

BWIS Awards Chasman Scholarship to East Patchogue Woman

Mary Carlucci-Dayton of East Patchogue was presented with this year's \$2,000 Renate W. Chasman Scholarship at a ceremony held at Berkner Hall on Thursday, August 29.

Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS) has offered the Chasman Scholarship annually since 1986 to a Long Island woman reentering school at the junior or senior undergraduate level or at the first-year graduate level in a degree program in the natural sciences, engineering or mathematics.

Carlucci-Dayton is a junior at the State University of New York (SUNY) at Stony Brook, where she is pursuing a B.S. in physics. She hopes eventually to earn an M.S. and go on to a career in optics and laser research.

A graduate of West Babylon High School, Carlucci-Dayton has been employed in the electronics industry on Long Island since 1977. She also took courses in accounting at Dowling College and in physics at Suffolk County Community College, 1984-94. Her education was interrupted in 1986, due to the birth of her son David, and again in 1989, when her daughter Cori was born.

Currently enrolled full-time at SUNY Stony Brook, Carlucci-Dayton is also working there part-time as a laboratory assistant, constructing, testing and calibrating laser-optical instruments.

In presenting the award to Carlucci-Dayton, Ruth Kempf, Chair of the BWIS Scholarship Committee, quoted a letter of recommendation from

Carlucci-Dayton's physics professor at SUNY Stony Brook, Harold Metcalf, in which he wrote: "... Mary is pleasant, polite, hardworking, enthusiastic and certainly an asset to our research lab. She embodies all the characteristics that will bring distinction to the holders of the scholarship."

Also attending the ceremony was Nora Galambos, the 1990 Chasman Scholarship winner, who expects to earn her Ph.D. in statistics from SUNY Stony Brook next spring.

The Chasman Scholarship honors the late nuclear theorist Renate Chasman, whose work with Ken Green is the basis for design of the electron storage rings at the National Synchrotron Light Source and elsewhere around the world.

50 YEARS AGO THIS WEEK

This series, which recounts the earliest days of Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), and BNL, will run as appropriate throughout 1996 and 1997, the 50th anniversary years of AUI and BNL, respectively.

• **September 9, 1946** — At the first meeting of the Executive Committee of Associated Universities, Inc. (AUI), the six members unanimously adopt the name Brookhaven National Laboratory for the new laboratory to be located at the Camp Upton site.

A second order of business is the contract for AUI's operation of the laboratory, on which the Committee on Contracts had been working with the Manhattan District (MD) of the War Department. The committee's fourth draft of a proposed contract prompts an extended discussion, after which the Committee on Contracts is instructed to report to the War Department that the contract as drafted is unacceptable to AUI in a number of respects, and further negotiation is required.

Points of disagreement between AUI and MD include: security restrictions — MD wants maximum, AUI wants minimum; accelerator construction — the MD believes the prime contract should go to industry, while AUI believes the accelera-

tors should be built by laboratory staff, with subcontract to industry; and control vs. independence — the MD prefers maximum government control and regulation, while AUI prefers maximum independence for the laboratory.

A form of Participation Fund Agreement is approved whereby each of the nine cooperating universities constituting AUI agrees to provide up to \$25,000 cash as working capital for the corporation, if needed.*

Finally, the Executive Committee decides that AUI should have a small, two-or-three-room office in New York City.**

**In the past 50 years, this agreement has been invoked only once, and AUI later reimbursed all of the universities.*

*** This decision led to AUI's renting space at 393 Seventh Avenue until spring 1951, when the corporation moved its headquarters to the 69th floor of the Empire State Building.*

Medical Coverage Open Enrollment For BNL Retirees, LTD Employees

BNL Retirees and employees on long-term disability (LTD) who are eligible for Medicare now have up to two additional health-care coverage options: Those living anywhere in the United States may consider electing CIGNA HealthCare for Seniors, while those living on Long Island may also think about joining the Vytra Medicare program.

CIGNA HealthCare for Seniors is a national health-maintenance organization (HMO) that offers a network of health-care providers and facilities across America. Vytra Medicare is a local not-for-profit HMO offering the largest network of physicians on Long Island.

Both HMOs cover hospitalization in full, charge only \$5 for each visit to a primary-care physician, provide unlimited prescription drugs, have allowances for eyeglasses and hearing aids, and have no deductibles or co-insurance payments and essentially no paperwork. In addition, Vytra covers preventive care, including dental work, in full.

For more information, a package of written material has been sent to all Medicare-eligible retirees and disabled employees. And, representatives from both HMOs will be in Berkner Hall to answer questions on Wednesday, September 18, from 10 a.m. to noon, and, on Tuesday, September 24, from 1 to 3 p.m.

Those Medicare-eligible retirees and disabled employees who are interested in changing their secondary coverage from the AUI Medical Plan to one of these HMOs may do so from September 18 through October 31, by obtaining the required forms from Muriel Pfeiffer, Ext. 2877, Bldg. 185, and returning them to her completed by October 31. Those who wish to continue with their present coverage do not have to do anything.
