boarded Pullman  
and pulled out of  
Camp Gordon at  
6-30.

We turned in  
about 8-30 going thro  
Northern Georgia

I was put in charge  
of train guards and  
was on from 2-4

Ther Thursday, April 11, 1918 Wea

Up at 6-30  
Now in So. Carolina  
very cold and slight  
whirl of snow

late in evening  
passed into North  
Carolina

Bed at 9 and  
our trip so far  
has been O.K.

Nickel, Canning  
and Myers and  
myself in a  
compartment

lots of fine  
snowing very much

Time to Brideaux  
for circus

Friday, April 12, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30  
Passed thro Washin-  
ton at night.

Nearby Phila.  
and Red Cross Chap.  
gave us a big  
reception, Crowd  
all along route  
gave us a fine  
reception.

Elizabeth N. J.  
Jersey City  
Jard was there  
taken across on a  
ferry to Hoboken,  
a little tired but  
anxious to get to Lipton.  
Took the Long Island  
line to Yaphank.  
Landed in Lipton  
at 7-20 after a long  
old journey from Hoboken  
in Summer Cars  
It is still raining

Saturday, April 13, 1918

Wea

and the Southern  
boys are sore because  
they were kided so  
much about God's  
Country.

Finally landed in  
our barracks and  
got barracks in  
shape and turned  
in.

No reveille in  
morning -

Sat. Up at 9-30  
Breakfast tastes  
good after 3 days  
in Dullyman with  
poor cooking.

Shaved and feeling  
good now getting  
ready for a pass

went to Bull-gaming 9:19  
3-2 we won

150 wanted to  
Officers disappointed

Getting ready for  
pass this morning  
on board train  
for home

Passed wreck of  
yesterday 3 cars  
turned over on S. 2 Road  
Landed at Penn. Sta.

11-15-

Had dinner at 44<sup>th</sup> St.  
Saw Dr. Dors at 42<sup>nd</sup>  
St. office.

Left for Prov. - 12:03  
Prov.

Went to Chas. Home  
nobody home.

Had lunch and  
left for F.R. at 8-30  
arriv. F.R. 9-30  
Home - 10-30

Wednesday, April 17, 1918

Wea

Up at 8-45

Home in bed  
and it sure felt  
great.

Saw Wright, Frank  
Conway and about  
100 others.

Had a chicken dinner  
and it was great

Left home at 1 o'clock  
Saw Mary at 1-45

Left for Prov. at 2-30

Saw Charlie and  
went to his house

They saw me off and  
he took Mary home

On board train from  
Prov. to N.Y. Arriv. N.Y.  
at 11-45. Subway to Penn  
Sta. had supper and  
left for Long Island Express  
at 12-25. Arriv. at  
Lpton at 3.15

1918  
Rained no  
review

Thursday, April 18, 1918

Up at 8 o'clock  
 all tired out  
 Raining all day  
 and washing I stayed  
 over.

Wrote 3 letters  
 and had lunch and  
 turned in.

I hear we are leaving  
 Sunday for France.

Chaplain said on  
 board ship in 7 days

Ther Saturday, April 20, 1918

Wea

up at 6-15  
Packing up and  
getting ready to move  
Did a little drilling  
and also washed  
some clothes

Saw a good Charlie  
Chaplin picture at  
Kof E Building.

Took a bath  
had lunch and  
went to bed

Inspection

Sunday  
Gaid from  
M. O. B.

Ther Sunday, April 21, 1918

Wea

up at 7-45  
emptied my mattress  
of straw and went to  
church.

Packed my  
barrack bag and  
made my pack  
everything ready  
to move at mid-  
night to night.

Many people  
coming in to see  
there boys off

We had about  
five inspections  
(physical) to day  
which makes about  
100 since we  
left Gordon  
my number (identifi-  
cation tag) is  
16 27174  
Left on a spring bed

Up at 3-30

Hustle and bustle  
on the march to the train at  
5. Train left Camp up on at  
6-30 - Sleepy

Arrived at Long Island City  
at 9-30. Took ferry to Cannons  
Point Dock. Steamer  
Mauritania. 6000 men  
on board. ready to sail  
to-night. Got a state-  
room.

Turned in about  
9-30.

Kroell in room  
with me.

Slept well

Orders to move  
to-morrow.

Up at 8-30

Breakfast

Ordered 2 Kroell

Had this room

Brackley in with me  
on guard on Mauritania  
Cannon Point.

Up at 12 to post  
relief. Talked all  
during the watch  
about N.Y.

We are not to  
sail on the Mauritania  
Bel at 4

Some trouble with  
steering apparatus  
made it so we could  
not sail on the Mauritania

Revelled at 5

Left Crows at 9-30

Like 27 kilo. 8

Ville nav. Slept in  
bed with Duffey

Friday, April 26, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30  
 Breakfast shaved  
 and washed  
 Recd some good  
 books and had life  
 belt drill. The fog  
 keeps getting worse  
 but the weather holds  
 good. 9 ships with  
 us now 1 battle ship

Bed at 9-30

Tobacco was given us  
 to-day by B. F. Keith the butcher

Arrival at Gene-  
 car 41  
 went thru mill  
 and inspection

Sail tonight sent

Saturday, April 27, 1918

Wea

Up at 7-30  
 Breakfast  
 Heavy sea and I  
 had my first touch  
 of sea-sickness  
 Salt-pork was  
 issued for ration  
 and made many  
 sick.

I am reading  
 a book so that help  
 me pass the time.  
~~about the rest of the~~  
 away.

Inspection of  
 quarter and  
 life belt drill  
 Bed at 9-30

Saw Sullivan  
 Candy and cigarettes  
 Dope sail to-morrow  
 Confession at 4 of C

Sunday, April 28, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30  
 Breakfast  
 Cleaning up quarters  
 Heavy sea running  
 and just a little  
 sick. Hair not thrown  
 up yet. Feeding  
 good to day and  
 him off easily now  
 Lonesome but  
 reading and  
 comrades kidding  
 made me forget  
 the blues.

Supper and  
 the sea still heavy  
 Bed at 9.

Communion at 10 of  
 Sunday.

Not to sail until Thurs.

Monday, April 29, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30  
 Cleaning  
 up and Breakfast  
 a steady swell  
 and I kept close in  
 my bunk all day  
 Finished reaching my  
 3rd look since coming  
 aboard The - Gold  
 Trail - The Hellman  
 - Arcular staircase.  
 After our regular daily  
 inspection by Gen.  
 Cronin and our  
 life belt drill we  
 had a very heavy  
 sea running.  
 Turning in about 7 bells

Barrel

Moved to another barracks  
 Had to join

Ther Tuesday, April 30, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30

Heavy sea  
Quite sick  
Although have  
not thrown up yet.  
no exercise or life  
belt drill today

Bed at 7  
feeling fever

About 75% of  
com. sick

Hdgt went this a.m.

We are still here  
and don't expect to go until  
Thurs.

Ther Wednesday, May 1, 1918

Wea

Up at 6-30

Heavy sea  
waves breaking over  
deck. Still sick  
eating only one  
small portion of  
oatmeal  
Felt better all  
night

Bed at 8 o'clock

3 officers and 75%  
of men sick in  
our Co.
