

DOE Awards BNL's Parke Rohrer For Contractor Program Management

Exactly 25 years ago this month, E. Parke Rohrer first took his engineering skills to the scientific community, beginning his long association with the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) and its predecessor agencies.

Today, Rohrer is BNL's Associate Director for Management and Physical Plant, with many singular achievements to his credit — including successfully leading BNL's effort in the development of superconducting magnets for the Superconducting Super Collider (SSC). For his considerable contributions, Rohrer has once again been recognized by DOE, which named him one of the first three recipients of the Secretary's Outstanding Contractor Program Manager Award.

Consisting of \$20,000 and a commemorative memento, this new award was established last December. William Happer, Director of DOE's Office of Energy Research, came to BNL this Tuesday, January 19, to present the award to Rohrer, on behalf of Energy Secretary James Watkins.

"This is the first year that we have given an award for excellence in management to contractors," Happer said, "and we are extremely pleased with the work that Parke Rohrer has done over the years for DOE. Admiral Watkins takes a very personal interest in this. He is very proud of the good work that was done on the SSC magnets, and his wife, in particular, is very proud of the Child Development Center here. So Parke has very good press back at DOE!"

The award recognizes contractor

program managers for excellence in the supervision of a specific DOE-sponsored activity. The honorees have exhibited excellent leadership, financial responsibility, and responsiveness to DOE direction and to environment, safety and health issues. The other two recipients in this program's first year are Stanley Bull, National Renewable Energy Laboratory, and Wendell Weart,

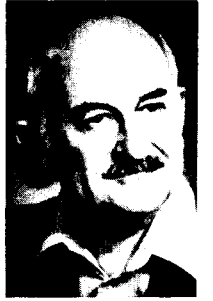
Sandia National Laboratories.

BNL Director Nicholas Samios was extremely pleased with Rohrer's selection, saying, "There is no individual more deserving of this award than Parke Rohrer. This acknowledges in a meaningful way what all of us already know — Parke is an engineer and manager of the first rank."

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Reappointments Announced

Norman Sutin, first named Chairman of the Chemistry Department in January 1988, has accepted a reappointment to that position, effective December 1, 1992.



In announcing Sutin's second term, Laboratory Director Nicholas Samios noted, "The Chemistry Department has a vibrant and diverse scientific program utilizing many of the unique facilities at our laboratory. It is important that we not only maintain but also expand this nationally recognized program of excellence."

Toward this end, Samios continued, "The Laboratory is indeed fortunate to have Norman accept this reappointment, for he is both an outstanding scientist and a superb leader. I look forward to working with him once more."

Sutin was granted his Ph.D. in chemistry from Cambridge University, England, in 1953. He came to BNL's Chemistry Department as a research associate in 1956, and, after a series of promotions, was granted tenure in 1963 and named Senior Chemist in 1966.

Sutin earned the 1983 award for Distinguished Service in the Advancement of Inorganic Chemistry from the American Chemical Society and the 1985 Award in Photochemistry from the New York Academy of Sciences. He was elected to the National Academy of Sciences in 1990.

ADD Winds up Mission; Staff Goes on to RHIC

On January 1, 1993, an organizational change marked the end of the Accelerator Development Department (ADD).

Having successfully completed its mission for the Laboratory, the department was decommissioned. Staff now continue their work under the aegis of the RHIC Project, headed

by Satoshi Ozaki, who was also the second and last ADD Chairman.

ADD was formed in April 1986, under the chairmanship of Eric Forsyth, as an umbrella organization for a number of large accelerator projects at the Laboratory. These included the Booster Project, the Superconducting Super Collider

(SSC) Magnet Program, advanced accelerator research and development (R&D) under the High Energy Physics Program, and the technical development of the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC).

Said Ozaki, "With the winding down of the Department's commitment to the SSC magnet program and with the growth of the RHIC Project, this was an appropriate time to close the ADD. This will create an opportunity to concentrate the skills and talents of the ADD people more fully on the construction of RHIC."

The major energies of the group will thus be firmly focused on the future — RHIC. And this focus is made stronger by the significant milestones of the past.

For example, the success story of the Booster Project, under the leadership of Bill Weng, was ongoing from the ceremonial tunnel groundbreaking in September 1987 through the moment on May 29, 1991, when the Booster operated flawlessly to preaccelerate protons for the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron (AGS) and then, on March 16, 1992, heavy ions. Building the Booster was a Lab team effort with ADD staff performing the early design and construction phase. Then, in 1989, the final construction and integration of the Booster into the AGS was transferred to the AGS Department.

In the equally successful SSC program, ADD built some of the first SSC dipole magnets. The first, short version of the dipole was tested in December 1990 and operated at a magnetic field that exceeded the

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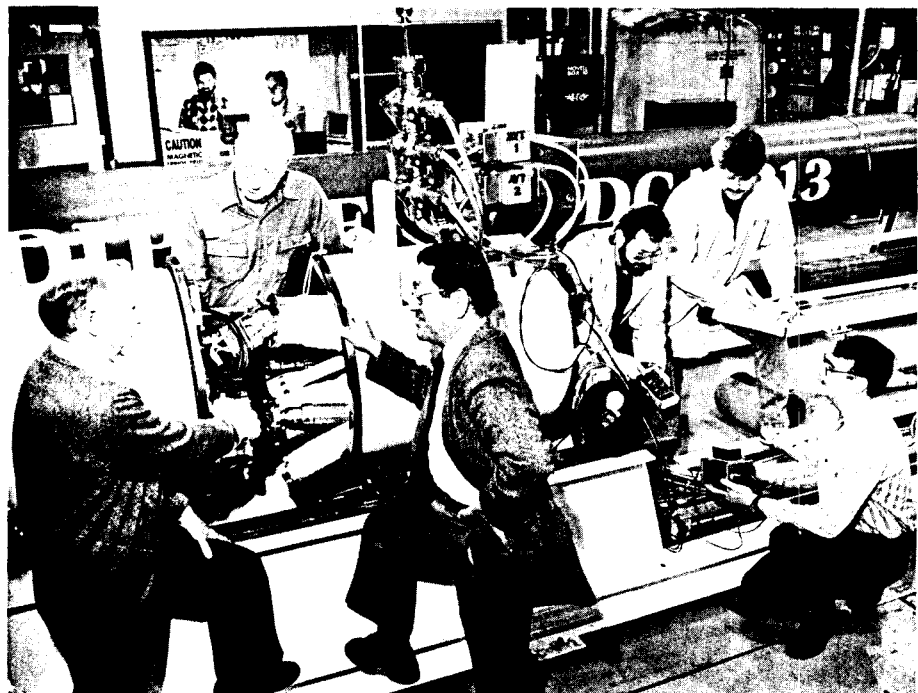
Head of the Safety & Environmental Protection Division since January 1988, W. Robert Casey was reappointed to that position, effective January 1.

With a 1966 M.S. in physics from Vanderbilt University, Casey joined SEP in 1973, as a health physicist heading a health physics and safety group assigned to the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron. Among his moves up the career ladder, Casey served as Deputy Division Head, 1980-85.

In addition to other service to professional societies and DOE, Casey is now President-Elect of the American Academy of Health Physics.

For his part, Rohrer said, "Riggers and technicians, engineers and scientists — so many people at BNL, all the way up to the Lab Director, have given me so much support over the years that I am really quite humbled by this award. I especially want to thank Erich Willen and the entire Magnet Division, without whose help this award would not have been possible. I am truly grateful to the many fine men and women who have helped along the way. As a licensed professional engineer, it's been a privilege working with scientists within the scientific community."

In turn, the scientific community has good reason to thank Parke Rohrer. In mid-1987, for example, Rohrer accepted the challenge of leading BNL's effort to develop superconducting magnets for the SSC. When Rohrer began this effort, the magnets' aperture was designed to be 4 centimeters (cm) in diameter. But, in 1990, the SSC design changed, necessitating an increase in the

aperture to 5 cm.

Rohrer's team handled this major design and manufacturing challenge rapidly and effectively, with two results: The SSC major magnet program at BNL was completed on time and within budget in 1992, and Rohrer received a DOE Distinguished Associate Award in 1991.

As BNL's Associate Director for Management and Physical Plant, Rohrer is responsible for three divisions — Central Shops, Contracts & Procurement and Plant Engineering — and for three staff groups. In this capacity, during the same period as his SSC work, Rohrer had several noteworthy accomplishments.

For example, Rohrer secured an agreement with the New York Power Authority (NYPA) for an additional 15 megawatts of low-cost electrical power to support program expansion at BNL. This power is being phased in over three years, beginning in 1992. In the first year of operation of BNL's Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider, planned for 1997, it will increase the Lab's annual NYPA cost savings by \$3 million, for a total annual

savings of \$11 million.

Rohrer has also overseen the successful completion of more than \$50 million in conventional construction at BNL, including the tunnels connecting the Tandem Van de Graaff with the new Booster for the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, completed in 1991, and the Central Chilled Water Facility, commissioned in 1990.

Under Rohrer's leadership also, an automated maintenance-management system, widely recognized by DOE as the best in the DOE system, was developed and implemented, in 1988. Further, in 1991, a Quality Assurance Program for Research was developed, which originated many concepts later adopted by DOE.

Rohrer began his career in 1952, with a B.S. in mechanical engineering from New York University. After some years of project mechanical engineering with large manufacturing corporations, he joined Daniel, Mann, Johnson & Mendenhall (DMJM), a California-based international consulting engineering firm, in 1961. Rohrer spent five years in

Tokyo as Far East Manager, designing and building large military facilities in Japan, Korea and Okinawa.

While with DMJM, Rohrer first worked with the scientific community: He was general manager of the joint venture of architects and engineers that built Fermi National Accelerator Laboratory, 1968-74.

Leaving DMJM in 1976, Rohrer became an independent consultant and was soon welcomed by BNL as a special consultant for the conventional facilities for the colliding beam accelerator (CBA) project, known then as ISABELLE. In 1981, He was named Deputy Project Head. After the CBA project was canceled in 1983, Rohrer left BNL, expecting to retire. But he was lured out of retirement and back to Brookhaven in 1986, when he joined the Directorate.

Looking back on his long and fruitful career, Rohrer reflected, "The Bible says, 'Whatever you do, work at it with all you heart as working for the Lord, and not for men.' That has always been my philosophy. The Lord has been most gracious to my wife Jan and me."

design value by 12 percent. The development of the remaining prototype R&D dipole magnets followed, until the manufacture of the 8,000 magnets needed for the SSC could be taken over by industry.

In this regard, ADD was involved in all aspects of technology transfer — not only in training industry to build magnets, but also, in improving processing methods for superconducting magnet wires and cable. While most of the SSC magnet development work is completed, work related to technology transfer and magnet tests for the SSC will continue at a certain level under the RHIC Project.

Other work undertaken by ADD focused on superconducting magnet R&D for future accelerators. This included developing and testing superconducting materials, and designing and building magnet cryostats, or cooling apparatus. Developing and testing the new superconducting magnets and cables led to BNL's becoming a testing center for other laboratories and industries throughout the world.

Research in ADD ranged widely. One improved design for RHIC magnet posts saved BNL about \$6.3 million. In other studies, computer models were created to simulate the behavior of circulating particles in storage rings and techniques were developed to reduce beam bunch growth due to random motion of the particles in each bunch.

As RHIC Project Head, Ozaki will continue to oversee some parts of this research as well as the remaining SSC Magnet Program.

Summed up Ozaki, "Job well done! We are now a unified project, working toward 1997 — the commissioning of RHIC."

New Dental Plan Option: Enrollment Now Open

As previously announced, a second option, called CIGNA Dental Care, will be added to the Laboratory's dental program, effective March 1. So, between now and February 5, eligible BNL employees may enroll in the CIGNA Dental Care Plan.

In addition, during this enrollment period:

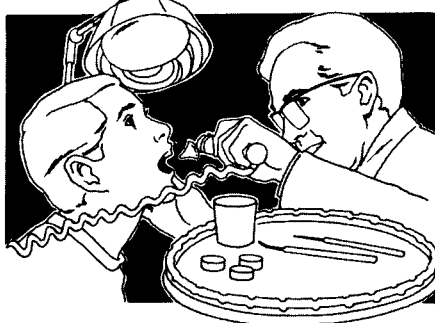
- Employees who are currently enrolled in the AUI Dental Assistance Plan administered by Eastern Benefit Systems and who do not wish to make changes at this time do not have to do anything. To change from the AUI Plan to the CIGNA Plan, however, an employee must send a completed CIGNA Dental Plan enrollment form to Personnel Services, Bldg. 185. Employees who want to discontinue their current enrollment in the AUI Dental Plan and do not want to switch to CIGNA must notify Personnel Services, Ext. 2877.

- Employees enrolled in either the AUI Plan or the CIGNA Plan may make their required contributions on a before-tax basis, through a salary-reduction option. Those who are not currently exercising this option may now sign up for it by contacting Personnel Services.

With the CIGNA Dental Care Plan, there are no claim forms, no deductibles, no costs for many basic dental services and reduced fees for complex dental procedures. Benefits are provided by dentists participating in the CIGNA Plan. A packet providing detailed information about this new dental benefit option and a list of participating dentists was distributed Labwide earlier this week.

CIGNA Dental Care Plan representatives will be at Berkner Hall the next two Tuesdays, January 26 and February 2, from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., to answer employees' questions.
