

## Brookhaven Begins Multipatient Clinical Trial of BNCT

Continuing its ongoing research on boron neutron capture therapy (BNCT), Brookhaven's Medical Department has begun a multipatient clinical trial on patients with glioblastoma multiforme.

A type of brain cancer, glioblastoma multiforme affects about 7,000 Americans each year. Life expectancy is limited, with only a few percent of patients surviving beyond five years.

Under the protocol sanctioned by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, which became effective this month, Brookhaven will administer BNCT to a total of 28 patients, and the trial is expected to take about a year to complete. Collaborating with the Lab on this project is Beth Israel Medical Center in New York City.

Darrel Joel, Chairman of BNL's Medical Department and a member of the BNCT research team, said that a primary objective of this study is to determine whether BNCT, under the conditions administered, is a safe treatment for glioblastoma multiforme.

Previously, BNL's approach had been applied to a patient on September 13, 1994, under a single-patient FDA-sanctioned protocol.

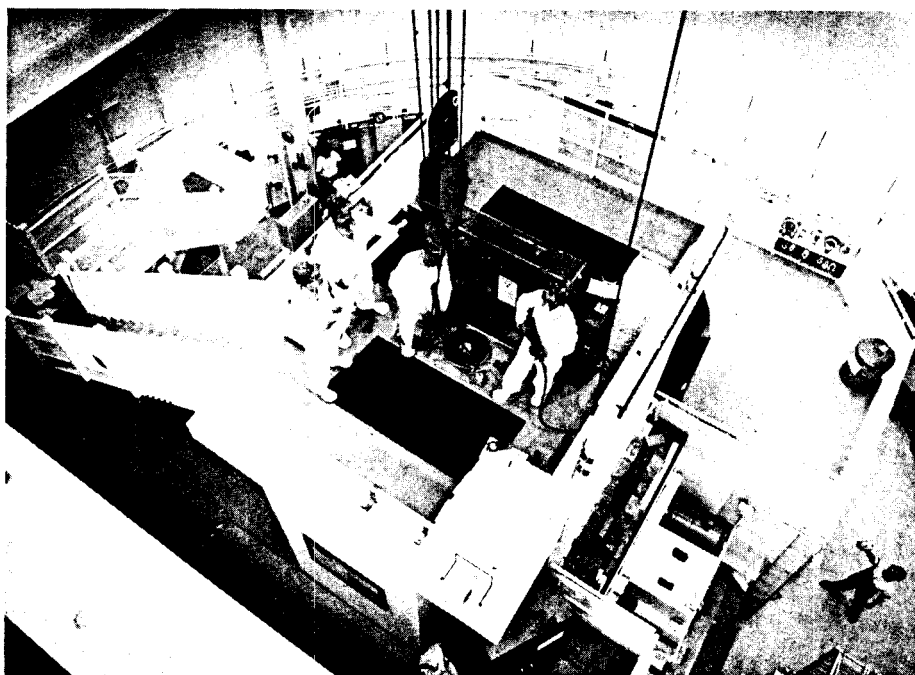
### BNCT: A Radiation Therapy

In BNCT, a compound containing the element boron is administered intravenously to the patient, in whom it accumulates preferentially in malignant tumor tissue. The tumor is then irradiated with low-energy neutrons produced by a nuclear reactor. Some of the boron atoms react with neutrons and then self-destruct, releasing powerful but very short-lived radiation selectively in the tumor.

Because the boron concentrates preferentially in the tumor cells, researchers hope that the cancer can be destroyed without the radiation's seriously affecting adjacent normal brain tissue.

### BNCT History

BNCT is not new. It was pioneered at BNL in the 1950s, and the Brookhaven Medical Research Reactor (BMRR) was built specifically to test the therapy. Clinical trials at

Brookhaven and at another reactor at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology were halted in 1961 because the results were disappointing. The boron compound used at that time did not preferentially accumulate in the tumor. Also, the low-energy neutron beam did not penetrate deeply enough into the patient's head to destroy the tumor without harming surrounding healthy tissue. Out of the 63 terminally ill people who volunteered for the treatment, most died of their tumors and several actually died one or two months earlier than expected from radiation-induced damage to their brains.

Though clinical trials ceased, BNL researchers continued to explore the promise of BNCT. It was the late Ralph Fairchild, said Joel, "who was the principal driving force that kept BNCT alive at BNL through the 1960s and 70s, and he was the key player in the design and testing of the first epithermal neutron beam at the BMRR."

That beam has been further enhanced recently and is one of two new

developments that have improved BNCT. The other is a new boron compound called BPA, which has been developed for use in treating malignant brain tumors principally at BNL.

The new combination — an epithermal neutron beam and BPA — has been very successful in animal studies, leading BNL researchers to try again using BNCT in clinical trials with humans.

BNCT of brain tumors is also being studied in Japan, where a limited number of patients are treated each year in an experimental program, and in Europe, although researchers there have not yet applied the therapy to humans. The boron compound BSH is

used in Japan and is the compound presently being considered for BNCT in Europe. Brookhaven's research with animals has suggested that BSH may be less effective than BPA for BNCT.

### The Clinical Trial at BNL

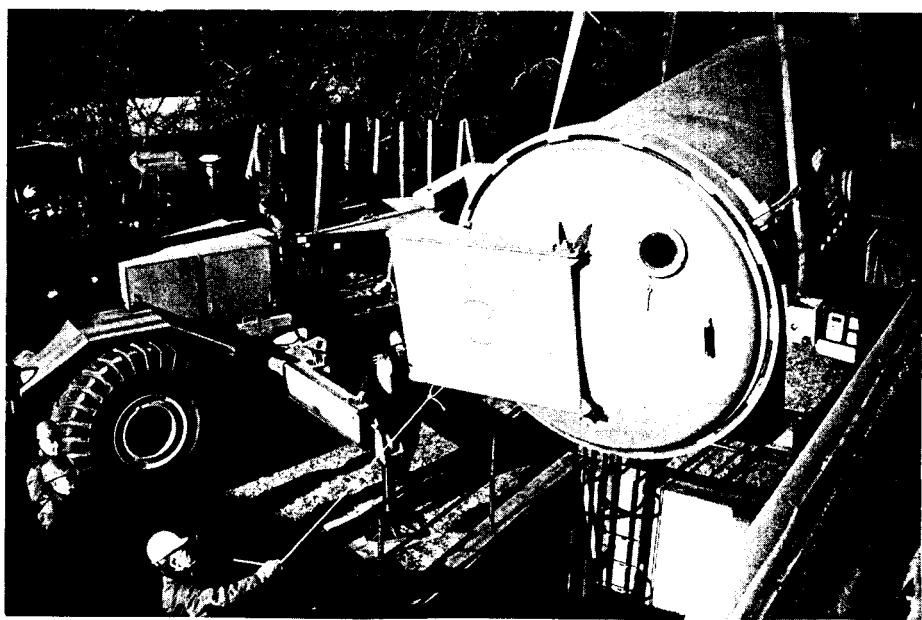
Because BNCT is considered experimental, Brookhaven's multipatient study is designed to establish the safety, the potential adverse effects and possibly the effectiveness of the therapy.

Patients eligible to participate in the clinical trial must meet certain criteria: At a minimum, they must be age 50 or over and must not have had any form of radiation or chemotherapy for their brain tumors. Other factors are also considered, such as location of the tumor.

To prepare for the clinical trials, Joel said that many people from various organizational units have worked tirelessly over many months. In addition to Medical Department staff, he credited collaborators from the Departments of Neurosurgery and Radiation Oncology at Beth Israel Medical Center, and personnel in the Reactor Division for preparing the BMRR for patients, the Plant Engineering Division for renovating areas of Bldg. 490 as necessary, the Safety & Environmental Protection Division for reviewing safety issues, the Public Affairs Office for handling calls from patients and their families inquiring about BNCT, and the Director's Office for addressing difficult administrative problems.

The BNCT program at Brookhaven is funded by the Office of Health and Environmental Research, within the U.S. Department of Energy's Office of Energy Research. — Mona S. Rowe

## Great Flying BNL Altitude Chambers!



Long Island may be rich in yard sales, but, at BNL, the leftover equipment of completed projects can save the bother of making even a short trip off site to look for bargains. So, when Stephen Springston and his group within the Department of Applied Science's Environmental Chemistry Division needed an altitude chamber to simulate flight conditions in testing airborne atmospheric monitoring equipment, they did not have to look far. A vast cylindrical tank, once used in the Medical Department for inhalation toxicology experiments, just fitted their requirements. So, on January 10, Plant Engineering Division riggers (in crane) Bill Sassono, (back, from left) Ken Wenger, Charles Spillett and Larry Johnson, headed by George Oldham (center, front), loaded the 12,000-liter tank onto the Lab's Pettibone crane and "flew" it from Medical to its new home in the basement of Bldg. 815. There, in the tank chamber, air pressure of altitudes ranging from sea level to 25,000 feet can be simulated. This allows equipment for monitoring all sorts of trace gases, from oxides of nitrogen to carbon monoxide to ozone, to be tested before an experimental flight, which is both safer and more cost efficient than putting untried instruments in an aircraft.

## Lab's On-Line Phone Book Improved

It's a common frustration around the BNL site: You need to contact someone — perhaps a visiting user at one of the Lab's many scientific facilities, or an acquaintance whose last name you didn't quite get — and you can't find them in the printed phone book. What to do?

For more than four years, BNLers have had a second source: the computerized version of the Lab phone directory, reached via the INFORM system run by the former Technical Information Division, now part of the Information Services Division (ISD). But updates to the on-line directory didn't always happen in a very timely fashion.

All that has changed. Since last December, INFORM's phone directory has had a new face, and a much more dynamic and user-friendly one at that.

Now, BNL computer users may look someone up knowing only a first or last name, an e-mail address, or even what a name sounds like. And, most important, the information will be up-to-date: BNLers' names, phone extensions, e-mail addresses and other data

can be changed in the on-line directory as often as the information changes, by trained representatives in each department, division or group.

The new system was designed by Betsy Schwartz, ISD. It includes options like searches and reports sorted by department code, building or phone extension, as well as routine name searches. Searching by a name will turn up anyone with that name, whether it's their first or last name. You can narrow the search by specifying a second parameter, or broaden it by using an asterisk at the end of part of a name; this "wildcard" asks the computer to search for any name that includes that root. For example, searching for "Rich\*" will give you all Richards, Richmans and Richardsons.

Schwartz is completing personal training sessions with department representatives this month. Representatives are the only ones able to make changes, additions and deletions to the directory — including adding temporary visitors and students; adding

# Some Heavy-Duty Recycling at Plant Engineering

If and when a major snowstorm hits this winter and it's time for Plant Engineering (PE) Division employees to salt BNL's roads, the two vehicles they'll use will look, well, a little different from the usual salt trucks.

Sure, they'll have heavy-duty bodies to carry four cubic yards of salt and a spreader, room for four crewmen to sit and bright lights to help in difficult driving conditions. But they were built that way for an entirely different reason — the two vehicles are actually "recycled" BNL fire trucks.

The trucks served the BNL Fire/Rescue Group as recently as autumn 1993, but were retired upon the arrival of new vehicles and sent to the salvage yard.

Last July, PE's Slim Blevins recognized that the trucks could be adapted for use as rigging and landscaping vehicles. Shortly thereafter, PE's heavy equipment mechanic operators stripped the 1979 Ward La France and 1980 American La France of their tanks and pumps in the PE garage, and gave them new fuel tanks, exhaust systems and drive shafts. Larry Lopez Truck Equipment Manufacturing Co. in Medford built and installed new flat steel bodies with removable sides, and a clean white paint job by Thrift Auto and Truck Painting of Coram completed the transformation.

The total cost of both overhauls was

\$10,900, far less than the \$35,000 that Site Supervisor Roy McWilliams estimates one new utility vehicle would cost. The new additions to PE's fleet can carry 11 tons, more than several existing rigging trucks, and have an additional advantage for winter use, McWilliams said.

"Previously, in order to put the salt bodies into service, we had to take the body off a truck and install the salt body," he explained. "But with this flat body, the trucks are heavy enough that you can set the salt body right on top, and quickly disconnect it."

Despite the mild winter so far, the

salt trucks have made their debut on several icy mornings and for the one substantial snowfall, on Saturday, February 4. But they won't be idle in the spring: They'll be used then to carry crews and equipment on landscaping and rigging jobs. With their solid construction, automatic trans-

missions, diesel engines and low mileage, McWilliams said that he expects the reincarnated trucks to have a long and useful second life. — Kara Villamil

extra phone numbers, fax numbers and pager numbers; and correcting errors that may have crept into the data file. The updated version will form the foundation for the 1996 printed copy of the site phone book.

So, now that many of the representatives have updated their files and the on-line directory is the most up-to-date version available to BNL employees, how do you use it?

### To Connect to INFORM . . .

There are two ways to connect to the INFORM system. Using your telnet software, type: telnet inform.bnl.gov and log in as "inform." Or, if you have a World Wide Web browser such as Mosaic or Netscape, click on the hypertext link to the Information Services Division, then on the INFORM link. This will start a telnet link, so click on "BNL users" or "BNL on-site access" and log in at the prompt as "inform."

At the INFORM menu, select op-

tion 9 for the phone directory, hit "Enter," then select option 1, "Search and Generate Reports," hit "Enter" again, and find yourself in the search menu. From there, you can opt to search for a person in several different ways, to generate a report, or to view the information printed in the "Yellow Pages" of the regular phone book, such as department listings and Long Island zip codes.

If you choose to generate a report listing people in any given department or building by name or by phone extension, you may print the file to your local printer, a printer in ISD, a disk, or even an e-mail file.

Check the list below for the name of a representative in your area. Let him or her know of any changes in your own information, and that of visitors and employees who must be added to or deleted from the directory. And be sure to look *yourself* up in several different ways, to check your information and familiarize yourself with this new and dynamic phone directory.

## In Memoriam

David Niebuhr, who was a senior technical specialist in the Computing & Communications Division, died on February 1, at the age of 53.

Niebuhr came to the Lab as a computer operator III in March of 1965, becoming a computer operator II, then I, in 1966 and 1967, respectively.

In 1972, he was made a technical specialist, and five years later, a computer operator shift supervisor. He attained his senior technical specialist position in 1983.

During his 30 years at the Lab, Niebuhr performed a wide variety of functions. His supervisor in Systems Support Services, Susan Sevia, recalled that he taught himself all kinds of program languages and was known for complete reliability — always being there when he was needed. In the '70s and '80s, among other responsibilities, he ran the large mass storage system whereby users could transfer data for off-line storage. More recently, he was responsible for machine accounting and the network operation center.

Sevia spoke for all her group in remembering that "Dave was always willing to interrupt whatever he was doing to help out a colleague. We'll all miss his selflessness, his special talents and his quiet dedication."

David Niebuhr was a resident of Mastic Beach. He is survived by his wife Barbara; four daughters, Kathleen, Sharon Ann, Patricia-Ann-Marie and Cheryl Jessica; his son, Laurence; and four grandchildren.

Nathan Levenson, who retired from the Mechanical Engineering Division (MED) on May 31, 1973, died on November 7, 1994, at the age of 86. Levenson joined

MED on July 15, 1965, as a design engineer II, a position he held until his retirement. Three years later, he returned to the Lab, on December 17, 1976, serving as a guest design engineer in the Accelerator Department until October 9, 1981.

Malcolm Johnson, who was acknowledged as the Lab's oldest retiree in the November 23, 1994, special issue of the Brookhaven Bulletin, died on January 7. He was 95 years old. Johnson was hired on October 17, 1949, as a technician A at the Brookhaven Graphite Research Reactor. He spent 15 years at the Lab before retiring on December 31, 1964, as a technical specialist II in the Physics Department.

Fred Meisenzahl, who retired from the Central Shops Division (CSD) on June 28, 1974, died on January 19. He was 85 years old. He had started at the Lab on August 10, 1959, as a metal worker in General Shops B, which became CSD the following year. When he retired 15 years later, he was a master metal worker.

Doralizer Tavarez, a former custodian in the Staff Services Division (SSD), died on January 15. She was 67 years old. She started at the Lab as a temporary custodian in SSD for five months beginning May 17, 1976, then returned in a permanent position on January 10, 1977. She retired on June 2, 1989.

John S. Bookless, who retired from the Department of Applied Science (DAS) on March 31, 1988, but returned as a consultant from August 1988 to July 1992, died on February 1, his 72nd birthday. He had started at the Lab as a junior technical specialist in the Nuclear Engineering Department, on January 4, 1957. Thirty-one years after joining BNL and 19 years after transferring to DAS in January 1969, he retired as a senior technical associate.

George R. Eleazer, whose BNL career touched several areas, died on February 5, at the age of 61. He came to the Lab on April 21, 1969, in the Applied Mathematics Department, transferring to the Plant Engineering (PE) Division as a janitor in June 1969. In August 1970, he joined the then Plant Protection & Security Division as a firefighter, serving as fire captain from 1976 to 1978. After three months on long-term disability (LTD) in 1980, he returned as a custodian. Except for four months in the Staff Services Division in 1981, he spent his last four years at BNL in PE. After going on LTD in December 1984, Eleazer officially retired on December 25, 1985.

# Marching Into a Busy Schedule for Women's History Month

Women's History Month will be observed throughout March at BNL, with some related activity to be found going on almost every workday of the month.

Women's Program Coordinator Victoria McLane said that while the month-long celebration focuses on women, "It is by no means for women only. The events are open—and should be interesting—to the entire Laboratory community."

Much of the Lab community has been involved in this cooperative effort, including: the Art Society and the Camera Club of the Brookhaven Employees Recreation Association, Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS), the Information Services Division (ISD), the Employee Assistance Program (EAP) and the Health Promotion

Program (HPP) of the Occupational Medicine Clinic, the Office of Educational Programs, the Office of Equal Opportunity, the Personnel Division, the Public Affairs Office and the Women's Programs Office.

The month's events will begin on Wednesday, March 1, with the opening of a new Camera Club exhibit. Featuring works by female club members and entitled "Through Her Eye," the exhibit will be on display outside the Cafeteria all month.

Also on display all month in the Berkner Hall lobby will be an exhibit highlighting prominent women, which will be updated each week and start with a display on "Women on Long Island."


EAP has planned three lunchtime programs that fit the month's theme: Outreach workshops on Tuesdays, March 7, 14 & 28, will focus on stress management, domestic violence and mothers and daughters, respectively. BWIS and HPP are teaming up to offer Healthline seminars on the Women's Health Initiative, on Tuesday, March 21, and on menopause, on Wednesday, March 29.

The month's other activities are centered around weekly themes:

- **Week of March 6, "Women in America"**— On Wednesday, March 8, which is International Women's Day, Barbara Kelly, Hofstra University professor and curator of the university's Special Collections, will give a noontime talk on "The Politics of House and Home."
- **Week of March 13, "Women in the Arts"**— On Thursday, March 16, historian Connie Koppelman, State University of New York (SUNY) at Stony Brook, will speak about "The Central Hall Gallery— Women's Art in the 1970s" at noon. And Tuesday through Friday, an arts and crafts

## Women of Color, Women of History


It's fitting that next week should include days in both Black History Month, which is being observed throughout February, and Women's History Month, since women of color are also important women of history. Among the many notable black women who have helped shape history are two who rose from slavery:



• **Sojourner Truth** was born a slave in New York State in 1797, and was once sold for \$100. After she was freed, she became an outspoken abolitionist and was known as "The Black Joan of Arc."

She made her points with actions as well as words. For example, Truth organized the first sit-in, refusing to leave President Abraham Lincoln's office until he dealt with the question of how the nation would help freed, unemployed slaves after the Civil War.

Sojourner Truth died in 1883.



• **Harriet Tubman**, born in 1826, helped more than 300 of her fellow slaves escape to freedom in the North via the Underground Railroad—and it is believed that she never lost a "railroad passenger." And no one ever collected the \$40,000 bounty offered for Tubman, dead or alive.

Because she led her people to freedom, they called this former slave "Moses." She was also honored for her assistance to the Union Army during the Civil War. Tubman died in 1913.
