At BNL, Governor Paterson Announces NYPA's Lower Cost Power Allocation for Lab, **Plans for LIPA's On-Site Solar Energy Project**

Low-Cost Electricity Will Support BNL Science, Including NSLS-II **Creating Hundreds of New Jobs on Long Island**

The lights at Brookhaven Aronson, Paterson stated, Lab, some of which are among the brightest in the world, will not go out any time soon.

On Friday, February 27, New York State Governor David A. Paterson announced an agreement to allocate low-cost elec-

The project will create up to 1,000 jobs over the next few years and several hundred new permanent positions at BNL, one of Long Island's largest employers and energy users. In constructing the new NSLS-II facility, DOE will invest over \$900 million, which will also help retain thousands of jobs on Long Island.

The hydropower allocation will be made by NYPA through a sale to the Long Island Power Authority for BNL's exclusive use.

"The power supplies that are being provided through NYPA are not only essential for our proceeding with the new NSLS-II facility, they are crucial to the future of the Lab as whole. Without a long-term source of lower-cost power, our energy-intensive operations would have difficulty competing for DOE funding of new facilities and research projects and could face the prospect of being shuttered several years down the road," stated Aronson. "We are grateful to Governor Paterson, Senator Schumer and various other State and local officials, including Richard Kessel of the New York Power Authority, for their support of our NSLS-II plans and for the allocation of affordable power well into the future." Paterson also announced that a portion of BNL's site has been selected for the Long Island Power Authority's newly proposed array of solar panels. tists each year, who conduct pioneering work in materials and life sciences and other fields while contributing to the local and state economies. The research conducted at Brookhavenwhich in-

cludes advancements in energy — is critical to New York's position as a national leader in renewable energy initiatives."

The New York Power Authority (NYPA) is expecting for the first time to provide BNL with 15 megawatts (MW) of hydropower, along with other market supplies, to meet BNL's full electricity

requirements over a 15-year period. Last month, the NYPA Board of Trustees authorized contract negotiations for the distribution of hydropower to BNL, which is operated by Brookhaven Science Associates for DOE. In addition to serving BNL's overall operations, the supplies of low-cost power will underpin the atomic-scale work at the NSLS-II facility in areas including nanoscale medical, energy and materials research.

Richard M. Kessel, NYPA President and Chief Executive Officer, said: "Like other Long Islanders, I have long appreciated Brookhaven National Laboratory's profound importance to the region and New York State's overall economy. The Laboratory injects hundreds of millions of dollars a year in direct spending into the State's

economy, which is linked to tens of thousands of additional jobs beyond those at the Lab. NYPA is working to assure continued lower cost electricity supplies for Brookhaven's needs well into the future."

In January, DOE authorized the construction of NSLS-II to begin this year. NSLS-II will be the largest capital project under construction at any of the ten DOE Office of Science laboratories.

Access to world-class capabilities provided by synchrotron light sources like the current NSLS and future NSLS-II is crucial to many scientists at the state's universities and research institutions, including the State University of New York at Plattsburgh, Cornell University and Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute. Astronomer Jill Tarter, AAAS Fellow To Talk on Extraterrestrial Intelligence: Fact, Not Fiction, 3/11



Jill Tarter, Director of the Center for Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence (SETI) Research, will give a talk, titled "The Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence: Fact, Not Fiction," in Berkner Hall at 4 p.m. on Wednesday, March 11. Sponsored by Brookhaven Women in Science (BWIS) and the Diversity Office in celebration of BWIS's thirtieth anniversary, the lecture is free and open to the public. Visitors to the Lab age 16 and over must bring a photo ID.

For 40 years, the SETI community has had a pragmatic definition of intelligence — the ability to build large transmitters. Almost all SETI searches have looked for radio signals coming from distant civilizations. Recently, SETI has been searching for optical pulses as well. In her talk, Tarter will discuss the new Allen Telescope Array being developed for SETI that will provide the first systematic look at the transient radio universe.

Tarter earned a bachelor's degree in engineering physics from Cornell University, and a master's degree and Ph.D., both in astronomy, from the University of California at Berkeley (UC-Berkeley). As a graduate student, she worked on the radio-search SERENDIP project at Hat Creek Observatory, and she did postdoctoral work at the NASA Ames Research Center. From 1977 to 1993, she was a research astronomer at UC-Berkeley. She also became project scientist for the NASA SETI Microwave Observing Project and High Resolution Microwave Survey in 1989, and then director of Project Phoenix for the SETI Institute in 1993. In 1997, she became Bernard M. Oliver Chair for SETI at the SETI Institute in Mountain View, California, a position she still holds, and in 2000, she became director of the Center for SETI Research.

The character that Jodi Foster plays in the 1997 movie "Contact" is based on Tarter. In real life, Tarter is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and she has published dozens of scientific papers. Tarter has received numerous awards for her work, including a Lifetime Achievement Award from Women in Aerospace in 1989, two public service medals from NASA, and the 2009 TED (Technology, Entertainment, Design) Prize, which recognizes the "world's most fascinating thinkers and doers." — Diane Greenberg

It is important to know that in-network providers may not be contracted with your insurance company to provide all the services they offer on an in-network basis. For example, your orthopedist may be in-network for orthopedic services but may not be in-network for radiology/x-rays. You will be responsible for all costs related to services received from an innetwork provider that is not contracted to provide such services. Such costs will not be processed as out-of-network claims.

Ward Melville High School Team Wins Science Bowl at BNL

took first place in the Regional Science Bowl at BNL — the fifth time the team placed first in the last six years. Last year, the team placed second. Ward Melville competed against 19 other high school teams from Long Island in the 2009 regional competition hosted by the Lab on January 31. Brookhaven Science Associates, the Long Island Science Center and Teachers Federal Credit Union sponsored the local tournament, a fast-paced question-and-answer contest designed to test high school students' knowledge of biology, chemistry, physics, mathematics, astronomy, earth science and general science. The Regional Science Bowl at Brookhaven, along with 67 others around the country, is part of the National Science Bowl® competition coordinated by DOE's Office of Science. Since

Ward Melville High School its inception in 1991, more than 130,000 high school students have participated in the "Jeopardy"-style contest. By challenging themselves in Science Bowl competitions, students are encouraged to excel in science and math and to pursue careers in those fields. As the first-place winners, each of the Ward Melville team members received \$100, and the team is invited to participate in the National Science Bowl®, which will be held in Washington, DC, on April 30 - May 5, 2009. Each of the students in the second-place team, Half Hollow Hills High School West, won \$50; Farmingdale High School student-winners won \$25 each for third-place; and Comsewogue High School took fourth place, winning \$15 each. Some common situations in which you may incur unforeseen costs because your provider is in-network but is providing services for which he/she has no contract are as follows:

Audiologists may not be participating in providing hearing aids; orthopedists: x-rays, braces, etc.; podiatrists: orthotics; pharmacies: durable medical equipment items such as glucometers, crutches, etc.; obstetricians: sonograms.

If you have any questions regarding what is covered in-network by a provider, contact your health insurance company by using the phone number on the back of your ID card.

Maintenance Medication Update

All medical program participants taking maintenance medications should be aware that each medical insurance company BNL offers has a mail-order prescription drug program available. By using the mail-order program, you can obtain a three-month supply of your prescription for only two co-payments. You will pay three separate co-payments if you obtain the same prescription at your local pharmacy and you will only be provided with a one-month supply at a time.

New Sneakers Donated for US Soldiers

The members of U.S. Army reconnaissance platoon 1-26IN will be able to run faster and jump higher this month. On February 13, the JCPenney department store of Roosevelt Field donated 32 pairs of new sneakers to the soldiers through the local chapter of the AdoptaPlatoon program, which is based at BNL.

"We are so grateful for the donation from JCPenney, and the sneakers will go directly to soldiers in the front lines," said Ken Erickson, a Ridge resident and BNL employee who heads the local AdoptaPlatoon chapter. "Most of these soldiers in the platoon are about 19 years old and they're somebody's kids. We want to do whatever we can to boost their morale and make them comfortable while they're there."

The sneakers are scheduled to arrive in the Middle East this month and will then be delivered via helicopter to the soldiers who are stationed in the mountains of Afghanistan. While the platoon originally requested 32 pairs of sneakers (one pair for each soldier), only 29 will be used. Since the original request, two members of the platoon have been killed and one has been injured.

AdoptaPlatoon Soldier Support Effort is a national nonprofit organization that helps civilians to "adopt" a soldier or an entire platoon of soldiers by providing them with letters and items that they request, including winter boots, shaving razors, magazines, snacks, and even backup generators. AdoptaPlatoon accepts supplies and financial donations from individuals as well as local, regional, and national businesses.

The Brookhaven Veterans Association's AdoptaPlatoon committee has supported several platoons as well as deployed BNL employees and their children since its inception two years ago. 
