

# **Counterterror Technologies: On Target at Brookhaven**

This briefing describes research presented at the 226th meeting of the American Chemical Society, September 7-11, in New York City.

 ${
m R}$  esearchers at BNL are developing counterterrorism technologies to help protect the United States from would-be terrorists wielding nuclear weapons, dirty bombs, toxic chemicals, or explosives.

"These sensor technologies give us the capability to discern and identify minute quantities of radioactive materials, and also detect chemical and biological

agents and explosives," said Ralph James, BNL's Associate Director for Energy, Environment, & National Security. "When deployed at the nation's ports, bridges, tunnels, and transportation hubs, these sensors can help law enforcement agencies intercept dangerous materials before they are used in a terrorist attack."

#### Current technologies under development include:

• Large-volume xenon-based detectors: These xenon-gas-filled detectors are room-temperature devices that can detect and identify radioisotopes with great sensitivity.

• Thermal neutron camera: This highly sensitive helium-based imaging system uses a wire chamber and coded aperture to "see" fissionable radioactive materials like plutonium from a distance.

• Mini-Raman LIDAR chemical sensor: This one-of-a-kind portable chemical sensor can locate and identify chemicals - like those used in nerve gas — in the air or deposited on surfaces from a safe distance, using laser-scattering patterns to identify a substance's distinct chemical signature.

• Cadmium-zinc-telluride sensors: These tiny sensors can detect gamma rays emitted by radionuclides of interest to terrorists, including cesium and cobalt. Unlike high-purity germanium detectors, which are expensive and must be kept chilled, these work at room temperature and are inexpensive.


• Urban Shield: This initiative would integrate real-time data from a network of sensors distributed within a municipal area. This network would employ an array of meteorological instrumentation, satellite data, and detectors to identify and help track chemicals or radionuclides after a release, and provide crucial information to emergency responders.

James discussed this work during the "Environmental Radioactivity and Low-Background Radioactivity Monitoring in Service to the Society" session at the American Chemical Society's September meeting. This work is primarily funded by DOE's National Nuclear Security Administration. - Peter Genzer

# After 11 Years, NYS Section of APS Holds Physics Symposium at BNL

"We have worked hard, and the scientific community has worked hard, to come up with a roadmap for the next 20 years," said Orbach during the Monday evening event in Berkner Hall. "It has been an exciting process."

The 20-year outlook was unveiled by Secretary of Energy Spencer Abraham during a National Press Club luncheon last week in Washington, D.C. While three BNL-based facilities are on the list, including the National Synchrotron Light Source-II (NSLS-II) and two additions to the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider, known as RHIC II and eRHIC, Orbach said it is likely that BNL will play a role in 10 of the 28 projects overall.

"The quality of this Laboratory is, internationally, on the highest level," he said. "It is an asset, not just to the United States, but truly for the world, and it's a great pleasure for me to help the Laboratory as much as I can."

The theme of Orbach's talk had carried through the day's earlier meetings as well.

"This is a different site visit from those we've had before," said Orbach. "The purpose of this

visit was to talk about the future of the Laboratory. Where is Brookhaven going to be three years from now, five years from now, 10 years from now, and on out into the future."

Orbach praised BNL's "extraordinary" work in areas such as biology and medical imaging and at facilities including RHIC, the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, and the NSLS, and recognized the relationship Brookhaven has built with the local community. He closed by reminding the group of the value of the work that goes on at DOE's national laboratories.

"Each of these Laboratories is an extraordinary collection of dedicated individuals who put their lives into the science that they follow, and they have a phenomenal impact on the country, and indeed the world, in terms of not only intellectual excitement, but also of economic development," Orbach said. "This Laboratory exemplifies the very finest aspects of that world."

# **BNL's CDIC Director James Glimm** Wins National Medal of Science

ames Glimm, Director of the Center for Data Intensive Computing (CDIC) at BNL, was one of eight U.S. scientists and engineers named by President Bush as a recipient of the 2002 National Medal of Science, the nation's highest honor for lifetime achievement in scientific research. The CDIC is managed by BNL in affiliation with Stony Brook University (SBU), and Glimm is also Chair of the Department of Applied Mathematics at SBU.



he 87th Topical Symposium of the New York State Section of the American Physical Society (APS) on "Particle Accelerator Frontiers and New Physics Potentials" was held at BNL Berkner Auditorium on October 17 and 18.

Organized by Zohreh Parsa of the BNL Physics Department, the meeting was attended by more than 200 registered participants from New York State, neighboring states and overseas. There were also 62 student attendees including 23 cadets

from West Point Military Academy accompanied by their physics instructor.

At the symposium, distinguished speakers from across the U.S. and abroad gave presentations covering major projects and forefront plans for the physics of the coming decades.

BNL's featured projects included new light sources such as the National Synchrotron Light Source II, achievements at the Relativistic Heavy Ion

Collider, and the Large Hadron Collider (LHC).

Two highlights of the program described new BNL-based initiatives: John Sculli of New York University presented plans for the muon-to-electron conversion experiment, MECO, which will probe charged lepton flavor conservation well over 1,000 times more precisely than is currently possible, and BNL's William Marciano discussed "Future Neutrino Physics" and very

long baseline neutrino oscillation studies using a neutrino superbeam. Corene Wood of the Information Services Division, who has been an appointed RAC member since 1997, explains that to achieve the NYSA mission, members serve and work in partnership with New York's many and diverse communities, governments, and institutions to provide guidance for the management of government records and information resources.

combustion chemistry to meteorology and atmospheric measurements.

For example, in environmental studies at the CDIC, Glimm and associates from BNL, Argonne National Laboratory and SBU are simulating the breakup of diesel fuel into droplets, which is of interest because much of diesel fuel pollution is derived from unburned fuel deposited on the walls of an engine chamber. Controlling the size of droplets so that they are very fine decreases pollution.

In another promising project conducted at the CDIC, Glimm joined Wei Zhu, SBU, and other researchers from SBU and the Long Island Cancer Center to measure the mass of certain proteins in the blood of ovarian cancer patients in an attempt to develop a definitive detection method for early-stage ovarian cancer, which, if detected early, has a 90 percent cure rate. So far, their statistical detection method, which uses six protein markers, is 100 percent accurate in detecting early-stage ovarian cancer. Their results will have to be confirmed with further testing.

# **Postings During RHIC Operations**

The Collider-Accelerator Department will soon be restarting the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider (RHIC), which is expected to operate until the end of May 2004. During this operating period, the entire RHIC site, including the inner road, will be posted as a Controlled Area with the exception of Building 1005 (the Collider Center), the adjacent parking lot and the approach road to Building 1005. The postings will be in place over this coming weekend of November 22-23. In addition, the northern portion of Thompson Road is posted as a Controlled Area and closed to routine traffic.

The following requirements must be satisfied before entering the posted Controlled Areas. Failure to comply with these requirements could lead to a Reportable Occurrence and a Price Anderson Amendment Act (PAAA) violation:

- 1. Unescorted Access requires up-to-date General Employee Radiation Training (GERT) and facility-specific training.
  - Experimenters contact the RHIC & AGS Users' Center, Ext. 5975, for assistance.
  - BNL Employees contact Ann-Marie Luhrs, Ext. 7007, for assistance.
- 2. Escorted Access may be granted by contacting Ann-Marie Luhrs, Ext. 7007. Escorts must complete a Training Waiver Form and the escorted entry must be approved by the Collider-Accelerator Department. Call at least one day prior to the escorted access.

As always, all personnel are expected to adhere to the posted requirement.


