VIPs Feted for Years of Service

There were 197 Very Important Persons (VIPs) invited to the 1994 Service Award Reception held in the Brookhaven Center on the evening of December 6. These VIPs included three employees who marked 45 years of Laboratory service during the past calendar year, 11 who realized 40 years at Brookhaven in 1994, another 26 who observed 35th anniversaries, 57 who completed 30 years at the Lab, and 37 for whom 1994 was their 25th anniversary year at BNL. Other VIPs included 49 Brookhaven employees who have between 36 and 39 years of service, 11 who have been with the lab between 41 and 44 years, two — Andrew Brems and Lewis Friedman — who have attained 46 years of BNL service, and one — Bernard Manowitz — who has been here throughout the 47 years that the Lab has been in existence.

In Memoriam

James Donald Cassidy, a senior technical specialist in the Department of Advanced Technology (DAT), died suddenly of a heart attack on December 6. He was 55.



Since first coming to the Lab on February 4, 1963, Cassidy served BNL nearly continuously through electrical and instrumentation work on many different projects. Most recently, he worked in the Department of Advanced Technology's Environment and Waste Technology Center as the main systems operator on the polyethylene encapsulation project led by Paul Kalb.

"Don was extremely versatile, had a lot of talent and was very bright," said Kalb. "He was also very friendly and got along with everyone, both personally and professionally."

In Kalb's lab, Cassidy found himself working in the same building —

830 — where he began his BNL career.

His first six years at the Lab were spent as an advanced technician in the Department of Nuclear Energy's High Intensity Radiation Development Laboratory. There, while helping to develop cobalt-60 sources for food irradiation and other purposes, he rose to the title of technician, then technical specialist.

In January 1969, he moved to the Department of Applied Science (DAS), where he was made senior technical specialist in July 1970. During this time, Cassidy was also active in the Brookhaven Employees Recreation Association's softball leagues.

In May 1972, Cassidy went to the Biology Department to help assemble the Scanning Transmission Electron Microscope; then, in February 1979, he transferred to the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron Department. Although he left BNL in June 1981, he returned in April 1985 as a guest research assistant at the National Synchrotron Light Source, responsible for the operations and maintenance of the Naval Research Laboratory's beam line X24C. Another separation in August 1990 lasted until his rehiring as

a senior technical specialist in DAT in May 1992.

Cassidy, a resident of Holbrook, is survived by eight children and five grandchildren.

The following retirees passed away recently:

Joseph Wojciechowitz, who retired from the Central Shops Division as a helper A on December 15, 1980, died on November 16. He was 76 years old. He was with the Lab for 21 years, having started in the Motor Vehicles Maintenance & Operations Group as a janitor on September 8, 1959.

William Gallagher, who was a Lab custodian with the Plant Engineering Division when he retired on August 2, 1985, died on November 28, at the age of 71. His 23 years at BNL began on February 19, 1962, when he joined the Plant Maintenance Division as a janitor.

'Tis the Season to Look Back

Snowflakes fall softly on the Laboratory on our holiday cover, which demonstrates the graphic artistry of Alan Schmidtchen, Photography & Graphic Arts Division. The photos inside the snowflakes highlight some of BNL's activities and successes reported in the Brookhaven Bulletin during 1994 (see key at right):

1. In August, the high-level task force appointed by Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary to evaluate the national laboratories and chaired by Robert Galvin (right) of Motorola, Inc., spent a day on site in discussion with senior management, including BNL Director Nicholas Samios (left).

2. In November, the international solar-neutrino research collaboration known as GALLEX, which includes

several BNL scientists, announced results confirming their previous findings that only about 60 percent of the number of solar neutrinos predicted by theory arrive on Earth.

3. In the tunnel for the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC) on August 5, RHIC Project Head Satoshi Ozaki (center) addressed BNLeers gathered to see the first of 373 superconducting dipole magnets lowered onto its stand — a major milestone on the way to RHIC's commissioning later this decade.

4. One of the 20 new Cooperative Research and Development Agreements that BNL signed this year was with Energy Conversion Devices, Inc., to develop materials for better batteries, a task falling to a group that includes: (from left) Myron Strongin, Mark Ruckman and Evelyn Gallego, all of the Physics Department.

5. Over 350 students and teachers participated in summer research programs at BNL this year, and one of them was Shakeeb Hamud of Somalia, shown here examining cell cultures in a Medical Department lab.

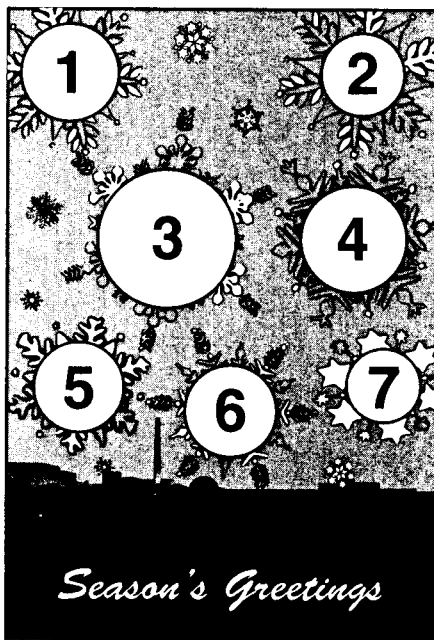
