

NIH Director Elias Zerhouni Visits BNL

n October 10, the Director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH), Elias Zerhouni, visited BNL for the first time. Zerhouni was confirmed as 15th NIH Director by the U.S. Senate this May.

After being welcomed by Satoshi Ozaki, Acting Deputy Laboratory Director for Science & Technology, Zerhouni met with Nora Volkow, Associate Laboratory Director for Life Sciences. He then Positron Emission Tomography (PET) facility, had lunch with some of BNL's Life Sciences researchers and viewed posters that highlighted the research being done in BNL's Center for Imaging & Neuroscience. These posters showed recent breakthroughs and innovative approaches to work largely sponsored by NIH's Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and DOE's Office of Biological & Environmental Research.

Zerhouni also toured the Magnetic Resonance Imaging facility with the Medical Department's Linda Chang and Thomas Ernst, and he heard about the advances being made in the ongoing biomedical engineering initiative involving staff in BNL's Instrumentation and Magnet Divisions. Subsequently, Zerhouni visited the where facility head Joanna Fowler, Chemistry Department, gave an overview of recent PET research activities.

During his visit, Zerhouni emphasized NIH's need for further advances in the fields of bioinformatics and computational sciences. He also expressed interest in working closely with DOE in future collaborative efforts at BNL.

Nanoscale Crystallography **Reveals Structural Details**

Tnderstanding the proper ties of nanoscale materials may allow scientists to manipulate these properties to produce new nanomagnets, nanocatalysts, and composites with better optical properties. But such applications require detailed knowledge of the materials' atomic level structure.

"Without a structure, you are without a road map," said Thomas Vogt, Physics Department. Funded by DOE's Office of Basic Energy Science and the National Science Foundation,

Vogt and scientists from Michigan State University (MSU), led by MSU physicist Valeri Petkov, have demonstrated a technique that allows them to decipher such fine-level nanostructures.

The researchers' analysis of a material composed of cesium ions trapped inside nano-sized pores of the silicon-oxide zeolite Si₃₂O₆₄ is described in Physical Review Letters of August 12. 2002. This material is also the first example of a room-temperature inorganic "electride," a (continued on page 3)

Currently, Greene collaborates with Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) in a DOE-funded proton-radiography project at the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron. Greene and his collaborators image static and fast-moving objects with high-energy protons to simulate the high explosives in a nuclear device. "This research is intended to develop

tools to ensure that the aging U.S. nuclear weapons stockpile is still in working order," Greene explained. "These experiments are done to develop a technology that can be used to certify the operability of the weapons stockpile in lieu of actual nuclear weapons' testing, and we have begun to explore the use of this technology in nondefense applica-

"I am pleased to be recognized for my accomplishments in research and academia, and for my editorial efforts," Greene said.

At BNL since 1976, Greene began his career with investigations into the safety of nuclear reactors, including power reactors in the former Soviet Union. He later directed his interests to applications of particle accelerators, including studies of proton radiation damage, energy deposition and degradation of superconductors, liquid-metal targetry, and cryogenic and high-temperature properties of accelerator materials.

"I am very pleased about this recognition," O'Hara said. "There is increasing awareness of the importance of designing systems to support the role of their users. Research such as ours at BNL is providing a scientific basis for combining human and machine intelligence to optimize performance and safety."

O'Hara studies the way in which people process information in complex systems, such as nuclear power plants and space robotic devices. Further, he investigates how the interfaces to those systems can be designed to support rapid and accurate understanding of the situation, and minimize human error.

In a current, DOE-funded study, O'Hara is developing methods and guidance for the replacement of analog instrumentation and controls with digital ones in nuclear power plant control rooms — the replacement of knobs and dials with computer displays and controls.

"I use simulations and field studies to determine what design characteristics best support a crew's performance," he said.

O'Hara earned a B.A. in psychology from Stony Brook University in 1974. and an M.A. in 1976, and a Ph.D. in 1980, both in psychology, from Adelphi (continued on page 3) University.

Goldhaber Fellows to Present Current, Future Research *The Lab community is invited to attend, 11/23*

scientists will "sing for their supper," presenting highlights of their research over the past year, as well as their plans for the future.

The event, dubbed the "Goldhaber Distinguished Fellows — First Annual Presentation," will feature talks by the eight scientists awarded Gertrude and Maurice Goldhaber Distinguished Fellowships over the past year. All employees and guests are invited to attend the event, which will take place in the Chemistry Department's Hamilton Seminar Room, 3-5 p.m. Refreshments will be served before the presentations.

Created to continue BNL's tradition of attracting the best and brightest scientists, the fellowships are administered by Leonard Newman, Scientific Director, Laboratory Directed Research & Development, and funded by Brookhaven Science Associates, through its member institutions Stony Brook University and Battelle.

The fellowships are open to scientists who are a maximum of three years past receiving their Ph.D. and who have exceptional talent and credentials. Candidates must also have a strong desire for independent frontier research within the missions of BNL: the advancement of physics, chemistry, biology, and medical, energy, or environmental sciences; or the use of user facilities that accelerate particles or heavy ions or produce synchrotron light.

The three-year fellowships have a starting salary of \$70,000 per annum. Each fellow collaborates closely with a member of the BNL scientific staff and may qualify for Lab scientific staff positions after completing the appointment.

Newman said the response from the science community has been solid. "We've had more than 200 applicants to date, and I've been really pleased to see the high quality of the candidates," he said. "At least 20 of them are what I would call 'out-standing,' and it's wonderful that these outstanding young scientists have a desire to come work at Brookhaven."

The eight fellowship recipients giving talks are:

• Young-June Kim, physicist: Studies condensed-matter physics using the National Synchrotron Light Source. He was a postdoc at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, his Ph.D. is from Harvard University, and his B.S. is from Seoul National University, Korea.

- Robert F. Klie, physicist/materials scientist: Investigates structure property relationships at defects in the bulk and at interfaces in oxide materials. His B.S. is from Kingston University, London, and his Ph.D. is from the University of Illinois at Chicago.
- Elena Lymar, biologist: Performs structural and functional analysis of human DNA. She was a postdoctoral associate at the Rockefeller University. Her Ph.D. is from Washington State University and M.S. is from Novosibrisk State University, Russia.
- **Kimberly M. Mayer**, biologist: Studies molecular biology, genetics, and protein engineering. Mayer was an NIH postdoctoral Fellow at the California Institute of Technology. Her Ph.D. is from Purdue University.
- **Peter Petreczky**, physicist: Studies statistical mechanics of quark-gluon plasma and lattice gauge theory. Petreczky was a research fellow at Germany's Bielefeld University. He received his Ph.D. from Eotvos University in Hungary.
- **Bernd Surrow**, physicist: Measures proton and proton structure at the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider. He was a staff physicist at DESY, Hamburg, and a CERN, Switzerland, fellow. He has a Ph.D from the University of Hamburg, Germany.
- Jian Wang, chemist/chemical engineer: Designs, builds and deploys instruments for measuring aerosol particles. His Ph.D. is from the California Institute of Technology.
- Hua Gen Yu, chemist: Studies quantum theory and dynamics. Yu was an associate professor in the Chinese Academy of Sciences in China. His B.S. is from Chengdu University of Sciences & Technology, China, and his Ph.D. is from Goteborg University, Sweden.

BNL offers comprehensive health plans, but not all expenses are covered in full, such as eyeglasses, physical exams, deductibles, coinsurance, and expenses above reasonable and customary limits. And, although on-site child care is available at the Lab, the cost of child care, as well as elder care, can quickly add up.

Employees can reduce these costs by opening Health Care and Dependent Day Care Reimbursement Accounts. Through salary reduction, these accounts set aside before-tax dollars to pay for out-of-pocket-health and dependent daycare expenses. Actual costs are lower because of the tax savings. Enrollment in these accounts for 2003 begins on October 21 and continues through November 27. Employees who work at least 20 hours a week may set aside from \$300 to \$3,500 (\$2,500 IBEW union employees) in the Health Care Account and/ or \$300 to \$5,000 in the Dependent Day Care Account. Employees who want to sign up for 2003 must enroll, even if they are currently enrolled for 2002.

Enroll On Line or With a Form

From October 21 through November 27, eligible employees will be able to enroll on line for the 2003 health care and the dependent day care flexible spending accounts if they have a pass-

word for and access to PeopleSoft. Instructions for on line enroll can be accessed at http://dev.bnl.gov/ H R / B e n e f i t s / F S A o n l i n e enrollment.htm. As an alternate choice, enrollment forms will be available in the Benefits Office, Bldg. 185. Return completed forms to the Human Resources Division, Bldg. 185, by November 27, for coverage effective January 1, 2003.

The following expenses are not eligible for reimbursement: • agency fees for au pair place-

ments and adopting children;registration fees paid for day

care, summer camp;
preschool, kindergarten, etc., unless these fees are applied toward the first tuition bill, and

only if the fees are shown on the bill to be deducted from the regular tuition charge and only once that bill has been paid.

The cost paid to a daycare provider for dependents' meals is a reimbursable expense, unless those meals are included as part of the cost of a field trip or other outing.

Medical, Dental Enrollment Open Until November 27

Cut Medical, Day-Care Costs With Flexible Spending Accounts

During open enrollment, described below, employees, retirees, and participants receiving long-term disability benefits who want to change their medical and/or dental coverages must contact the Benefits Office, Bldg. 185, Ext. 2877, Ext. 5126, or (800) 353-5321 by Wednesday, November 27.

Medical, Dental Open Enrollment

Until November 27, eligible employees working 20 or more hours per week may make changes to their medical and dental coverages: employees may join a medical and/or dental program, change from one program to another, add or drop coverage for family members, or drop coverage entirely. Also until November 27, retirees and participants on long-term disability or

Dental Choices

Three dental insurance plans are available to eligible employees: the CIGNA PPO Dental Plan, the CIGNA Dental Health Plan (DMO), and the Dental Assistance Plan administered by Eastern Benefit Systems. The CIGNA PPO is not available to members of the IBEW union. Employees who enroll in one of these plans must pay a contribution toward the cost of coverage. Under the CIGNA PPO Dental Plan, services are provided through a network of dentists, but provisions are made so participants can obtain care from dentists who are not in the network. For in-network care, there are no claim forms to submit. For out-of-network care, claim forms must be submitted.

This annual event is held to thank people who have helped with and supported BWIS programs, to welcome new members, and to introduce next year's executive board. COBRA may make changes to their medical and/or dental coverage.

Coverage changes made during the open-enrollment period will become effective January 1, 2003. Changes can only be made during the annual open-enrollment period or when what is called a qualifying event occurs. Qualifying events include: the birth or adoption of a child; marriage, divorce or legal separation; loss of dependent status; or a spouse's gain or loss of employment. Qualifying events allow employees to make certain changes to their coverage if they notify the BSA Benefits Office within 31 days of the event. Employees who do not want to change their coverage at this time do not have to do anything for their coverage to continue.

Medical Choices: PPO vs. HMOs

The medical insurance plans available are: CIGNA preferred provider organization (PPO); and three health-maintenance organizations (HMOs): Vytra, Aetna, and HIP. Employees who enroll in any of these plans must pay a contribution toward the cost of coverage.

In a PPO program, health care is provided through a network of physicians and health-care facilities, but provisions are made so that participants can obtain such care from providers who are not in that network. For care provided within the network, there are no claim forms to submit. For care received outside the network, claim forms much be submitted to receive partial reimbursement.

In an HMO, participants receive medical services from physicians and at health-care facilities within the HMO's provider network. There are no claim forms to submit, and many services are covered, including physician visits, well-baby care, surgery, x-rays, hospitalization, diagnostic tests, and prescription drugs. Some HMOs require a co-payment at the time services are rendered. Under the CIGNA Dental Health Plan (DMO), no deductibles, no maximum benefits, and no claim forms need be submitted. Dental services are provided through a network of participating dentists. Many preventive and basic services are covered in full. Reimbursement for restorative and orthodontic services is based on a fee schedule.

Under the Dental Assistance Plan administered by Eastern Benefit Systems, employees may choose any dentist, and reimbursement for preventive, diagnostic, basic, and major dental services is based on a fee schedule. Orthodontia for dependent children is covered at 50 percent of a reasonable and customary charge. Claim forms must be submitted.

Plan Representatives on Site

To help participants decide among the medical and dental plans, representatives of all the above plans will be in Berkner Hall over four days: from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. during the Healthfest 2002 health, fitness, and safety fair, on Wednesday, October 23, and Thursday, October 24; and from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Thursday, November 14, and Thursday, November 21. In addition, meetings will be held in Berkner Hall on November 14 and 21 at noon to discuss the medical plan.

During these dates and times, literature on the plans will also be available, including comparison sheets and lists of participating physicians, dentists, and health-care facilities. Also, representatives of the Benefits Office will be available to answer questions.

BNL Students, Postdocs BNL Runners Are L.I. Champs **Form ASAP** How Did We Get

Over BNL's long history, many students have worked on site as undergrads, graduate students, and postdocs. But there has never been an organization for students, until this summer - when ASAP, or the Association for Students and Postdocs, was established.

The organization seeks to foster camaraderie and professional development among BNL's young scientists, by organizing and encouraging participation in a variety of scientific and social activities at the Lab and on Long Island. Also, ASAP will advocate the interests of students and postdocs to the Lab's scientific departments and divisions, and BNL management.

n July 30, 54 BNLers were among 9,100 participants in the J.P. Morgan Chase Corporate Challenge 3.5-mile race at Jones Beach. More than 100 Long Island companies took part in the race, including Computer Associates, Symbol Technologies, Cablevision, KeySpan, the Suffolk County District Attorney, and Stony Brook University. The Jones Beach race is one in a series of races sponsored throughout the world to promote fitness in the corporate workplace, with more than 200,000 annual participants. The series culminates with a championship race held on Park Avenue in New York City.

When the Jones Beach race results were tallied, the BNL men's teams placed 1st, 8th, 34th, and 91st out of 126 teams, and the women's teams placed 5th and 19th out of 105 teams. made of particles 1,000 times smaller than the diameter of a human hair — are so difficult to decipher because they lack the long-range order and symmetry of perfectly crystalline materials.

"This work shows that, even with a very low degree of order, at synchrotrons such as the National Synchrotron Light Source at BNL, and using the right techniques, we can determine nanoscale structures. And with structural understanding, we can begin to predict properties, and perhaps begin to manipulate them for useful applications," said Vogt.
