

Retirees Return to Give the Gift of Life

When BNL employees arrive at the Brookhaven Center to donate blood on June 15-17, they may see some familiar faces. This year, Lab retirees have been invited to return to their former workplace to give the gift of life alongside current BNLers, visitors, guests, and their friends and family.

In fact, some retirees have already beaten employees in the friendly race to get their pledge cards back to Blood Drive Chair Susan Foster, Bldg. 185, before today's deadline for a raffle of five \$50 gift certificates to area restaurants.

One such retiree, former computer analyst Marilyn McKeown, who retired from the Physics Department in August 1989 and lives in Brookhaven Hamlet, says she tries to maintain her record of giving blood twice a year since completing her more than 40 years of service at the Lab.

"I'm a firm believer in giving blood," she said. "It was convenient when I worked at the Lab, and it still seems convenient today — you know the setup and the people, and you can see friends you haven't seen."

Bernard Brehm, a Shoreham resident who retired from the Plant Engineering Division as a

tower lineperson in July 1990, also plans to give blood in the June drive and has already sent in his pledge card.

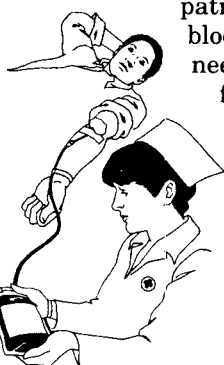
"I always like to come to the Lab, so usually I wait for the Lab blood drive," said Brehm, who worked at BNL for 25 years. "Giving blood has become a habit."

But retirees are only one part of the BNL community who can give blood, Foster emphasized. Every pint is needed to help victims of violent crime, automobile accidents and other injuries recuperate from their wounds, and to provide for

patients in need of organ or marrow transplants, or blood-component transfusions. Despite this increased need, blood donation rates have dropped, and a false fear of being infected with HIV, the AIDS virus, is keeping potential donors away.

BNL employees, their family and friends and, of course, retirees have a chance to fight that trend June 15-17 from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. in the convenient setting of the Brookhaven Center. Robert Serber, emeritus Professor of Physics at Columbia University, will deliver a Pegram Lecture Series collectively entitled "Peace and War," in three 8 p.m. talks, on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, June 7, 8 and 9.

Serber, a protégé of J. Robert Oppenheimer, played a key role in developing the first atomic bombs at Los Alamos National Laboratory and has remained involved in peacetime physics since World War II ended in 1945. He will give his eyewitness account in lectures entitled, respectively, "War: Berkeley and Los Alamos," "War: Tinian and Japan," and "Peace: Early Days at Berkeley, Cal Tech and Brookhaven."

Scientist Douglas Wallace, Department of Applied Science, will deliver the next Brookhaven Lecture on Wednesday, June 15. His talk about "Detecting the Oceans' Uptake of Fossil Fuel CO₂" will begin at 4 p.m. in Berkner Hall.
