 Breakfast and packing
 up. Left Camp at 6-15. Train
 at 7-05. Bought the Sun papers.
 arrived at Southhampton
 at 8-20. Saw the O.S. gun-
 oil tanker which was torpedoed
 being repaired. Hanging
 around Southhampton
 until 6 o'clock in night.

Must cross the English Channel
 Boarded the King Edward a
 fast transport. Carried about
 900 troops we left at 7-30
 from Southhampton arrived at
 Havre, France at 2 o'clock. It
 was an exciting trip. We did not
 go ashore until 8 o'clock. Chinese
 laborers are numerous. Marched
 5 miles to a Camp to rest. The
 next day. was sick coming across
 channel. Eating on rations
 sleeping for American Camp.

Wea

Up all night
 Landed at Havre France
 Many guns camouflaged
 on rocks. English troops
 passed us. Saw a beautiful
 city but almost forsaken.
 Plenty of children. Open
 latrines. Belgians and
 French Soldiers by the
 hundreds. Women. Mothers
 and conductors like Eng
 land. Arrived at an English
 rest camp at 12 o'clock and
 it is raining like the devil
 13 men in a tent and pretty
 crowded. Had lunch and feeling
 damp in spirits and wet
 clothes. Expect to move on
 to-morrow to the American
 Training Camp. and you bet
 we will be glad to get away
 from the Eng. system.
~~Slept at 7 o'clock.~~

with a flat wheel. People
enthusiastic. No great
suffering noticed yet
except down look & discolored
Had a chat with Eng. officer

Wea

up at 3 o'clock and
 awake most of night.
 a tough time. Hanging
 around station unload-
 ing the freight. Finally
 got started with a heavy
 load. We stopped for
 lunch at a rest camp
 staid there for an hour
 and started on a 14
 mile hike. It was
 tough going after a sleep-
 less night and poor food.
 Finally we got billeted
 in a barn and got
 fixed up in a hay loft
 40 miles from front. now
 Relieving English troops
 we are equipped with gas
 mask. And helmets but
 not guns. We were trained
 with gas by the townspeople.
 Took a walk around town
 and went to bed at 11 o'clock
 Eau France

up at 4-15
 Breakfast -
 Heard guns going
 last night. Slept great
 in hay loft.
 On guard keeping
 men from restricted
 districts. Our planes
 patrol this area.
 getting back to old
 shape. as food and
 sleep is coming regular
 Men going too strong
 with the wine so guards
 put on to keep them straight.
 Had to sleep on the
 Green. A heavy bombard-
 ment going on some place
 near there and reports very
 loud. 2 hrs. on 4 off. last
 night.

Breakfast and
changed the guard.airplanes circling ground
us at a great height. A
great fight between airplanes
this morning early.Relief for guard turned
out at 10-30.Our Vich. Mch. Guns arrived
to-day. Had my first drink of
French red wine but do not like it.
Had a party between corporals
run the guard without being
caught. In a deserted orchard
the 3 corp. had some feed.

Bed at 11-30.

on new guns. Everybody must
have hair clipped off.Germans suppose to start
big drive to-morrow. Going

way from here Abbeville
