NSRL Successful in First NASA Operational Review

McNerney, Lowenstein recognized for dedication, commitment

n November, Francis Cuci-⊥notta, Frank Sulzman, and Walter Schimmerling of the National Aeronautics & Space Administration (NASA) visited BNL to conduct the first operational review of the NASA Space Radiation Laboratory (NSRL), which was commissioned at BNL in summer, 2003. At the NSRL, researchers use beams of heavy ions provided by BNL's Booster accelerator to study the effects of simulated space radiation on biological and physical systems. Their goal is to develop methods and materials to reduce the risk of the effects of ionizing radiation to human beings on prolonged space missions.

The review was a success. NASA found BNL's performance very satisfactory and that all operational requirements had been met. To mark the occasion, on behalf of NASA, Cucinotta presented both Andrew McNerney, Assistant Laboratory Director for Facility & Operations and Derek Lowenstein, Collider-Accelerator Department Chair, with framed collages recognizing them for "dedication and commitment to the construction of the NASA

Space Radiation Lab, a premier, world-class radiation facility, built in collaboration with NASA and the U.S. Department of Energy." Each collage, in addition to pictures and a plaque, contained a miniature U.S. flag that had been flown on the space shuttle Endeavor STS-III, June 5-19, 2002.

'The NSRL construction and operations is a team effort. Without the dedication and contributions of Dave Phillips [C-AD], Adam Rusek [C-AD], Betsy Sutherland [Biology Department], Marcelo Vazquez [Medical Department], Jack

Feldman [Plant Engineering Division], now retired, and many other persons in the Laboratory, this could not have been a success," stated Lowenstein.

The review also covered new initiatives at NSRL. The Electron Beam Ion Source (EBIS) Project, a new ion injector for BNL's Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider, received approval of "mission need (CD-0)" from DOE this past August, and is high on the NASA agenda. NASA and DOE are exploring joint support of this construction project that would enhance the capabilities of both RHIC and NSRL. — Liz Seubert

Brentwood Student Wins BNL 'Discovery' Art Prize

uismet Francisque, a senior J(left) at Brentwood High School, has won the 2004 BSA "Discovery Award" for his painting called "Self Portrait," (see photo at right). Laboratory Director Praveen Chaudhari (right) presented Francisque with a certificate and a \$500 savings bond at the BNL Art Society Thanksgiving Art and Crafts Show held in Berkner Hall, where the winning picture was accorded the place of honor. Francisque's mother and sister, as well as Lorraine Sopp, Brentwood Union Free School District Art Director, also attended the ceremony.

BSA awards the Discovery Prize annually to a local high school senior for artwork that best exhibits the spirit of scientific discovery. The BNL Art Society chooses a winner from the artworks exhibited at a show for high school seniors held by the South Bay Art Association (SBAA) each November.

Francisque's painting, a portrait in black, white, and shades



of gray that is divided horizontally into three canvases, was chosen by Anne Meinhold, a well-known local sculptor, member of SBAA and the BNL Art Society, as embodying the feeling of "Discovery." Not all discoveries are external, and this painting, "Self Portrait," is an example of self-discovery, which is important to the development of any person.

In her award citation, Meinhold assessed this "simple and elegant" painting as "exceptionally well-wrought and expressive." She was struck by "the questioning, 'seeking' expres-

sion of the eyes, and the impression that we receive of the thoughtful and open-minded outlook of the seeker. The tension in the fingers alerts us to the importance of the discovery to be made. The tryptich approach to the subject could be taken to symbolize the willingness of the seeker to search in many areas, including 'outside the box.' The process of exploration and discovery in science; the wish to approach, observe, and understand the unknown, is eloquently expressed in this work by Guismet Francisque of Brentwood High School, and he well deserves the BNL Discoverv Prize."

Francisque's art teacher, Howard Block, said, "Guismet is extremely mature and has great artistic insight for a boy of his age. He is also talented in the computer field, and we hope that he will be able to continue his studies in a school with scope for both his artistic creativity and his computing ability." — Liz Seubert

Lab Offers Certificate in Supervision

BNL is encouraging supervisors to participate in a new certification program. These are some of the skills in focus in the new program, which is for:

- All new supervisors who have not supervised employees before, or have been in supervision for two years or less.

Participants must complete 11 courses within three years to earn the certificate. Courses completed within the last ten years will be credited. The certificates will be presented by the Lab Director at an awards luncheon and recorded in the recipient's files.
