BNL Named a Member of EPA's Performance Track Program

BNL has been named a member of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) National Environmental Performance Track Program (PTP), joining more than 350 U.S. facilities in their commitment to go consistently beyond environmental regulatory requirements.

The PTP was launched in June 2000, and, since then, its members have saved enough energy to power approximately 30,000 households for a year, reduced their use of hazardous materials by nearly 18,000 tons, and cut their solid waste by 176,000 tons.

BNL qualified for the program through its past environmental achievements, continuous commitment to environmental compliance, and implementation of a strong environmental management system (EMS).

"This is an accomplishment not only for the Environmental & Waste Management Services Division (EWMSD), but for the entire BNL staff, "said Bob Lee, EWMSD, who completed the extensive performance track membership application with help from John Selva, George Goode, and Debra Bauer, all from EWMSD, and Kathy Geiger, Com-



munity, Education, Government & Public Affairs (CEGPA) Directorate. "Everyone at the Lab is involved in pollution prevention, waste minimization and making sure that BNL is an environmentally friendly institution."

The successful implementa-

tion of an EMS is a crucial qualification for becoming a performance track member. The Lab's EMS is ISO 14001-registered; in 2001, the entire BNL site became the first national laboratory to obtain third-party registration to a globally recognized environmental standard set by the International Organization for Standardization. The key elements of BNL's EMS are: pollution prevention, compliance with regulatory requirements, community involvement in making environmental deci-

sions, cleanup of existing environmental hazards and waste, and continual improvement.

Six Brookhaven Scientists Awarded Tenure

For his "major contributions to a number of different areas in condensed matter physics" and his "deeply insightful and analytical approach" to his research, Physicist Sergei Maslov has been awarded tenure in the Physics Department.

Physics Chair Samuel Aronson and Associate

Chair Peter Johnson recommended Maslov for this honor. They lauded his early work, in which he made significant contributions to the field of selforganized criticality, a theory that links the behavior of complex natural phe-

nomena to physics laws. "Previous to his entry, the field had been dominated by numerical experiments. Sergei was able to enhance this field by introducing analytical methods," they said.

Aronson and Johnson also praised Maslov's more recent research, studies of correlated onedimensional

magnetic systems and of complex networks such as the internet and the human nervous system. In particular, they said, "Maslov's colleagues can approach him with a problem he has not encountered and he immediately sees the essential physics and contributes to its solution."

Maslov has also shown himself to

Martin Blume Looks Ahead on Scientific Journals

rom the first Philosophical Transactions published on thick, heavy paper by Henry Oldenburg in 1665 to the paper-free versions of Physical Review and other such publications appearing on the Internet today, scientific journals have provided scientists the means to spread or learn about the latest ideas and data in their specialized fields. Within the vision of forefront scientific articles' being freely distributed on the Web, however, other "means" must be considered. How can free downloading be balanced against the costs of arranging for peer review, editing, and production?

To discuss many aspects of scientific publications from past to present and how they will evolve in the future, Martin Blume, American Physical Society (APS) editor-in-chief and former BNL Deputy Director and National Synchrotron Light

Source Chair, will give the 396th Brookhaven Lecture, on "Scientific Journals — What Does the Future Hold?" The talk will be held at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, September 22, in Berkner Hall. The speaker will be introduced by Robert Crease of Stony Brook University, who is also BNL's Lab Historian. Refreshments are offered before and after this free public lecture, and all are welcome. Visitors to the Lab age 16 and over must carry photo ID.

In following the history of scientific journals and their future, Blume will take the perspective of Physical Review, which, starting in 1893 at Cornell University, was published during 1925-51 at the University of Minnesota, and in 1951 moved to

the BNL Physics Department. Now, "across the street" on the west of the William Floyd Parkway, Phys. Rev. still retains many BNL ties, including several editors among Lab scientists.


In discussing the future, Blume will focus on topics such as print, peer review and e-print servers, electronic archiving, intellectual property, the Internet, and the economics of publishing.

Findings in 2002 Nano Workshop at BNL Are No. 1 Accessed on 2003 J. Phys. Chem. Web

A Kamat, an associate editor Funding was awarded in 2001. of the Journal of Physical Chem-

istry B, the paper "Charge Transfer on the Nanoscale: Current Status" (J. Phys. Chem. B 107 2003, 107, 6668 - 6697*) was No. 1 of Journal of Physical Chemistry articles in 2003 in being accessed

via the web 3,215 times. The paper reports on a workshop, "Charge Transfer on the Nanoscale," held in Santa Fe, New Mexico, in January 2002.

The workshop came about when, shortly after stepping down as Chair of Chemistry in 2000. Carol Creutz turned to nanoscience as a new research direction and wanted to reconcile what she knew about the electron transfer between molecules in solution with studies of molecular conductance in nanoscale systems.

Creutz approached Chemical Sciences, the Division of Basic Energy Sciences within DOE's Office of Science that supports chemistry related to the DOE energy mission, for funding for

ccording to Prashant a workshop on the subject.

Creutz and co-organizers John Miller and Marshall Newton of BNL, Cheri Kagan of IBM and James Yardley of Columbia University recruited the participants and took on the task of putting together the workshop

findings for publication in a peer-reviewed journal, which was a condition for receiving funding. Workshop participants, all of whom contributed to the final manuscript, considered the current understanding of electron transport theory and experiment in solution, across interfaces, and through molecules attached to two electrodes, as well as the status of molecular electronics and architectures for energy conversion.

According to Creutz, the workshop was scientifically very rewarding even though the manuscript preparation was painful. She finds herself "bemused" by the outcome, but offers a comment from Yardley: "proves that you can write a paper by committee."

waste reduction. From 1995 to the present, the Lab has reduced its use of water by almost half, saving nearly 700 million gallons per year. Much of this savings comes from less reliance on once-through cooling water, expanded use of chilled water, installation of temperature-controlled discharge valves for the Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, and the use of air-cooled refrigeration systems.

In the last decade, BNL's waste generation has been reduced by about 80 percent. Significant reductions have been achieved by funding a digital photographic and imaging system, switching to nontoxic waterborne paints, and enacting proposals submitted by employees under BNL's pollution prevention program.

In addition, as required by EPA, the Lab made four environmental performance commitments for the future: land conservation, reduction of radiological air emissions, reduction of the use of ozone-depleting substances, and reduction of the use of mercury in the workplace.

For the future, BNL plans to

follow its Natural Resource Management Plan, which was adopted in 2003, to restore or enhance the habitat of ten acres per year of its 5,300-acre site. The plan calls for the "greening" of bare areas with endemic vegetation, restoring former building plots with native grasses and plants, and conducting prescribed fires to reduce the flammable loading of the forest floor.

BNL also made a commitment to the EPA to reduce air emissions from the Brookhaven Linac Isotope Producer (BLIP), a facility that produces shortlived radioisotopes that are used for medical diagnostic procedures. In FY2003, Leonard Mausner, Medical Department, was awarded funds under BNL's pollution prevention program to fabricate a sealing shroud to isolate cooling water from air in BLIP's exhaust system. The shroud slows the diffusion of humidity from cooling water into the air stream, effectively prolonging the decay time for gaseous O-15 and C-11 radionuclides, thereby reducing emissions. By 2006, a 30 percent reduction in emissions, which are

already well below EPA standards, is expected.

Reducing the use of ozonedepleting substances, BNL's third commitment to EPA, is well under way with the maximum use of the Lab's centrally chilled water system and re placement of ozone-depleting refrigerants and fire suppressants with those that have low or no ozone-depleting potential. Also, BNL is completing a plan to reduce the use of ozonedepleting materials in research applications. By 2006, the Lab plans to reduce the use of ozone-depleting substances by almost 50 percent.

BNL has a long history of reducing mercury in the workplace, and has promised EPA that it will continue its efforts, which include a mercury thermometer and equipment exchange program, a fluorescent bulb replacement program and other environmental restoration efforts to reduce mercury in the environment. BNL has committed to reducing its approximately 1,250 pounds of elemental mercury in its inventory to 250 pounds by 2006.

Part of a successful EMS plan involves keeping the community informed and seeking input from the public on environmental policies and actions. BNL has a well-established community involvement policy that outlines the process for identifying and re sponding to community concerns and interests. Under the direction of CEGPA, Lab personnel meet with various community groups, such as the Community Advisory Council, an independent group consisting of 32 organizations, on a regular basis.

As a performance track member, BNL is eligible for numerous program benefits, including administrative and regulatory incentives, which cut paperwork, increase flexibility, and help focus on environmental improvement. Members also have access to the Performance Track Network, a partnership with trade associations, membership organizations, nongovernmental organizations, and other government agencies. BNL also may become a mentor to other organizations that wish to apply for performance track membership.

Environment, Safety, Security & Health Final OHSAS 18001 Safety Audit, 9/22-24



This is the last of a four-part series intended to help Lab staff understand how BNL's Environment, Safety & Health (ESSH) policy commitments apply to all employees. The complete policy is available on the Environment, Safety, Health & Quality Directorate (ESH&Q) website at http://www.bnl.gov/ESHQ/ESSH.asp or via the A to Z site index under Environment, Safety & Health Policy.

Below are highlights of ESSH policy:

- 1. We are all responsible for safety
- 2. Consider the safety of others
- 3. Integrate ESSH into our research and operations
- 4. Comply with BNL ESSH requirements
- 5. Reduce risks, conserve resources, and prevent pollution
- 6. Assist stakeholders with their ESSH needs
- 7. Participate in community and government initiatives.

As part of the process for three pilot organizations (the Central Fabrication Services Division, the Collider-Accelerator Department and the Plant Engineering Division) to achieve Occupation, Health, Safety Assessment Series 18001 Registration (OHSAS 18001), the Lab will undergo a final audit during September 22-24. The pilot organizations are receiving support from the ESH&Q Directorate. The audit will be conducted by NSF (National Sanitation Foundation) International Strategic Registrations, Ltd. If the audit is successful, and OHSAS 18001 registration is achieved, BNL will be the only lab in the DOE complex to have elements of its operations achieve such status. OHSAS 18001 is designed to be compatible with internationally recognized management systems and standards such as ISO 14001, the system designed for environmental stewardship. The Lab achieved ISO 14001 registration in 2001.

At the request of Lab Director Praveen Chaudhari, the OHSAS 18001 pilot project team has developed new training modules for managers and workers, conducted job risk assessments and facility risk assessments with input from workers, and updated policies and procedures that will lead to improved safety performance.

Says Patricia Williams, leader of the pilot project team, "We have found that the workers value the changes when they are directly involved in the decision-making process. We will continue to encourage two-way communication between managers, supervisors and workers in order to make the Lab a safe and secure place to work."
