Budget Picture

 $R^{
m ecent}$ news out of Washington reported on the House Appropriations Committee's Restoring money to the fiscal year (FY) 2006 budget that could directly benefit BNL's nuclear physics, National Synchrotron Light Source, and medical imaging programs.

This news followed a visit to BNL by U.S. Representative David Hobson, Chairman of the House Energy and Water Development Appropriations Subcommittee, and U.S. Representative Tim Bishop, who both attended the Center for Functional Nanoscience (CFN) site dedication on April 15. During their tour of the Lab, Hobson had interacted with researchers, and he praised their enthusiasm and the value of their work in his subsequent talk at the site dedication.

The Bulletin asked BNL's John Hauser, Interim Assistant Laboratory Director for Finance, to explain some of the implications of the present more positive budget picture. Hauser responded with the following memo:

On May 18, 2005, the House Appropriations Committee voted on their portion of the Energy and Water Appropriations Bill. This bill contains funding for DOE. Included in this budget bill is \$3.7 billion for the Office of Science, BNL's prime DOE sponsor. This amount is \$203 million (M) above the President's budget of last February of \$3.5 billion.

Although the increase is good news for the Office of Science, there is the other side of the equation yet to be determined by the Senate. Senators must now complete their FY06 budget process and produce their version of the budget. When the two sides are complete, they will "conference" to determine a final and single budget amount to be sent in the completed bill for the President to sign into law or veto.

We are optimistic that the Senate will appreciate the need to increase the support of science. Only time will tell us the final amount.

At the moment, with the action by the House, nuclear physics funding is up \$37.6M, which includes "\$31.6M provided to restore operating time of the user facilities [such as the Relativistic Heavy Ion Collider] to fiscal year 2005 levels." Biological and environmental research is up \$70M. which includes earmarking \$35M for medical applications and measurement science. This is welcome news for BNL's imaging program. Funds for basic energy sciences are also up \$27.1M above the President's budget, with \$19.7M "provided to maintain operating time on user facilities at fiscal year 2005 levels." Funds for the BNL Center for Functional Nanomaterials remain at \$36,55M. These increases are welcome and definitely moving in the right direction. — John Hauser

Urban Dispersion Field Study — Behind the Scenes **Helping Plan Response to Potential Terrorist or Chemical Spill Events**

wo days of winter field studies for the Ur-*L* ban Dispersion Program (UDP), designed to contribute valuable data to computer models of how gases move in urban winds, were held in New York City in March 2005. The four-year program has a budget of \$10 million and aims to improve existing models of how a gas or chemical release might move around Manhattan's tall buildings and canyons. Emergency management, law enforcement and intelligence personnel can use these models to plan for, train for and respond to potential terrorist attacks and accidents involving toxic industrial chemicals. The March field study, called Madison Square Garden 2005 or MSG05, involved detailed meteorological observations and a tracer gas release. An account of a field study day appeared in the April 1 Bulletin. The following story profiles some of the BNL staff from the Environmental Sciences Department (ES), the Energy, Environment & National Security Directorate (EENS), the Office of Educational Programs (OEP) and others who worked for many months behind the scenes to ensure the success of this phase of the ongoing project.

month before the field studies began, Smith and Edwards began transporting the equipment from Bldgs. 490, 815, and 830 at BNL and assembling it on the roofs of One and Two Penn Plaza, the New Yorker Hotel and the U.S. Post Office on 8th Avenue to prepare for the twoday experiment. While another BNL team tracked the movement of small releases of tracer gases, the meteorological team headed by Principal Investigator Michael Reynolds, ES, would measure which way the wind was blowing.

"Everything comes together in the computer models," Reynolds said. "Our measurements will be used to validate the existing models."

Watching the Weather

Tracer releases need to occur during specific weather conditions, and as the three-week window designated for the studies approached, Cassella was also responsible for monitoring three-day weather forecasts. Cassella teamed with National Weather Service colleagues on the Upton site and Professor Brian Colle of Stony Brook University to forecast the most suitable days for the two experiments. A conference call was held each morning to discuss the forecast and take recommendations. When a tentative date was picked, a call was held at 10 p.m. the night before to confirm its suitability.

BNL Director Praveen Chaudhari strongly backs this goal. "I challenge the Lab to strive to work injury-free during the month of June," he says. "Staying focused is the key, and I ask everyone to redouble their efforts to think safely."

Tarpinian appreciates the excellent safety efforts being made around the Lab. "We know that many groups of BNL employees have thinking, 'Oh, not again!' successfully completed long periods without

having any injuries," he says. "Together with Pat Williams, I warmly congratulate all concerned for their many months and in some cases, years, without injuries that cause lost time on the job."

Among the groups specially congratulated by Tarpinian and Williams, who is the Manager of the Safety & Health Services Division, are: the Staff Services Division, celebrating a full year without a lost work day; the Environmental & Waste Management Division,

Operations staff, who helped set up some of the rooftop equipment.

"It was really cold up there," he remembered, "but the view was breathtaking."

which exceeded 700 days; the Life Sciences Directorate, which has worked over 2,700 days; and the Instrumentation Division, with over 11 years of no lost days to its credit.

"We know that some workers in some of these groups have jobs in which injuries are less likely than in the work done by others," says Tarpinian. "But it is not a question of measuring one person against another. We stick together, and we need to be sure that everyone, one way or another, is working safely — first, because of the benefit to our own health and safety, and also, because this effort directly furthers the national labs' and DOE's goal of producing world-class science while maintaining absolutely safe and efficient operations."

This goal, which is constantly emphasized by Director of the Office of Science Ray Orbach, is extremely challenging.

But, "With continuing effort from all of us, I am confident that BNL is up to it," says Tarpinian.

Says Williams, "In keeping with this year's National Safety Council theme, we will hold some events that help people and their families keep safe off the job. We are arranging some brown bag

lunches during the month, when anyone who is interested can come and learn various tips on things we have to do at home. We'll have some fun prizes for all who attend the talks

and a bigger raffle prize for people who attend more than one talk.'

"It's hard to share concerns about safety without everyone's thinking, 'Oh, not again!" admits Tarpinian. Late last summer, Scott Smith and Ray Edwards of ES began assembling the tripods, computers and other electronic equipment they would use to build weather stations for the Urban Dispersion field studies, scheduled for the following spring. During the winter months, ES's Earth Systems Division (ESD) staff members designed 11 meteorological towers to be placed on the ground at the corners of Madison Square Garden and on the rooftops of several nearby buildings. Victor Cassella of ESD contacted the managers of the buildings selected as sites for the weather stations.

"All the building managers were very cooperative." Cassella said. "They offered their resources to be part of the solution to the terrorist threat and contribute to the success of the project."

During a bitterly cold February, one

'We wanted a consistent day, with winds blowing from the same direction all day," Cassella said. "We didn't want precipitation because of the computers, and we didn't want the gas to be held down by inversion, where clouds can form a ceiling below the tops of the buildings."

Early on the morning of an experiment, the meteorological and tracer instruments had to be deployed before the tracers were released. The meteorological team was supported by BNL staff from across the Lab, including Lou Gerlach from the EENS Directorate Research

BATS and CATS

The task of releasing the gas and tracking its dispersion was handled by the tracer team using Brookhaven Atmospheric Tracer Samplers (BATS) and Capillary Absorption Tube Samplers (CATS). Other team members analyzed and produced visualizations of the data captured by the BATS and CATS. Tom Watson, Atmospheric Sciences Division (ASD), set up the release of the tracer gases. John Heiser, Environmental Science & Technology Division (ERTD) and Tracer Team

gather data during the field studies. Four other ERTD members — Mark Furman, Jay Adams, Jeff Fitts and Larry Milian — each supervised a group of students stationed on the streets around Madison Square Garden with portable air samplers. OEP's Ken White and Noel Blackburn had developed relationships with several professors through BNL's Faculty & Student Teams program, and these contacts produced valuable student assistance.

"The students brought a wealth of resources and energy to the project," Blackburn said. "In redefining OEP's mission, one of our goals is to develop programs which add value to our scientific community. Utilizing students in this manner is one example how informal education can assist us in obtaining this goal."

While the students stood on street corners, Bob Wieser, Rick Wilke and Gabe Vignato, ASD, cruised the outer perimeter of the study area with a vanmounted instrument designed by Russell Dietz and Wieser, which tracked the presence of the gas. The instrument, built and calibrated at BNL, was developed for Keyspan to locate leaks in underground pipes.

When the field study was over, the tracer team members dismantled all the equipment and collected samples for analysis at the Lab, to be performed by Wilke, Watson and Dietz.

Terry Sullivan, who also assisted in coordinating the tracer releases on the test days, and

Alice Cialella work on visualizations, taking spread sheets of numbers and plotting the data on a map in a number of ways, including a movie that shows gas concentrations over time.

Paul Kalb, ERTD Division Head, who coordinated the various BNL teams, said that the field tests "were a truly collaborative group effort, in which everyone pitched in to do what was needed." For example, on the first test morning, ES Chair Creighton Wirick could be found monitoring a gas cylinder on a street corner to give the designated technician a break from the cold, while Kalb delivered donuts to students standing outside with air samplers.

Valuable assistance also came from other sources: Dietz advised on aspects of the tracer technology, which he helped develop over the past 30 years. Linda Satalino ordered equipment and provided administrative support. ESD's John Nagy, Keith Lewin, and Bill Behrens gave support as needed, and Community, Education, Government & Public Affairs staff provided guidance to a phalanx of media representatives covering the story.

Heiser praised all the teams' professionalism. "In large field experiments, something always goes wrong so you have to be versatile and fix things quickly," he said. "These teams overcame everything that came up without complaint, on a very tight schedule with reporters everywhere." — Kay Cordtz

Benefit Notes: Qualifying Events

Changes to medical and/or dental coverage may be made during the benefits annual open enrollment. Also, certain changes may be made within 31 days of when a qualifying event occurs. Buy Hot Cakes at Upton Post Office!

Hot cakes is another way of describing the set of stamps commemorating four of America's great scientists, which are selling like hot cakes — the on-site U.S. Postal Service has already reordered them twice after selling out the previous supplies. Like all other scientific institutions. BNL is indebted to one of the scientists, Josiah Willard Gibbs, who died in 1903 having won the most

prestigious awards of his era for his formulation of the modern system of thermodynamic analysis. But the other three scientists in the set have more or less apocryphal connections with the



Lab says Dick Watson, a Physics Department retiree.

Barbara McClintock, who won the Nobel Prize in 1983 for her discovery of genetic transposition from her maize plant research, while she was at Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory, grew at least some of her corn at BNL.

Richard Feynman, 1965 Nobelist in physics for his work on quantum theory, visited BNL several times during the 1950s or 1960s. The story goes that his well-known absentmindedness led him on more than one occasion to drive straight through the guarded main gate without pause, which reportedly resulted in the time when he was stopped abruptly, confronted by a less-than-welcoming pistol, before he was allowed to enter the site.

And John von Neumann, whose significant contributions in pure and applied mathematics won him the 1956 Enrico Fermi Award, was also the first husband of Marietta Kuper, the first BNL employee.
