was on from 2-4




Ther Thursday April 11, 1918 Wea

a little tired but
anxious to get to Lpton
Took the Long Island
line to Jamaica
landed in Lpton
at 7-30 after a long
old journey from Hoboken
in Summar Cars
It is still snowing

and the Southern
boys are sore because
they were kicked so
much about God's
country.

Finally landed in
one barracks and
got barracks in
shape and turned
in.

No reveille in
morning -

Sat. Up at 9-30
Breakfast tardis
good after 3 days
in fullyman with
poor cooking.

Shaved and feeling
good now getting
ready for a ride

went to Bull-gang 9-9
3-0 we won

no body home.

left for T.R. at 8-30
arrived F.R. 9-30.
Home - 10-30

100 others
had a chicken dinner
and it was great

Left home at 1 o'clock
Saw Mary at 1-45

he took Mary home

On found train from
Prov. to N.Y. arrived N.Y.
at 11-45. Subway to Penn
Sta. had supper and
left for Long Island Express
at 12-25: arrived at

5. Train left Camp Upton at
6-30 - Sleepy
Arrived at Long Island City
at 9-30. Took ferry to Canarsie
Sino dock. Steamer
Mauritania. 6000 men
on board. ready to sail
to-night. Got a state
room.

Turned in about
9-30.

Kroell in room
with me.
Slept well

Orders to move
to-morrow.

Jedel & Kroell
had their rooms
Brackley in art
on guard on Mauritania
Cunard Line.
Up at 12 to post
relief. Walked all

Some trouble with
steering apparatus
made it so we could
not sail on the Mauritania

Revolvers at 5
Left Crows at 9-30
Bike 27 Kilo. 6
Jillie now. Slept in
bed with Duffey

va
Went thru mill
and inspected
Sail torture suit

Saw Sully
Canary and again
was sail to-morrow
Confession at 1/2 of C

Bed at 9.

Communism all of
suddenly.
Not to sail until Thurs.

Up at 6-30
Cleaning

up and breakfast
a steady swell
and I kept close in
my bunk all day
Finished reading my
3rd book since coming
aboard The - Gold
Train - The Hellman
- Circular staircase.
After our regular daily
inspection by Gen.
Cronin and our
life belt drill we
had a very heavy
sea running.
Running in about 7 bells

Moved to another barracks
