
### Farewell to Lab Director Praveen Chaudhari

The BSA Board has announced that Sam Aronson, previously Associate Laboratory Director for High Energy & Nuclear Physics, will take over on May 1 as Interim Laboratory Director.

**Modeling the Chemical Reactions Of Nanoparticles** 

s science enters the world of the very small, researchers will be searching for new ways to study nanoparticles and their properties. For the past several years, scientists at BNL have been experimenting with new methods for preparing nanoparticles on metal supports, with the aim of creating model catalyst systems to better study the special reactivity of nanosized catalyst particles. Jan Hrbek of the Chemistry Department reviewed several of the Lab's results at the 231st national meeting of the American Chemical Society in Atlanta, GA, in March.

Catalysis, the acceleration of a chemical reaction, is tremendously important as an industrial process, underlying most of the energy supply (oil-to-fuel conversion, for example) and 80 percent of the products of the chemical industry. There is a substantial need to understand how catalysts work and learn to design and make better catalysts. The work at BNL, funded by the Office of Basic Energy Sciences within DOE's Office of Science, is aimed at understanding how the detailed atomic structures of model systems of certain classes of catalysts contribute to their activity. Hrbek's talk reviewed work in making models of nanometer-scale particles that are the active material in many catalyst particles.

"Actual catalysts are very complex, often with a wide range of particle sizes and structures," Hrbek said. "It is often difficult to sort out which atomic sites are catalytically active. The goals of the model studies being done here are to be able to determine atomic structures of the reactive sites, and to understand how reactions occur at those sites. This work ultimately aims to strengthen our ability to design better catalysts."

Among the most interesting results of the BNL studies, said Hrbek, is a new

method to create well-defined nanoparticles of metal compounds that are of

catalytic interest. "Reactive layer assisted deposition, or RLAD, allows us to make well-dispersed, reasonably uniform nanoparticles of metal compounds on well-defined supports," Hrbek said. "These can then be structurally characterized on the nano scale and their reactivity evaluated by using modern surface-sensitive techniques. This opens an interesting opportunity to examine catalytic activity in metal compounds that were also atomically characterized."

Several other laboratories studying nanoparticles of metal compounds have already adopted the RLAD method.

"It is a challenge to form uniform particles in this size range, to disperse them uniformly on the substrate, and to 'look' at them with advanced microscopies to understand their structure," Hrbek said. "The tools being applied to form and study the particles are one aspect of Brookhaven's growing capabilities in nanoscience." — Kay Cordtz ⊕ For more details on this research, go to nanoscience."

### 'When the Electron Falls Apart . . . and What to Do with the Pieces' Nobel Laureate Horst Stormer to Give BSA Distinguished Lecture, 5/4

Torst Stormer, co-winner of Horst stormer, co ...... the 1998 Nobel Prize in Physics, will give a BSA Distinguished Lecture titled "When the Electron Falls Apart . . . and What to Do with the Pieces" on Thursday, May 4, at 4 p.m. in Berkner Hall. Sponsored by Brookhaven Science Associates, the company that manages Brookhaven Lab, BSA Distinguished Lectures bring topics of general interest before the Lab community and the public. The lecture is free, and no reservations are required. All visitors age 16 and over must bring a photo ID.

Electrons are indivisible, as far as physicists know. In groups, however, electrons can fall apart and create smaller, fractional charges when squeezed onto a plane and exposed to a magnetic field. This phenomenon, known as the fractional quantum Hall effect, implies that many electrons, acting in concert, can create particles with a charge smaller than the charge of any individual electron - a counterintuitive effect, considering a collection of objects usually is bigger than its parts. Fractional charges are bizarre because, not only are they smaller than the charge of any constituent electron, but they are exactly one-third, or one-



fifth, or one-seventh, etc., of an electronic charge, depending on the conditions under which

they have been prepared. Today, the evidence for such perplexing, fractional charges is direct, and scientists understand them in terms of an elaborate, quantum mechanical waltz of electrons. Stormer's lecture will provide an intuitive insight into this fascinating state of matter, present recent surprises, and finish with a speculated application of these weird particles.

Horst Stormer received his Ph.D. in physics from the University of Stuttgart in 1977, joined Bell Labs (now Lucent

Technologies) as a postdoctoral student shortly after and became a technical staff member in 1978. From 1983 to 1992, he headed the company's Semiconductor Physics Research Department, and, in 1992, he became the Director of its Physical Research Laboratory. In 1997, Stormer became the Adjunct Physics Vice President at Bell Labs, and, in the same year, became a physics professor at Columbia University. In 1998, Stormer shared the Nobel Prize in Physics with Robert B. Laughlin and Daniel C. Tsui for the discovery of the fractional quantum Hall effect.

NL's annual Perfect Attendance celebration to recognize the f Dfull-time employees who have won a Perfect Attendance Award for the previous calendar year was held on March 21. Those of the 41 winners who were able to attend the afternoon event at the Brookhaven Center were welcomed by Compensation Manager Robert Kelly, Human Resources & Occupational Medicine Division. The winners were warmly congratulated by BNL Director Praveen Chaudhari, who thanked the awardees for their dedication and service to the Lab. Each awardee was presented a certificate, a \$200 check, less tax, and a tee-shirt.

The Perfect Attendance Award was first given in 1992, when full-time employees on the technical and clerical schedules were recognized for their attendance during 1991. In 1995, these employees and those from the Paper, Allied-Industrial, Chemical & Energy Workers International were joined in being eligible for the award by BNL employees represented by the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. In 1998, members of the Suffolk County Security Police Association in the Safeguards & Security Division also became eligible for the prize.

This year, as previously, many awardees had achieved multiple years of perfect attendance: three were winning for the first time, six for the second time, five for the third, six for the fourth, two for the fifth time, five for the sixth time, two for the seventh time, one for the eighth, four for the ninth, one for the tenth, five for the 11th, and one, Phyllis Tinsley-Smith of the Biology Department, for the 14th time. However, employees who became eligible for the prize after its inception have often served BNL with additional years of perfect attendance that are on record elsewhere.



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### Additional Security Measures From Len Butera, Interim Manager, Safeguards & Security Division

The Laboratory has received law enforcement and intelligence advisories warning of an increase in communications traffic by suspected terrorist organizations. It is believed this may be an indicator of operational planning and a precursor to malevolent acts.

Although the advisories are non-specific, they do include federal facilities. When we consider ongoing events in the Middle East and continued activities of U.S.-based activist groups known to target research facilities, increased vigilance seems prudent.

As a result, the Lab will be instituting additional security measures, including increased patrols, searches of vehicles, increased parcel searches, additional exercises for our tactical teams, and other actions that may or may not be visible to employees. We would also like to take this opportunity to remind the Lab population to have their ID ready for officers when entering the Lab and to wear their badges at all times on the site.

As always, we appreciate your cooperation and assistance in ensuring the Lab and its employees remain safe and secure.

### **Women in Science Career Day at BNL**
