BNL to Help Textile Industry

A low-tech industry that accounts for about 10 percent of the manufacturing jobs in America, the U.S. textile industry has been suffering a steady loss of jobs to foreign competition.

When representatives of the textile industry approached the U.S. Department of Energy for help, it was thought that the industry would be an ideal candidate for a partnership with government. And that is how and why the American textile partnership, AMTEX, was created.

AMTEX is a unique collaboration

involving the Department of Energy (DOE), DOE's national laboratories and the American textile industry. The AMTEX partnership is a new DOE effort to use capabilities resident at the various DOE laboratories to solve U.S. industry's technical problems and improve its competitiveness in a global market.

On May 25 and 26, BNL hosted a meeting of the AMTEX Operating Committee, which selected one of nine projects for DOE funding. That project will involve BNL's Computing and Communications Division.

Information Superhighway Coming

Supercomputers strung together and connected to smaller computers via fiber optic cable is the scenario envisioned for not only a national information superhighway as proposed by the Clinton administration, but also for regional networks.

In a pilot project for a regional network, BNL has joined the State University of New York at Stony Brook, Cablevision and Grumman Data Systems to establish a high-speed network connection among themselves.

Called the asynchronous transmission mode (ATM) collaboration, the four institutions are exploring possible uses of the network. So far,

possible applications include transferring medical images from one facility to another, holding video conferences using desktop computers, and setting up and controlling experiments from remote locations. More suggested uses are encouraged and welcome.

BWIS-Biology Department Seminar A New DNA-Binding Motif

When is a box not box-shaped? When the structure of what is called the HMG box was found to be L-shaped.

The distinctive shape of the HMG box and its discovery using two-dimensional nuclear magnetic resonance imaging will be discussed by its primary elucidator: Jean Thomas, Professor of macromolecular biochemistry at the University of Cambridge, England, and Fellow of the Royal Society. Sponsored by Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS) and the Biology Department, Thomas's talk, entitled "Structure and Properties of the HMG Box: A New DNA-Binding Motif," will take place on Thursday, June 10, at 3:45 p.m., in the Seminar Room of Bldg. 463. All are invited.

As Thomas will explain, HMG is short for high mobility group, an abundant set of proteins that has been found to be similar from species to species. Implicated in the replication and transcription of chromosomes, the role of these proteins remains elusive. While found bound to chromosomes, HMG proteins do not seem to bind to specific chromosomal sites.

Each HMG binding domain is known as an HMG box. For instance, one such protein, called HMG1, has two domains that bind to DNA. In unfolding the mystery of the approximately 80 amino acid residues within an HMG box of the HMG1 protein, Thomas uncovered not only its structure, but also biochemical reasons as to how and why it binds to DNA by bending one strand or bridging two.

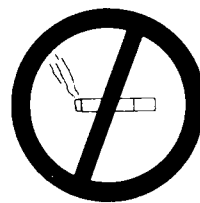
Jean Thomas received her Ph.D. in organic chemistry from the University of Wales in 1967. This was followed by a Beit Memorial Fellowship for Medical Research at the MRC Laboratory for Molecular Biology, 1967-69. After obtaining her M.A. from Cambridge, 1969, she taught at the university, moving up the ranks to her present title of Professor in 1991. Since 1969 as well, she has been associated with New Hall College at Cambridge, for which she served as Vice President, 1983-87. In 1985, the University of Cambridge awarded her a Sc.D.; in 1986, she became a fellow of the Royal Society; and, in 1992, the University of Wales granted her an honorary D.Sc.

In banning smoking from virtually every buildings on site, the Lab is enacting a policy similar to those now in force at the White House, the headquarters of the U.S. Department of Energy and several of its other national laboratories.

Gregory Van Tuyle, Deputy Head of the Division of Advanced Technologies in the Department of Nuclear Energy, will deliver the next Brookhaven Lecture. On Wednesday, June 16, his talk, entitled "Making Tritium Using Accelerators," will begin at 4 p.m. in Berkner Hall. All are invited.

Nobel laureate James D. Watson, Director of Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory and codiscoverer of the molecular structure of DNA, will deliver the 22nd Pegrum Lecture Series entitled "Beyond the Double Helix."

- Friday, June 18, at 4 p.m., "The Human Genome Project" — Watson, who directed the National Institutes of Health component of the Human Genome Project from 1988-92, will give his insights into its ethical implications.
