which is now under construction, BNL has been chosen as the location for the 108th meeting of the New York State Section of the American Physical Society (APS) — a symposium focusing on "New Physics With Heavy Ions." In addition to talks related to relativistic heavy ion physics, speakers will address new areas of atomic and solid-state physics that are also being investigated with beams of heavy ions.

The two-day, 67th annual symposium will run Friday and Saturday, October 16-17. The daytime program features 12 invited lectures by leading researchers from academic institutions and other laboratories (see Weekly Calendar). On Friday night at 8:15 p.m., BNL Senior Chemist Garman Harbottle will give a public talk entitled "Were the Vikings Here First? Evidence From Carbon-14 Dating," in Berkner Hall.

Pointing out that many U.S. students learn that Christopher Columbus, in 1492, was the first European to reach America, Harbottle will explain how evidence from archaeological expeditions by Helge Ingstad in the 1960s, along with sensitive carbon dating recently performed at

BNL, indicates that the Vikings first explored northeastern Canada, from Kodlunarn Island to Newfoundland, about 500 years earlier.

Allen Goland, of BNL's Department of Applied Science (DAS), is the Chair of the APS New York State Section and a member of the meeting's Local Committee, along with Chellis Chasman, Physics Department, and Brant Johnson, DAS.

Goland stressed, "Besides Dr. Harbottle's open lecture, which is free and should be of interest to the general public, the symposium is intended for non-specialists. The lectures are planned at a general interest level so that physicists working in other areas will understand them."

The registration fee for the entire program is \$23 for nonmembers of the APS, but the fee will be waived for those who attend only one or two lectures. Registration will take place on Friday, October 16, at 8 a.m. in the Seminar Room Lounge of Physics, Bldg. 510, where the first day's session will be held. The second day's lectures will take place in Berkner Hell

teaching techniques of defensive response as well as the knowledge of when to get additional help.

"Hazardous Material Technician" is the third level, in which aggressive action is taken to control or stop a chemical release. Said Hansen, "At BNL, these responders are from the SEP Fire/Rescue Group. They might use protective equipment in plugging or repairing whatever is necessary to stop a release."

In addition, Lab employees such as industrial hygienists, health physicists and environmental monitoring personnel may be trained to be "Hazardous Materials Specialists." They may participate in planning, training and interacting with off-site agencies. "Incident Commanders," such as the BNL Fire Chief, are trained to direct an emergency response.
