BNL, SBU Acquire Funding for Powerful New Supercomputer New York State-funded machine will ensure L.I.'s global competitiveness

BNL Director Sam Aronson, Stony Brook University (SBU) President Shirley Strum Kenny, SBU Provost Robert McGrath, SBU Professor James Glimm and BNL's Jim Davenport hosted a celebration at BNL on October 18 to thank New York State for allocating \$26 million for a new supercomputer, which will be the fastest in the world available for general users.

Said Aronson, "This new supercomputing initiative will give Brookhaven, Stony Brook, and other researchers the infrastructure they need to make advances in physics, biology, and computational science. It's very encouraging to see this kind of support from the state, and especially from Assemblyman Marc Alessi, who has been an effective advocate for Lab. Some of Marc's colleagues in the NYS Assembly also attended the celebration: Patricia

Said Alessi, "Together, we're helping bring Suffolk County to

the forefront of our high-tech world. I, along with the rest of Long Island, can't wait to see this supercomputer in action. It's been a pleasure working with

Stony Brook and BNL, and I look forward to continuing our effort to attract the brightest minds and quality jobs to this area."

"This is a great day for both

science and Long Island," said Assemblyman Steven Englebright. "This powerful computer will enable scientists to expand the frontiers of knowledge while simultaneously ensuring that Long Island's research institutions remain globally competitive."

The supercomputer, capable of 100 teraflops, will be the centerpiece of the New York Center for Computational Science, a cooperative effort between SBU and BNL that will also involve universities throughout the state. It will allow computations that, until now, have been impractical for scientists exploring questions in biology, medicine, materials, nanoscience, renewable energy, finance and other critical research and technology areas. The new Center will be co-managed by BNL and SBU.

BNL, KIST Collaborate on Nanotechnology

n October 19, Sang-Hee Suh, Director of the Korean Center for Nanostructured Materials Technology (CNMT), joined Doon Gibbs, BNL's Associate Director For Basic Energy Sciences (BES), in signing a memorandum of understanding to establish the Korea Project on Energy and Environment Located at the Brookhaven National Laboratory Center for Functional Nanomaterials.

The signing took place at the start of a two-day symposium at BNL — the third since 2004 on biotechnology and nanotechnology — involving scientists from CNMT and the Korea Institute of Science & Technology (KIST) in Seoul, Korea, and from the Lab's BES Departments, the Center for

Medical Department.

The agreement encourages participants to collaborate on the development of research programs focused on nanostructured materials for environmental and energy-related applications. Research directions will include:

Nanocatalysis: studying the interaction of greenhouse gases nitric oxide and sulfur dioxide with several oxides of interest in nitric oxide removal and desulfurization processes

Cathode battery materials: characterizing surface-modified electrode materials for rechargeable lithium batteries using synchrotron-based in situ x-ray techniques.

Thermoelectric materials: Functional Nanomaterials, and investigating effects of dimen-

the Biology Department and sionality on thermoelectric materials that will foster efficient transformation of heat into electricity to provide significant energy savings in transportation systems.

> Fuel Cell Research: examining the ultra-low noble metal content of fuel-cell electrocatalysts.

> CFN Deputy Director for Operations and Outreach Laura Henderson Lewis, in addition to overseeing the organization of the symposium, gave an overview of the CFN-CNMT Project to kick off the first session on plans for project's energy and environment involvement at the CFN.

> Commented Lewis, "We recognize that successfully meeting the global energy challenge requires international partner-

BNL Honored With EPA Environmental Achievement Award

BNL is being honored with National Partnership waste generation and its inventory of polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs). The NPEP encourages public and private organizations to form voluntary partnerships with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to reduce the use

the end of 2006. In fact, the Lab's mercury waste generation dropped by 83 percent, from 600 pounds in 2003 to 100

pounds to 445 pounds between 2005 and 2006.

to thank everyone — both scientists and support staff — who helped us achieve these NPEP goals. We continually strive to reduce pollution and manage wastes at Brookhaven, with employees' and the community's safety as our top priority."

Exposure to mercury can cause numerous health problems, including harm to the brain, heart, kidney, lungs, and immune system. Over many years, BNL has cleaned sanitary mains and sink traps to rid them of mercury that may have been accidentally spilled. In 2005, the Lab completed a Superfund-mandated remediation project to clean contaminated sediments from the Peconic River, including elevated levels of mercury attributed to past disposal practices.

Also, BNL switched all fluorescent light fixtures to low-mercury bulbs when they became available. Mercury-containing devices, such a thermometers and temperature-control devices, were replaced with alternatives, such

as alcohol thermometers and solid state electronic controls. As a result of these and other efforts, the Lab's mercury inventory dropped by 38 percent

PCBs were developed in the 1940s and were used widely in heat transfer fluids in transformers and capacitors. Because of their potentially dangerous health effects, including increased cancer risk, PCBs were banned in 1979 from being manufactured or distributed in commercial products. BNL converted all of its PCB-filled transformers to ones containing alternative dielectric fluids.

At BNL's Alternating Gradient Synchrotron, an accelerator that began operations in 1960, 314 capacitors containing 1.5 gallons each of PCB dielectric fluid were removed and replaced with non-PCB equipment. Now the Lab's PCB inventory is less than 10 percent of its 2003 level, and this is expected to be reduced to zero in the future, as old equipment is replaced with new.

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Clockmaker Biscardi Designs Beautiful 'Contrivance'

In his job at the Lab, Cyrus Biscardi is a technical research associate in the Collider-Accelerator Department. But in his other life, he is a clockmaker. And, after a year's work — six months for the design, six months for the construction — he has finished a masterpiece of clockworking art, shown here at his studio in Bellport. All are invited to view this elegant and fascinating "contrivance" as Biscardi described his latest work, at the BNL Community Fall Art and Crafts Show that will be held in Berkner Hall, Monday-Wednesday, November 20-22, just before Thanksgiving.

Says Biscardi, "Making clocks is a fascinating hobby, but it takes time! It's very important to get me that I have the support of my wife in this work, and I'm lucky, I have it. Without that, I doubt it could happen."

Though Biscardi has always been interested in making clocks, he ascribes his much of his special skill to a special mentor, the late Irving Polk, a Lab engineer for well over 40 years who died this May.*

"This piece is made in homage to Irving," said Biscardi. "He was a great engineer and a fantastic clockmaker — we'll never see another like him."

Biscardi met Polk when both were interested in a Lab project to come up with a clock that would run forever. The project was shelved, but the two clockmakers started a valuable friendship.

"I feel as if he taught me all the best things I know," says Biscardi. "He even provided me with extra tools and equipment — he was terrific. When I was designing this piece, he was encouraging me along, even though he was very sick. Because he couldn't get to the studio, I made a video of the prototype and took it to show him while he was in the hospital. Everyone respected Irving. He was a great guy and I'll always remember him."

To encourage participation in a volunteer activity, with supervisory approval, an employee may make a one-time request of an hour's work time to perform volunteer work.
